PROGRAM

Doug Mortin was provided with the privilege of introducing his daughter-in-law, Angie Wager our Guest



Speaker. In his comments Doug noted Angie has a 19 year career in the field of emergency communication, which began with Regina EMS and moved to Regina Police Service in 2001. Her work includes call taking, dispatching, being relief supervisor and a training officer and extends to being the civilian coordinator of the Regina Police Service Critical Incident Stress Management Team. Angie is an Instructor and in this role trains the team in Peer and Group Crisis Intervention, runs debriefings for all members of these teams, and is an instructor of the Peer Support Course given to each class of police recruits at the Saskatchewan Police College.

Using power point slides Angie Wagar introduced us to the RPS's 911 Emergency Services and its facilities and the stations which control the work of this vital service in our City. The Regina Police Service Communication Centre has a long history and until 1986 was staffed by police officers when the first civilians were employed. In the fall of 1995, 20 civilians were hired for this service and in January of the following year the unit was fully staffed by civilians.



From those beginnings, the service now consists of a Communication Manager, a Quality

Assurance/Training Coordinator, 4 Communication Supervisors, 28 full time and 9 Casual Communication Officers, Switchboard Operator, a Radio Coordinator and 2 Electronic Technicians. These are the numbers of persons required to staff four 8 person teams for the center's 24 hour operation 365 days each year in order for



them to address an average daily work load that consists of: 468 - administrative telephone calls; 192 - 9-1-1 telephone calls; and, 167 calls for service.

Angie provided details related to the duties associated with "call taking" and dispatching including the significant care taken to ensure the safety of police and emergency medical personnel attending the "scene". We were introduced to what takes place when a person call 9-1-1 which is uniquely different if the call comes from a land line or a cell phone. In the former instance the computer aided dispatch to provide an immediate identified location; in the latter case the location of the call is less precise as the location is defined by telephone tower locations. Once the location is defined by telephone tower with the caller to define the emergency and extent of injury, etc. and ensure the safety of the location and surrounding area. Once these matters are better defined, the call is conveyed to the appropriate authority – police, fire, etc.

Angie also discussed what happens when you call 9-1-1 and hang up. If the call came from a land line and there is no response on a call back, police are dispatched to the address. If the call came from a cell phone, and there were additional suspicious sounds associated with the call specific steps are taken to establish the call location. If a location is pinpointed, officers are dispatched.

We should all be aware that any cell phone that can be powered up, even if it is not on a plan, can be used to call 9-1-1. **THEREFORE**, do not let children play with your old cell phone(s).



Angie concluded her presentation by sharing the reality of what it means to be a Communication Officer. The challenges, stress filled, emotion riddled, up lifting joys that can be fit into one day of dealing with people in the worst of personal circumstances are not for the faint hearted, but have provided her with wonderful life fulfilling experiences.

President Greg thanked Angie and called on Leslie Mortin to present our guest with the best of gifts ever.

A "tip of the hat" to a lady that works 12 hour shifts ensuring the safety of people in Regina. *THANK YOU*, Angie Wager.
