dedication to "servant leadership", by filling this hardly "President-Electish" task. Together they provided fodder for the Sergeant, or so it was interpreted and reported.



PROGRAM

Sadly Ray Ruth was unwell and could not speak to the Club today and President John searched out a couple of options. For Part 1, Jack Wozniak was invited to provide an update on *Adventures in Agriculture 2018*.

Jack noted we have received 20 applications, with the off chance of getting one more. He expressed his appreciation for the Rotarians who have dedicated energy to hosting another successful *Adventure*. Laurel Mattison and Shannon Windrim have assumed responsibility for the Bus transportation component; Jeff Barber



has "automated" the registration process which presented some challenges but these were ironed out successfully. Doug Mortin has continued to search out billet homes for the students. Ann Grahame is providing valuable administrative assistance in creating certificates, place cards, etc. Ron Okumura has arranged speakers and MC's for the various events. Peter Peters has assisted by drafting letters to Government officials and new sponsors. Jack himself took on responsibility of searching out sponsors – all last year's sponsors are back this year and he is hopeful that a few new

sponsors can be enticed to come to one of the dinner events to gain an understanding of how they might participate in the program. Jack advised Russell Shoeman would not be available to be our photographer this year as he suffered a slight stroke.

He concluded by inviting attendance at the Sunday morning student presentations at the Delta. They would hopefully stay for the lunch, for which there would be a charge in view of the deficit experienced last year.

For Part 2, President John invited Peter Peters, Chair of the Club's International Service Projects Committee to provide an up date on the Committees activities.

Peter touched on the steps taken to fulfill the Club's financial commitment to ShelterBox Canada and to PolioPlus. He invited members to provide their personal donations to these 2 major Rotary supported

endeavours. He noted that the Washroom Enhancement Project at the Xolhuitz school, along with digging a well to provide a consistent water supply for washrooms and for the kitchen, is well underway, with the well digging being successful. This \$6,000.00 project is supported by a \$2,500.00 District Grant.

As mentioned last week, TRF has approved the Global Grant application to enstall 17 computers in each of 20 schools in Guatemala in partnership with the RC of Guatemala Oeste and the Funsepa Foundation, the supplier and installer of the computers, and educator of the teachers.



Regina Eastview is currently waiting for instructions on sending money to the project. This \$99,000.00 project requires Regina Eastview to contribute approximately \$20,000.00 to the project.

Peter concluded his report by referring to the Committee's meeting before lunch today when they approved a further Ripple Effect Project in Guatemala. This is a Kitchen Project at the Sector Aguilar El Asintal School in partnership with the Rotary Club of Retalhuleu. Regina Eastview was involved with this school a number of years ago and it now requires an enhanced kitchen for the 240 enrolled students. The estimated cost of the project is \$10,000.00, RC of Regina Eastview portion would be approximately 55%, as the remainder would be assumed by the Local Rotary Club, the community and the donation from a Dement company.

In response to a question Peter spoke about the work of The Rotary Foundation (TRF), but failed to mention the various ways to donate to our foundation, which will be covered at a future meeting.

COMMENTARY

Last Friday evening Margaret and I were invited to the MS Society's Dinner of Champions which recognized major fund raisers in the Society's MS Walks and Bike Tours. Saskatchewan's two MS Bike Tours raised



\$435,000.00. This year *Peters' Pedalers Plus* consisted of 15 members, 3 were new recruits including our granddaughter Kara. The team had its best year raising \$19,950.00 and over the years have raised a total of \$139,680.00.

Opposite is the 7 member Avonlea Team and two us also participated in the Northern Saskatchewan ride in Waskesiu, where our team consisted of 10 cyclists. These were both great rides and my thanks go out to all who sponsored me in my fund raising effort. You made the difference!
