PROGRAM

Gord Wicijowski was called on to Introduce our guest speaker Todd Lumbard and his technical associate Mark Rathwell. In his introduction Gord noted that Todd is not a stranger to Regina Eastview having been a member of the Club when the Lumbard's first moved to Regina. Todd was born and raised in Brandon, Manitoba. Todd had an initial career in Professional hockey beginning as a goal tender with the Brandon Wheat Kings and also the Regina Pats. He was drafted to the New York Islanders in 1981 and played 3 seasons in the farm system of the Islanders, with a short stint in the NHL in 1985. After hockey he joined the family Funeral business in Brandon which expanded to Regina in 2004 with the purchase

of Speers Funeral Chapel. In 2014 Todd was part of a local group that purchased the Regina Pats, which was the topic of his presentation today.



In his introductory comments, Todd spoke about the honour it was to be associated with the Regina Pats, and the privilege he had to be part of the 5 person ownership group. The Regina Pats are the oldest major junior hockey franchise in the world that have continuously operated from their original location and use the same name. They began operations in 1917. They were originally named the Patricias, after Princess Patricia of Connaught. The team name was also associated with Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry, and it was noted the Pats sweaters still bear the regimental badge and "PPCLI" flash as a shoulder patch. In 1923, the team's name was shortened to the Pats.

There are 22 teams in the WHL and every second year they go to play teams, one year in British Columbia and the next year in the Western USA. Their players are between 16 and 20 years old, are aspiring to be hockey players, and while playing for the Pats, are billeted in Regina homes. The end desire prize of all teams in the league is to capture the Memorial Cup, an honour achieved by the Pats on 3 occasions, the last time in 1974. The Memorial Cup the hardest Cup to win!







Since acquiring the Pats, the owners have worked hard on plans to make the team the pride of the players and the fans. Part of strengthening the Pats image and Regina as a hockey centre, the Club installed the new Clock in the Brandt Centre, a class addition to the arena. Todd indicated that there are two sides to the Pats organization – there is the "business" side and there is the "hockey" side. The latter side is the responsibility of Coach John Paddock, a man with expansive credentials. The team has 17 Scouts who look for players in Western Canada and in the western US.

Tomorrow they start the playoffs in Lethbridge against the Hurricanes. The Pats have the 2nd youngest team in the league, but are going into the series with the Hurricanes with an upbeat positive attitude. They are also well positioned for next year as 20 of their current players will be part of the Pats in the 2016-2017 season. When players graduate from the WHL they are eligible to have the cost of their post-secondary education covered – Canadians for Canadian based institutions and US players in US Institutions.



Todd concluded his presentation by providing us with a glimpse of the Owners expectation of the players by saying, "It is not preform or else!" Rather it is a nurturing environment which recognizes that they have good kids, which, with the support of good coaches, they are about developing into good people.

President Ron expressed our collective thanks and appreciation to Todd and Mark for a glimpse into the life of the Regina Pats.
