<u>New Member Induction</u> – President John called on Laurel Mattison, Chair of the Club's Membership Committee, Shreedhar Jachak sponsor, and new member designate Govind Patel to join him at the podium.





Shreedhar provided a brief introduction of his candidate indicating he has only known Govind for a few months but in this time has sensed a spirit in his new friend that would be consistent with Rotary characteristics including a desire to join Rotary. Govind came to Canada in May of 2006 where his daughter now lives and from the first day it, "changed his life". He came to Regina some months ago and it is here that he has a son and grandson. He has formed a senior centre in Regina called Indo-Can Seniors Inc. and this is where he spends a good portion of his time. We will learn more from Govind when he makes his "This is My Life" presentation.

In her Induction remarks, Laurel welcomed Govind Patel by indicating that members of Regina Eastview, to a person, "believe you to be a leader in your vocation and because you manifest those qualities of head and of heart which will convey the message of Rotary to those with whom you come in contact". Laurel referenced the Object of Rotary touching on the four points foundational to its stated principle. She charged Govind, and all gathered Rotarians, that we

should judge ourselves by the dictates of the Four-Way Test and live so we can say "yes" with confidence to each of the four questions posed. She concluded by reminding us all that the privilege of membership in Rotary carries with high expectations in terms of involvement and participation in the affairs of the Club. Having concluded with the induction, Laurel welcomed Govind into the Rotary Club of Regina Eastview.

President John presented our newest member with membership material and Rotary pin. Govind Patel was loaned the classification of *Founder – Director*. Laurel invited members to line up and welcome Govind into Rotary.



Family of Rotary – Gail Bradley told us she had a most delightful visit with Rotarian Allan Smith this past week. Allan, who is able to see Beth each week, gets around his residence very well and would enjoy visits from his Eastview friends.



PROGRAM

President John noted we would experience a "two piece program" and invited Ann Grahame to introduce Thomas Van Der Maren who was "Part 1". Ann indicated that our In-Bound exchange Student Thomas left his family and his homeland, Belgium and journeyed to Canada in August to spend nearly a whole year away from the familiarity of "home". He moved out of his "comfort zone" and allowed himself to become a stranger in a new land.



Thomas introduced us to Belgium using power point slides. He agreed with Ann's observation that in coming to Canada he was out of his comfort zone. While he has

missed home, he believes not nearly as much as his Mother has missed him. He is sad that field hockey has been discontinued in Regina as it is his favourite sport and so far he has not been outfitted to play ice hockey.

We learned that the northern portion of Belgium is Dutch speaking, while the southern "half" is French speaking – there are not necessarily friends - and there are small components of German speaking citizens on the east side of the country (acquired from

Germany as part of WWII settlement). Belgium's land mass is a fraction of Canada's land mass although in terms of population Canada has 4 people / KM2 where Belgium has 372/KM2.

Thomas observed some unique differences in our two countries. For example, in his view, "respect, is a quality if you wish to earn it, you must show it" and it is better demonstrated in Canada than in Belgium. Additionally, he sees school instruction more supportive of assisting students who are struggling here.



Favorite sports in Belgium are field hockey and soccer, which seemingly from his vantage point trumps "football – CFL style". There seems to be some confusion in regard to food – Belgium waffles are favoured here but are not really a big deal in Belgium. On the other hand do not refer to "fries" as "French fries", this delicacy is a Belgium creation. There is of course nothing in the chocolate world that can match Belgium Chocolate.

The Peeing Boy statue is a must see when in Belgium; additionally, the Atomium is the most popular attraction in Brussels.

Program Part 2 – This is my Life with Barry Strohan

Barry Strohan told us that he was born and in Prince Albert, Saskatchewan, but the family moved to Calgary, where he received most of his schooling. The family moved to Regina in 1965 where his initial employment was with the Regina Leader Post, followed for some time with CKRM Radio. After these experiences Barry joined his father in the Jewellery business in 1969, a vocation he continued until six months ago when he "retired". Barry spoke about his leadership involvement with the professional Jewellery Associations at both the Provincial and National levels.



In 1970 he met his wife Shirley, a physiotherapist at the Regina General Hospital. They were married in 1971 and are the parents of 2 successful daughters and have the joy of two granddaughters.

Barry was introduced into Rotary by former Eastviewian, Dave Shaffer, who remains a good friend. Barry served as President of Regina Eastview in 1998-99, adding stability to the club after a year of many changes in the organization during Victoria Radons Presidency. He recalled the major activities happened around running Bars at Agribition, Past President Garden parties and Valentine Gala events as high lights which he and Shirley enjoyed.
