



Pat asked for happy bucks and Greg McNamara was happy to report he had volunteered at the Rotary Carol Festival and found it to be a moving experience. Jeff Barber was happy that the Sergeant, with her professional hat on, had assisted Jeff's son with mortgage information. Jeff was commended by the Sergeant for appearing in the Leader Post in support of the Maker 2015 Event sponsored by the Regina Public Library this coming weekend at Regent Place

Branch. This is a community inspired opportunity in which people with common interests can meet, socialize and collaborate. Jeff is also excited about the new 3D printer at the Library. Sergeant Pat must have been glad



to be back as she was most generous in offering everyone a Rotobuck including those who have purchased hams and especially to John Van Koll who has arranged the ham sales. However the Sergeant does not have her Christmas lights completely up and fined anyone whose Christmas lights are ready to go. There were whisperings that the Sergeant should fine herself for not having her lights up!! And that concluded the Sergeant's report.

Program: the scheduled speaker was unable to attend. The International Services Committee took the opportunity to talk to the Club about the Rotary Foundation. Committee chair, Richard Schwan, came to the podium to remind us of the Foundation's role. The Rotary Foundation transforms Rotarians' gifts into

projects that change lives both close to home and around the world. A global network of Rotarians invest their time, money, and expertise into Foundation priorities, such as eradicating polio and promoting peace. Foundation grants empower Rotarians to approach challenges such as poverty, illiteracy, and malnutrition with sustainable solutions that leave a lasting impact. Richard then called on Peter Peters to provide us with information about the Foundation.

The Rotary Foundation (TRF) was established in 1917. The power of TRF and Rotarians has been demonstrated countless times over the nearly one hundred years but one of the most memorable ongoing programs has been the Polio Eradication program started in 1985. Peter noted at that time nearly 1000 people died from polio a day (350,000 per year). Today less than 200 die in a year. Other programs that have had a profound global impact are water programs, peace and conflict resolution initiatives, healthcare, schools and literacy projects.



Leo Ell then came to the podium to advise us how we can contribute to the Rotary Foundation. When \$US1000 is contributed to The Rotary Foundation, a request can be made for an individual to be recognised as a Paul Harris Fellow; that person can be a Rotarian or a member of the community who is not a Rotarian.





When a person is recognised as a Paul Harris Fellow, they are presented with a Certificate signed by the Rotary International President and the Chairman of the Trustees of The Rotary Foundation, and a lapel pin and medallion. The contribution to The Rotary Foundation can be made in one sum or by cumulative giving over a number of years. Individuals can make a personal contribution or the contribution can be from a club, a company or business. Other levels of contribution are: A Bequest Society member, when you give \$10,000 or more via your estate plans. Major Donor, when your cumulative donations reach \$10,000. Announcements:

Lyle Gollnick reminded us of the Community Services "Gift of Warmth" project on behalf of mental health clients. The committee will collect warm clothing over the next week and distribute to Regina Mental Health. The Salvation Army Kettles projects needs 7 more volunteers. Vocational Services project: This Committee will accept nominations for a Service Above Self Award. Nominations are open from November to the end of December. Rotarians and their families are not eligible. It is open to people in the Regina Community who have excelled in providing service to their community. A one to two page nomination letter should be submitted. Nelson Falkowsky is the contact person for this project. The successful candidate will be presented the award at the Valentine Gala in February 2016.

The Adventures in Agriculture program for 2015 completed last weekend. It was a great success and 16 students attended. Nelson Falkowsky gleaned some interesting observations from personal stories from the students, their application information and their final speeches. He noted that the main concerns of the students were as follows: 50% are concerned that more young people are not seeking a career in agriculture; many are in favor of the Trans Pacific Partnership and 31% are concerned about the high cost of farming while only 19% are concerned about climate change. Peter Peters noted that A in A is a "big deal" for our Club and is our signature project. It was disappointing to the organizers that few Eastviewians were present to hear the Sunday morning speeches. Peter further noted that these students are a powerful group of young people with a powerful language and passion for agriculture. He thanked members for hosting the students.

Hams will be distributed next Tuesday (December 8) beginning at 8-30 AM. John Van Koll requests help in boxing and distributing the hams.

President Ron noted that Laurel Mattison has been approved by the Board for membership in the Rotary Club of Regina Eastview. Laurel is sponsored by Gord Wicijowski. She operates the "Hiring Hands" Employment Agency. If there are any concerns with this nomination please see President Ron.
