portion of his time – it would appear Leo Ell had received has "portion".


In Rotary JULY is: "Start of New Rotary Officers Year of Service"



PROGRAM

President Greg introduced our guest speaker Tiffany Krease, Lead Program Manager of Shania Kids Can in Regina. In 2015 Shania Twain came to Regina and launched her Kids Can Clubhouse at the Judge Bryant Elementary School. Today we had the good fortune to have Tiffany as our guest to tell us about this challenging initiative.

In her introduction Tiffany indicated that Shania Twain had a challenging childhood and in the process of facing those challenges, she committed herself to helping students that were in situations similar to some she experienced in her home and community. The Program is made possible through the work of and support of The Dilawri Foundation.

In keeping with the founder's vision, students come from troubled homes with a low socio-economic status. Staff work directly with students providing help working on academic, social and personal goals. Geared toward underprivileged kids, "the program is a kind of last step before social services intervention. It provides before and after school support and activities, fresh food, life and personal skills training, and academic support."




Here are some of the things we learned about the Program:

- The Program has a 4-point "Solution": i) Provide students with SKILLS to overcome challenges and improve student ability to function in school; ii) provide a SAFE PLACE to go for help; iii) Maximize students OPPORTUNITY to obtain multi-level support; and iv) Implement the "SKC CLUBHOUSE" idea to provide a safe confidence building environment where learning and growth are achieved.
- The Program overview has four components
 - o Selection of an appropriate school for the SKC Program
 - o Transform a classroom into a new SKC Clubhouse
 - o Kids receive support in the Clubhouse academic, nutritional, therapeutic and extra-curricular

- o Kids are given a chance for success in life (because of support from the Program)
- Educators have credited the SKC program with behavioural turnaround and 100% improvement in many children from start to end of the school year
- Patricia Chertow, Principal of the Shumacher Public Shool In Shania's home town of Timmons, Ontario observed "Our Students that participate in the Shania Kids Can program benefit greatly from the support they receive on a daily basis. The program is an essential part of their school dayin fact it's a lifeline for many of our students."
- In addition to Regina, SKC schools now exist in Brampton, ON; Calgary, AB; Las Vegas, NV; Surrey BC; and, Timmons. ON.
- The top 10 issues SKC Students face are:
 - o Difficult socializing with peers;
 - Lack of funds for extra-curricular activities and field trips;
 - Anxiety or sadness;
 - o Difficult with school curriculum;
 - o Arrive at school hungry, or without lunches or snacks;
 - Single parent home;
 - o Lethargic;
 - o Bullied or stigmatized;
 - o Little supervision outside of school;
 - Disregard for hygiene.
- Faced with these challenges the Program can boast the following improvement statistics from September 2015 to June 2016:
 - o 72% increase in positive attitude towards school;
 - o 65% improved Mental Health;
 - o 60% Physical Health Improved;
 - o 65% Decrease in Poor Hygiene;
 - o 75% Improvement in Social Behaviour.
- Financial support goes toward a host of initiatives including:
 - o Full time staff support;
 - o Furnish and equip program space;
 - o Food & hygiene supplies;
 - o Recreation program and equipment;
 - Support various specialists;
 - o Teach kids practical life and social skills;
 - o Provide mentorship opportunities;
 - O Support plans to assist students transitioning between schools.
- Participation in the program is voluntary;
- Focus is on children in grades 3 to 6;





Tiffany concluded her presentation with this quote: "Children in the Shania Kids Can program are more confident, happier, and healthier and participate more in class. They are finding new passions, developing new goals and envisioning brighter futures thanks to the help and caring support of SKC."

President Greg thanked Tiffany for her presentation and presented her with the gift of the year.
