PROGRAM

Pat Dell was called on to introduce our Guest Speaker and her friend Arlene Jorgensen. From Pat we learned that Arlene is, a business owner, occupational health nurse specialist, author, speaking coach, master trainer,

and camp director, Arlene Jorgenson has fifteen plus years experience sharing her wisdom with North American audiences. Arlene's dynamic style, high energy, great sense of humor and practical perspective have created a great demand for her as a keynote speaker and seminar presenter."

Arlene has a degree in Nursing from the U of S, and specialty designation in Occupational Health Nursing; received the North Saskatoon Business Assoc. *Business Excellence Award for Innovation* 2001 and Customer Service in 2003.



She was twice nominated as YWCA Women of Distinction Award for Entrepreneurship; and, earned Distinguished Toastmaster, the highest level of distinction from the Toastmaster organization. Arlene was here to provide an update on the polio eradication program as Chair of District 5550 PolioPlus Program.

From her comments and the sharing of three Rotary Foundation Polio video's Arlene Jorgensen reminded us of the significant progress the international community has made in the polio eradication efforts from 1988 to



2017. Starting with an annual 350,000 polio cases diagnosed in 1988 (and in years previous) to the 22 cases diagnosed in 2017; from 125 endemic countries in 1988 to 3 in 2017 reflects the great strides that have been made. Arlene noted the challenge will be in closing our commitment and eradicating the disease in Afghanistan and Pakistan and ensuring there are no further cases of endemic polio in Nigeria, which has not had a case of wild polio virus diagnosed in the last 18 months. Energy is focused on making it to the three years without a case of wild polio to be certified as a non-endemic country.

We learned Rotarians are no longer invited to participate in *National Immunization Days* as the programs become more focused on move into the harder to reach and more politically volatile areas in Pakistan and Afghanistan. Arlene explained the uniqueness of *Vaccine Derived Polio Virus* which has been diagnosed in the countries of Congo, Syria, Niger, Nigeria, Papua New Guinea and Somalia, and which requires a different treatment regime. The world health community will need to be diligent in seeking out appropriate tools and ways of reaching all children in challenging parts of the world. Arlene referred to the important ideas that have been realized in the polio fight which will have an application in addressing other health issues. Over these three decades important partnerships have developed, significant funds have been raised such as the 2.2 billion

\$'s raised by Rotarians and the billion matched by the Gates foundation, not to mention the financial support provided by Governments.



Arlene shared informative videos which members can access on *My Rotary*.

President John thanked Arlene for her presentation; presented her with the Club's \$2,000.00 cheque for 2018-2019 contribution to PolioPlus; and, gifted her with the insulated grocery bag.



PolioPlus Recognition - PDG Peter Neufeldt reminded members that in



2017-2018 Rotary year, District 5550 was recognized at the International Convention for placing second in Zone 24 for the Zone's outstanding fund raising efforts for PolioPlus. As part of this honor received by the District, Assistant Governor Carole Bryant presented



President John with a Certificate of Appreciation for the contributions Regina Eastview and our members made in achieving this important recognition from TRF.

Regina Eastview Community Service Presentation to Regina Public Library - On behalf of the Club's

Community Service Committee, Sam Berg, presented to Wanda Blake and Nancy MacKenzie with the Club's Cheque for \$1,600.00 to be used in the RPL's Childhood Literacy Project.



Both Wanda and Nancy expressed the Library's appreciation for the Club's ongoing support. Nancy spoke briefly about the RPL's new program which is a partnership of **Police/School/Public**



Library which began in September and will go until May. The program is for a Grade 3 class. This being grade level when children "read to learn" and this program introduces these students to police in a friendly learning environment. Sounds like a fun learning time for all!

This is my Life with Tracey Schick Sparrowhawk – Tracey, quickly traced the highlights of her life. She

touched on important aspects like her husband of 20 years; their 4 daughters between the ages of 12 ½ and 18; the businesses and challenges associated with teenagers and the joy of seeing then graduate from high school. Tracey touched on her career as an Audiologist, and the opportunities this has provided initially in Ontario where they lived for a time. After the fourth child, they realized that visits from family were experienced with the birth of each child and as there were not going to be more children they best move back to Saskatchewan if extended family interactions were to be maintained. In Saskatchewan a brief stint with Saskatchewan Health made her realize this was not her place and she returned to her career as an Audiologist.



She appreciates her membership in Rotary and enjoys the interaction with members and is so impressed with the extent of Rotary's impact locally and around the world.
