PROGRAM

President Greg introduced our guest speaker, who happened to be Rotarian Dinesh Kashyap. In his comments President Greg advised that Dinesh was born 40 miles from the Taj Mahal. He came to Canada 50 years ago and has a varied work Canadian career including: Provincial Government (SaskTel); Department of Secretary of State; and, Canadian Heritage and Capitol Records. Dinesh grew up under the aeroplanes of the Royal Indian Air

Force all across India as his father was in Air Force and so the family settled all over the world. Dinesh's father is a Rotarian. Dinesh's current focus is working on bringing Waskimo Winter Festival back to Regina – this will occur on Feb 20, 2017, and will become an annual event.

Dinesh intended to use power point to supplement his comments, but even John Van Koll was not able to have the technology function and so Dinesh

used his enthusiasm to tell his "My Canada Diversity" story. This is an interpreted summary of our Rotary friend's story (less the enthusiastic pride he reflects as he shares his feelings for his "chosen country".

When Dinesh speaks about "My Canada" he does not speak about the mountains, the plains, not the real estate, he speaks about the people. Canada is a country that is made up of two initial cultures (French and English) and it has become a blend of many other cultures to form a unique Canadian culture. Canadians work together - e.g. Canadians joined to restore Haiti; when a house burns down in a community, the neighbours come to restore that which was lost; Canadians do this possibly more than any other country and we do this because we treat others the way we wish to be treated.



Canadians are leaders in many things. In 1947 under Tommy Douglas's leadership, a year before the United Nations General Assembly adopted the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, Saskatchewan passed into law a bill of rights which was, and continues to be, unique. The Saskatchewan Bill of Rights covered both fundamental freedoms and equality rights. It was a blue print for what the United Nations used in preparing their own Bill of Rights. Saskatchewan led the country in universal health care system, under Douglas, a system which John Diefenbaker used in establishing the Federal system.





Dinesh made the point that Canadians are the most educated people in the world, not with degrees and certificates, but the way we vote. From a financial and economic perspective, Canadians are a shrewd and calculating people as demonstrated by the recent economic downturn in the world, where Canada's banking system remained at an even keel. People in Canada feel secure and that feeling of security is palpable by people visiting our country.

From Dinesh's perspective, Canadians are a humble people and this humility is recognized by visitors, and is possibly one of the country's finest traits. It is a Country where 90% of its' population lives within 100 miles (160 km) of the US/Canada border - the longest undefended border in the world. A Country that boasts the most recognized and appreciated police force in the world.

Dinesh knew nothing about Canada before he came other than it was cold and Toronto was one hour away from New York City. He suggested it remains a country which is a work in progress, but also a beautiful work in progress. In conclusion he challenged us to look at Canada from the perspective of, what we can do to make it better.



Thank you, Dinesh, for sharing your story because in doing so you have made us in our Canadian fashion "humbly proud" of who we are and what we offer to the world.
