
ANNOUNCEMENTS

Just about the time President Ron was ready to close the meeting it was learned there was more. Two "This is my life" presentations were scheduled – first from a new Rotarian, Laurel Mattison, and, the second from a member with years of Rotary experience, Doug Mortin.

Laurel has her own employment agency, Hiring Hands Employment and Recruiting Services, supplying



temporary workers to companies largely in construction. She has a number of clients and in her history in Regina has employed over 2000 people. The goal of her Agency is "That my clients will prosper". Laurel speaks of having setbacks, but with each such event she receives further inspiration knowing God will see her through.

2015 was her best year and she is looking forward to bigger things in 2016 and beyond.

Laurel told us that Gord Wicijowski was her first boss, and she was delighted that after some 40 years she reconnected with one of her first mentors. She expressed her appreciation to members for their warm welcome into Rotary.

Doug Mortin told us that he was born and raised on a farm in Dilke, Saskatchewan. He shared about his years in the Insurance business, a business – mostly in Regina, but also a stint in Melville. After a time he and two

colleagues left Co-operators and established their own Insurance Brokerage agency, MGP Insurance. After 20 years of dedicated service to clients, they sold the business to Scott Schultz, who we learned has become part of another well know Insurance Agency.

Rotary became part of the Mortin's life in 1992 when their oldest daughter was selected as a Rotary Youth Exchange Student. They spent many years providing support and leadership to the Club and District's Youth Exchange program, which saw both their daughters involved in the program. Doug served as President of Regina Eastview in 1999-2000 and was selected as District Governor in 2005-2006.

His concluding advice was, "Say "YES" to opportunities in Rotary", for these are experiences you will not regret.
