There were a number of visiting Rotarians from the Rotary Clubs of Regina, Oskaya, and Industrial Park.



Program: Louis Browne, former Councillor and colleague of Mayor Fougere, came to the podium to introduce the Mayor. Louis reported that the Mayor had been a mentor to him and advised him that it is the second re-election that is the most important. The Mayor is a graduate of Xavier University and of the London School of Economics. He is supported in life by wife, Cindy, and 3 children.

The Mayor spoke to Louis Browne's tenacity, drive and passion for the city. He also complemented Ted



Turner from the Rotary Club of Regina on his and his club's efforts to give back to the city and in particular noted their support for Souls Harbor Mission.

THE STATE OF THE CITY: The Mayor reported that there are 6 returning councillors and 4 new ones. He appreciates the support of the citizens of Regina for his re-election.

Current issues for Council include: infrastructure, important for quality of life. Fixing roads—1% of our taxes go to fixing roads. The Railyard Renewal Initiative is huge and will have an impact on housing and homelessness. Meetings are going on with

residents to determine how the area should be developed. There

will be a pedway over the railroad tracks from Dewdney Avenue to downtown. Possibilities include a park, shops, highrise residential area, farmers' market. Decisions will be made in the future by the community and the city. The College Avenue Campus renewal is an important project and has resulted in these beautiful buildings being preserved. Darke Hall is being renovated along with the College Building. This effort has been a successful partnership between the University of



Regina, the City of Regina, the Federal Government and Conexus. Generations to come will continue to enjoy this historical area of the city.

Taylor Field will be redeveloped once the old stadium has been decommissioned. This will accommodate a new residential area which will connect with North Central. The Mayor noted that the goal for the city is to house and provide infrastructure for 300,000 people. Regina is one of the fastest growing cities in Canada. The Mayor closed his presentation saying that today Regina is a fantastic city with growth and opportunity in many areas. The sky is the limit!

President Greg thanked the Mayor and presented to him the blue Rotary bag and encouraged him to carry it with him at City Hall and remind people about the best Rotary Club in Regina—Eastview! The Mayor promised he would do that!



President Greg invited Eastview's **Outbound Exchange Student**, **Brigid Malloy**, to the podium to talk about a fundraiser in which she and a number of students from her school are taking part. They are going to Costa Rica during the Easter break. They are selling chocolates to raise money to take supplies to a school in Costa Rica. Many Rotarians generously contributed to her cause.

Brigid also reported that she will be going to Brazil for her exchange. She has not yet received details about her trip but is very excited. One only has to speak with Brigid for a short time to know that she will be a wonderful ambassador for Rotary, for Regina, and for the country. We will hear more from Brigid. She also was gifted the blue Rotary bag

and instructed by the President to carry it around her school and speak about Eastview whenever the opportunity arises. You have to give Greg credit. He uses every opportunity to promote Eastview!

A ROTARY MOMENT

Among the visiting Rotarians today was Ted Turner, a long time member of the Rotary Club of Regina, the oldest Rotary Club in Regina. This Club will be 100 years old on August 24,



2017. On August 25 this year the Club is hosting a Gala event at the Conexus Art Center to celebrate this milestone. Ted tells the story that the Rotary Club of Saskatoon is older than the Rotary Club of Regina—by one day!. Their 100th birthday is on August 23, 2017.
