INTRODUCTION OF SPEAKER

Doug Archer was then called forward to introduce today's speaker, Ron Okumura., who was born and grew up in Winnipeg, Manitoba. He loves sports and played football, baseball, hockey, volleyball, curling and golf as a youth and still enjoys curling and golfing.

Ron attended the University of Manitoba and graduated with a Bachelor of Architecture degree in 1970. After graduating, Ron worked in Winnipeg and later in Calgary.

In 1983, Ron moved to Regina where he worked with several firms as a partner and later started his own firm. Ron has worked on many projects in Saskatchewan such as the Wolseley Nursing Home, Providence Place in Moose Jaw, and Transition House in Regina.

Ron is a member of the City of Regina Planning Commission, a member of RAIC, a member and former councillor of the SAA and former chair of the Regina Chapter of CSC. He is a member of First Presbyterian Church and has been married to his wife, Mary, for 32 years.

PROGRAM

Ron started his program by thanking the members of the Rotary Club of Regina Eastview for giving him and Mary the opportunity to attend the Rotary International Convention in Sao Paulo, Brazil. It was a wonderful experience.

The flight from Toronto to Sao Paulo took 10 hours. Ron and Mary arrived at Guarulhos International Airport, Sao Paulo on June 4, 2015. We were shown photographs of the Airport building which is very modern and very large, so that people movers were necessary to get the passengers from the Gates to the Baggage areas. After a taxi ride which took about 45 minutes they arrived at the Mercure Sao Paulo Principe Hotel in the upscale Moema District. Although the hotel was surrounded by high-rise buildings, Ron was impressed by the amount of greenery to be seen, with trees and lush vegetation between the buildings. All the condos. and apartment blocks were surrounded by high iron-paling fences and gates. There were a few smaller buildings, like cornerstores, interspersed between the tall ones! The population of Sao Paulo is 12 million; although it was winter there the temperature was very pleasant, in the mid-20s. The hotel was a 30-minute shuttle-bus ride from the Anhembi Convention Centre. Rotary had laid on shuttle buses from all 10 hotel zones in the city. When the buses arrived at the Convention Centre drop-off the attendees were greeted by Rotarian Sergeants-at-Arms, and more were spread out along the 10-minute walk to the Centre itself. This was a huge building, 4 million square feet indoors and another million square feet of landscaped area, including a water-feature, outside. The centre itself was divided into three main areas, the Entrance Hall, the Registration area and the House of Friendship. There were over 14,000 attendees; the area where the plenary sessions were held holds 15,000!

The House of Friendship was <u>huge!</u> There were celebrations of Brazilian culture, with dancing, other entertainment, and food. There was a Rotary Marketplace, a Resource Centre, booths for the Rotary Action Groups, and 4 ShelterBox tents had been erected!

Attendees could send packaged foods out to the poor living in the city; over 100,000 were sent out during the course of the Convention! There was an area where one could obtain information about the 2016 RI Convention, to be held in Seoul, S. Korea, and pre-register for that!

There was also an enormous area where one could purchase snacks and light meals, which became very crowded! Plenary sessions and Rotary luncheons, and Breakout sessions, which included presentations, small-group sessions, workshops and discussions were held. There were also Host Events and a Carnival Parade.

There were 14,500 attendees from over 200 countries at the opening Plenary session, where the R.I. President made a presentation. In addition to Speakers of International renown, major project updates, and personal Rotary stories, there was also entertainment. It was emphasized that there are currently 1.2 million Rotarians worldwide, (which shows a slight increase), and 34,000 Rotary Clubs. Rotary International is ranked as one of the top 3 charitable organizations in the USA.

The speeches are all online through Rotary Club Central, and Ron really recommends that we should visit this site. Past Rotarians include President J. F. Kennedy, Martin Luther King and Sir Winston Churchill.

Ron and Mary attended the President's Recognition Luncheon, and although they were in an overflow room, there was a huge screen on which they could watch the presentations from those at the Head Table They really enjoyed meeting other Rotarians from all over the world, who were seated with them.

The quality of the Breakout sessions was outstanding, and Ron attended those on Youth and Young Leaders. The Rotaractors emphasized that they didn't just want to be parking valets and coat-check people at Rotary functions, but want to be part of Rotary and involved in shaping policy. Ron also attended sessions on Strong Clubs and Districts, and on the Rotary Foundation.

There was a special Rotary Carnival Parade, which was a duplicate of the Carnival Parade held in March, put on just for the Rotary Convention! The city is dotted with special stadia and stands just for Carnival!

Ron and Mary spent a few days exploring the city of Sao Paulo after the convention, and saw the business Centre, City Centre Square, the Cathedral, the Market, the Metro Station, (which the photo showed to be <u>most</u> impressive), and Japan Town. Although the population of Sao Paulo is 12 million, there are 15 million in the greater Sao Paulo area, of whom 800,000 are Japanese. There were extensive slum areas, visible on the drive from and to the Airport.

Ron and Mary then visited Rio de Janeiro where there were historic buildings and beautiful beaches right in the city.

Presentation: President Ron then called Lyle Gollnick to the podium and presented him with his Director's badge. Lyle has graciously consented to be the Director of Community Service, 2015 - 2017.

Banner Exchange: Gary and Jessie Carlson had recently visited Ireland, and had attended a meeting of the Rotary Club of Dublin Central. This is quite a new, small club; of the 15 members present, 10 were women, compared to 5 men.

COMMENTARY

Rotary Riders Raise Funds for the Ripple Effect Schools in Guatemala: Starting at 8:30 am. on Saturday,

July 25, 2015, Peter Neufeldt and Doug Mortin led 11 motorcycles and 13 riders, plus a '41 Plymouth, on a very successful 386 kilometre ride via Moose Jaw. Sukanen Museum, Assiniboia, (Shurniak Gallery, plus some members of the Rotary Club of Assiniboia came out to meet them), Pangman and home on a sunny 34-plus degree Celsius day. It wrapped up with a BBQ at the home of Peter Neufeldt, where the participants, included PDG Chernesky and her partner, Fred Olfert from Nipawin, Rotarians from Sioux Lookout, ON. one from Dryden, ON, one from Grand Cayman and eight



locals), for attending and donating in excess of \$9,000 in sponsor funds to our District's Ripple Effect program.

Treasurer Wally Dressler reminded members that their Annual Club dues are due NOW.
