Presentation: Past President Doreen Pankewich presented a gift of appreciation to 2014-15 Board members, Sherry McKinnon, Director of Community Services, and Richard Schwan, past and current Director of International Services.

Program: Gail Bradley introduced speaker, Ann Grahame. Ann was born in London, England, where her father was a pediatrician. During World War II all children had to leave London so Ann went to live with her paternal grandparents in Ireland. She returned to England and was sent to Boarding School in 1945. In 1952 she returned to Ireland to attend Trinity College, University of Dublin where she obtained her medical degree. Following her internship she did a residency in Internal Medicine in London. She met her husband Philip, and they were married in 1967. Ann and Philip had two children: James who is married to Gita from Lithuania. They live in southern Alberta and have one son, Paul. Daughter Sophie is married to Canada in 1977. After a two year stint in family practice in Midale, the family moved to Regina where Ann practiced dermatology until her retirement in 2003. Ann is a past president of Eastview, an Ambassador for Shelter Box and Literacy manager for District 5550. She is also an avid member with the Government House Historical Society and currently co-chair of the Club Services Committee. Ann travels and has many hobbies however currently her time is taken up with Rotary and Government House commitments.

Ann's presentation was about Rotary HIP (Honoring Indigenous People). HIP was created by Rotarians in Southern Ontario in partnership and consultation with a number of indigenous people. HIP honors indigenous people by supporting their educational efforts and encouraging all Canadians to be aware of indigenous issues, history and culture. HIP is guided by the initial treaties that are represented by Wampum belts that were historically exchanged by indigenous and non-indigenous people in North America. There are many Wampum belts. The Two Row Wampum belt is a treaty representing friendship, peace and respect. This belt has two purple lines symbolizing a canoe and a European ship travelling down the river of life together. The canoe carries the laws, spirituality and



ways of life of the First Nations or indigenous people and the ship carries the laws, religion and ways of life of the Europeans, the North American settlers. It is understood that each should travel side by side, co-existing in mutual respect and harmony.

It is the hope that the actions coming from the combined initiative will help to reconcile the past and create harmony in the future. The organization is hopeful that every Rotary Club and Rotarian in Canada will join HIP and help to lead the way for all Canadians, and that in turn, all Canadians will join with HIP.

HIP adheres to the core values of Rotary International's 4-way test and the Seven Anishinaabek Grandfather Teachings. HIP believes in Service, Integrity, Diversity, Leadership, Collaboration, Sustainability, the 4 way test and the 7 Sacred Grandfather teachings noted above.

HIP's role is to list and share educational project opportunities, provide ideas for clubs, provide leadership and examples, create a tax receipt facility for personal donations and updates on current activities in Ontario. There are a number of success stories.

President Ron thanked Ann at the conclusion of her presentation and her diligence to this cause.

Announcements: President Ron relayed thanks from DG Ken Krebs for the hospitality he and Donna received when they attended a meeting at Eastview a few weeks ago. A thank you was also relayed from the Board of Chili for Children for the support received from Eastview in the past year. Ron also noted that the Board has approved the development of an ``Eastview Business card`` promoting Eastview. These cards are available from Allen Hillsden.

Past DG Doug Mortin read a letter of thanks from Bryn Styles, Rotary Foundation Trustee. In his letter Mr. Styles notes that the CRCID (Canadian Rotary Collaboration for International Development) is completing its final projects after nearly 30 years of serving Canadian Rotary Clubs. Mr. Styles congratulated CRCID on its excellent service to ensuring Canadian Rotarians had the support they needed.

Two new plans have been announced by the Department of Foreign Affairs, Trade and Development (DFATD), one for the matching of funds donated by Canadian Rotarians to the Polio Eradication Initiative and the other a new funding model from the Canadian Government to Rotarian International Projects. The Rotary Foundation (Canada) has entered into a new agreement with DFATD. The senior staff of DFATD have reviewed the Global Grant model of TRF and are impressed by the needs, assessments, evaluations, reporting mechanisms, stewardship and sustainability of the structure. The new agreement will use the Global Grant (GG) structure as its basis and allow clubs and districts access to Canadian Government funds for their projects. These funds will qualify for a World Fund match from TRF.

The agreement is for 5 years and the Canadian Government is contributing CDN \$1.2 million per year to Canadian Rotary projects.

Mr. Styles notes that a committee of TRF Canada is currently working through the final details of how the new funding model will work. Rotarians, Clubs and Districts will then be informed how they can access these funds. He notes that it is felt that the new model will be available to all Canadian Rotary club and district projects that meet the criteria that will be outlined.

Mr. Styles closes with the following: ``I want to thank all of you for without your support this agreement would not have been achieved. You advocated for government support for our Rotary programs—specifically Polio Plus – and the government listened. They understand the value of what Rotary can achieve and are willing to support our projects. I ask you to be patient as we finish the final details and then we will let all of you know how these government funds can be accessed.``

Directly involved in the CRCID process over the past few years were our own PDG Peter Peters and PDG Doug Mortin. Eastview is proud of these two Rotarians for all of their work and their contribution to the success of CRCID. Take a bow, gentlemen! We, as Rotarians, are urged to support the Rotary Foundation so their excellent work can continue.

Past President Doreen Pankewich reminded members of the Interclub Barbecue which will be held in Rotary Park on Sept. 2 beginning at 5-30 PM. The cost will be \$15 per person. If weather is inclement the alternative plan is the basement of Holy Rosary Cathedral. Please let Doreen know if you will be attending and how many guests will be accompanying you. A great opportunity for fellowship with other Rotarians in the city!

NEWS FROM SHELTER BOX Monday 03 August 2015

'I thank the Lord that well-wishers have come to my rescue'



ShelterBox beneficiary Aniya Hassan now has somewhere safe to look after her five orphaned grandchildren.

Earlier this year, Southern Malawi suffered from some of the worst floods in more than 40 years. For almost three months, ShelterBox response teams worked to reach people in the districts of Zomba, Chikwawa and Mulanje who had lost their homes and possessions to the floodwaters.

One of these people was 90-year-old Aniya Hassan, who takes care of her five orphaned grandchildren by herself. When

the river started to rise, one of the children raised the alarm and Aniya called for help. She has trouble walking, so some of the villagers came to help carry her to the safety of higher land. They managed to dig out a few possessions, but the flood washed the rest away.
