## **PROGRAM**

Peter Peters was called on to introduce our Guest Speaker, Lisa Smith, Director of Development of the MS Society of Canada - Saskatchewan Division, a role she has held for nearly 10 years. For almost 30 years Lisa has worked within non-profit sector, where she learned and has valued the importance of relationship building and stewardship with clients, partners, donors and sponsors. It is this learning Lisa has put to good use in leading the Provinces MS Team on their successful bid to raise a yearly \$1.6 Million for programs, services and research, the former for the 3700+ people in the province with the disease, and the latter for cutting edge research in Canada.

This is what we learned from Lisa Smith as she covered three main topic areas:

- 1. What is Multiple Sclerosis:
  - a. It is a neurological disease;
  - b. "a chronic, typically progressive disease involving damage to the sheaths of nerve cells in the brain and spinal cord, whose symptoms may include numbness, impairment of speech and of muscular coordination, blurred vision, and severe fatigue." Website



- c. "Oct 20, 2016 Multiple sclerosis, or MS, is a long-lasting disease that can affect your brain, spinal cord, and the optic nerves in your eyes. It can cause problems with vision, balance, muscle control, and other basic body functions. The effects are often different for everyone who has the disease." Website
- d. It is Canada's disease and there are a number of research projects that are looking at why this is so;
- e. Low levels of Vitamin D are deemed to be contributing factors;
- f. Persons as young as 2 years of age have been diagnosed with MS, although generally people are diagnosed when they are between the age of 15 and 40 years of age;
- g. Women are three times more likely to be diagnosed with MS than men;
- h. 20 years ago there were no drug therapies for patients;
- i. New oral medication has been a great improvement in therapy, because before this treatment was by injection;
- j. Two women researchers have joined the MS Research team at the U of S in Saskatoon;
- k. Three major grants were awarded recently by MS Canada, two of these researchers are in Saskatoon;
- 1. Without saying so specifically, Lisa expressed appreciation to Rotary members for the support they have provided to the MS program through support offered through *Peters' Pedalers Plus*.
- 2. Fund Raising Events which Lisa discussed:
  - a. Blue Cross MS Walks the Saskatchewan Division sponsor 11 Walks originating from the large centres in the province with the exception of the powerful little group in Eastend where they raise at least \$30,000.00 each year;
  - b. K + S Bike Tours there are two Tours held annually in the province one in southern Saskatchewan and the second in Waskesiu in Prince Albert National Park;
- 3. Why it is exciting to be part of the MS Team at this time:
  - a. There is promising and exciting research being undertaken in Canada and certainly in Saskatchewan;
  - b. Canada contributed \$1 million to determine the effectiveness of the "liberation" treatment highlighted by Dr. Zamboni;
  - c. In 2019 Canada will be readjusting the funding ratio between program and services on one hand and research on the other. Shift will increase the research amount from 50% to 60% while reducing the programs and services from 50 to 40%
  - d. Recently announced two MS Neurologist have been recruited to Saskatoon Dr. Michael Levine in the role as MS Chair for a 7 year term \$8.4 million budget the second physician will serve as the Clinic Director.
  - e. Stem cell therapy research is underway in Ontario and Quebec.

Lisa Smith, a dedicated MS leader, was appropriately thanked by PP Ron who did a fine job of demonstrating the distinguishing features of the multi-use insulated grocery bag.

#### **<u>ROTARY TIDBIT</u>** ShelterBox Canada News Release March 9, 2017

**ShelterBox teams prepare following Cyclone Enawo** - A ShelterBox team is being put together to deploy to **Madagascar** in the wake of Tropical Cyclone Enawo as it made landfall on Tuesday March 7. Enawo is the strongest cyclone in 13 years to impact the country and landed as the equivalent of a Category 4 hurricane.



Winds were between 230-270 kilometres per hour and the resulting rains are expected to cause flash flooding and mudslides throughout the rest of the week.

According to the Malagasy Red Cross, approximately 720,000 people will be affected directly and indirectly by this intense tropical cyclone. Meteo Madagascar has issued a red alert for the northeast coastal areas of Madagascar, advising residents to abandon houses on water edges, store drinking water and seek shelter in a safe building.

Footage has started to emerge following Cyclone

Enawo's landfall in Madagascar, however, communications are likely severed as a result of the storm so the full extent of damage is not yet known.
