PROGRAM

Jack Wozniak was called on to introduce guest speaker Chris Lane, CEO of Canadian Western Agribition in Regina. Jack told us that Chris came to Agribition after a 15 year career with CBC Television News as Producer of both local and national programs. Born and raised in Northern Alberta and earned a university degree in Journalism and Communications. Chris has worked in 5 Canadian Provinces and in London, England. "Along the way he has picked up two Gemini Wards for his work in journalism". While



there may appear a significant shift from "media" to "agriculture", Chris sees this more as the transfer of skills and core competencies within business – and it was this message he shared today.



This is what we learned from Chris Lane:

- He grew up in a home and community where there was a commitment to "service" and as his father was a Rotarian, being in today's meeting was a remembered experience;
- In looking at relocating from the CBC to the Agribition was not a major shift in what to do what changes is the product not the process;
- Leadership in business is about means that when one moves into a new world, one leaves behind the "tasks" and you carry on with the skills you had earlier and those developed at the previous business;

- Whether on is at the CBC or at Agribition it is about executing the "plan" and when that is clear, the process of managing is virtually constant;
- The "core competency' at Agribition is a matter of matching people matching the "buyers" and the "sellers". In this context, Chris used H & R Block as an example H & R were wrestling with growth strategy. Once they slipped out of the rut of seeing themselves as tax preparers and recognized that their "core competency' was delivering "goods" through the use of a temporary work force, there horizon became almost boundless'
- To Agribition "growth" would include the following;
 - o Community building;
 - o Attract, facilitate interaction;
 - o Host Aboriginal leaders in recognizing and cultivating their potential;
 - o Hosting major grain grower interactive learning sessions.
- They take their community partner role seriously and have seen significant moves in the past year;
 - o Last year 8,000 school children attended Agribition as part of their school class;
 - o Agribition involvement with 4H is expanding;
 - They are involved with Hopes Home;
 - o STARS is a new partnership for the Agribition
- With success comes responsibility and you will see us in the community more in the future;
- One of their biggest contributions will be to coordinate opportunities,
 e.g. addressing food production and security, to get the right groups of people into the room.

Doug Mortin expressed the Club's appreciation for the support our Club's *Adventures in Agriculture* program received from Chris personally and from the larger Agribition organization over the years and most particularly last year. We are honored to be working with such a forward looking organization and trust this will continue for many years.



ROTARY TIDBIT

It was the Club's Community Service Committee's turn to be in the lime light as they made a two major donations to community initiatives.



The first was to the Regina Public Library where the Club offered financial support to the Library's Early Learning Mother Goose Outreach Program which is delivered in five sites in Regina. In this case Community Service Director Lyle Gollnick presented Wanda Blake with a cheque for \$500.00 to assist in this initiative.

The second donation was to the Canadian Mental Health Association, an organization which has for

DISTRICT CONFERENCE 2018
