Jeff Barber was called on to introduce guest speaker Judith Silverthorne, Writer in Residence with the Regina



Public Library. The Library's Website advises readers, "Judith Silverthorne is an award-winning Saskatchewan writer. She has authored more than a dozen books, many of which are children's novels. She has also written two non-fiction biographical adult books, and has authored extensively as a freelance writer for newspapers and magazines." From Judith's Website one also learns, "Her clients consist of the Saskatchewan Writers' Guild, the Saskatoon School Board, Saskatchewan Festival of Words and Sage Hill Writing Experience, New Media Campus, Pahkisimon Nuye?áh Library System (PNLS) (in northern Saskatchewan communities) and the Oxford Learning Centre. She has also taught Freelance Business Skills in Film and Video class for SIAST (Wascana Campus), and writing classes at the University of Regina, Centre for Continuing Education and the Lifelong

Learning Centre)."

From Judith we learned that as the *Writer in Residence*, she has the wonderful opportunity to write her own material while assisting others to tell their stories. It is about advancing the writing interest and skills opportunities for interested citizens while sharing the terrific store of the *Regina Public Library* and their some

4000 unique programs. Judith encourages the writings of others to become more accomplished, helping them with their personal editing, and fostering creativity, she serves as an inspiration to her "clients". As the *Writer in Residence*, Judith offers "one-to-one assistance with personal writing projects, as well as public readings, literary activities, school and community visits, and programs that focus on serving and supporting the amateur writing community in Regina." By example, every Thursday in November Judith gives "how to" talks at the Library. Assisted by a Resource Care aid, she works with residents of the Wascana Rehabilitation Centre, helping them to tell their story. Judith says being a "writer" tends to be a "solitary" vocation, however, being



the *Writer in Residence* is a most community involved undertaking, which in and of itself keeps her inspired. The range of involvement with "writers" is exceedingly broad, from encouraging creative expression, to insight in the various phases of publishing to critiquing the "writings".

Interestingly, Judith's range of published writings is seemingly broad, which she suggest may be an anomaly. Judith's writings are detailed on her Website at: <u>https://judithsilverthorne.ca/about/</u>

Judith Silverthorne has to be a great addition to the services available through the Regina Public Library, and the Regina community. The "writing" community must be embracing her presence and individually marvelling at the support she provides.
