

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

Program: Doug Archer and Tracey Schick Sparrowhawk came to the podium to introduce our guest speakers. Doug introduced Angela Prawzick, Public Education Officer, with the Regina Fire and Protective Services. Angela has worked with many community groups, including Rotary, since she was hired in October 1994. She says that over the years she has been trying to work herself out of a job by showing people how to prevent fires from happening in the first place. Tracey introduced Candace Giblett, public education officer, who works with



many community groups to educate about fire prevention.

Angela showed pictures of the Paddock fire about 15 years ago which was the first fire where the fire personel used the thermal imaging cameras that were donated by Eastview. The camera has changed over the years but is a key component in the fire fighting equipment used today.

Candace noted that in addition to fighting fires, Regina Fire and Protective Services (RFPS) provide investigative services at all fires; attend to medical emergencies; operate the Jaws of Life when needed in accidents; water and ice rescue services; chemical emergencies; and regular

inspection services in public buildings. Each member of the RFPS goes into the community one day a year to provide public education.

Regina has one of the best response teams in North America which is within 4 minutes or less of a 911 call. It takes 3 minutes for a house to become unlivable due to fire. While the RFPS is there to help us we are in charge of our own safety from fire. There are many causes of fires including: deliberately set fires, electrical fires, fires due to smoking which is the leading cause of fatalities due to fire, and careless cooking which is the leading cause of fire in Regina. Fires are also caused by inappropriate use of space heaters, barbecues, electrical cords, clothes dryers, and Christmas trees.

In 2001 there were 257 structural fires while in 2014 there were 167 structural fires. The Department attributes the decline in fires to their public education program. In 2003 there were 42 house fires started by children playing with matches or lighters and in 2014 only 4 fires were caused in this same way. Again the Public Education program is working.

RFPS tells us that we need to remember the following:

- Stay in the kitchen when cooking and do not cook when tired.
- Slide a lid over a pan that is being used on the stove.
- If you have a fire, GET OUT OF THE BUILDING, and then CALL 911.
- Keep the stove and furnace areas clear of flammable materials.
- Keep children away from the stove.
- Test your smoke alarm regularly. They have a life of about 10 years.

- When you leave a building due to fire, shut the door behind you.
- Have a meeting place outside.

President Ron thanked the women for their presentation and presented each with a small gift in appreciation.

Sick and Visiting: Lillian Pettigrew, widow of former member, George Pettigrew is in hospital. Best wishes, Lillian, for a speedy recovery.

Announcements: Allen Hillsden thanked the Gala Committee and the volunteers for their work over the past year. He also announced that the Harvest City Church will be holding a silent auction from 7-9 PM on Saturday evening (Feb. 20) in support of the work of the Church.

President Ron also expressed his thanks to the Gala Committee and volunteers who worked hard to make the Gala a success. 260 people attended the Gala.

Pesident Ron announced that Joseph Mburu has been approved by the Board for membership in Eastview. Joseph is a Professor at the University of Regina. If anyone has any concerns please speak to President Ron. It is anticipated that Joseph will be inducted in the next few weeks.

Their website notes the following: "Regina Fire & Protective Services is a dynamic, highly-trained and competent team that responds to more than 9,000 service incidents annually, including: fire suppression; technical rescue; hazardous material (hazmat); and emergency medical services (EMS). Other key services are fire prevention; public education and information; and emergency preparedness and awareness. Our staff members are dedicated and knowledgeable and this transfers into a safe community for residents. We operate 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Our team responds to an area of 187 sq. km., going beyond civic boundaries, covered by service agreements with

affected municipalities."
