on October 3, 2016 of Regina Eastview Charter Member Victor Bernatsky's. Vic and his family moved to Regina from Winnipeg in 1957, and as Sales Manager of the Sunshine Uniform Supply involved in opening a branch of the linen and uniform rental and cleaning company in Saskatchewan. When Sunshine closed their Regina facility in the 1980s, Vic worked as a Realtor, then retired to work as a part time Commissionaire. Vic was part of the group of men who formed the base for the 2nd Rotary Club in Regina and was a Charter Member of the Rotary Club of Regina Eastview in 1959. Vic and his wife Mary and their 7 children were an active family in the Club. Their farm yard served as the site for the annual Past

number of years until 2009 when, because of increasingly deteriorating vision, Vic and Mary moved from their beloved farm to Winnipeg. Prior to leaving, Regina Eastview President Jeff Barber presented Vic with a Paul Harris Fellow (January 8, 2009) and subsequently the Club made Vic an Honorary Member of the Club.

Their son Ivor, a member of the RC of Lacombe (Alberta), mentioned his Dad's pride in being named a Paul Harris Fellow at Eastview's meeting as Vic held Rotary, and specifically the Four-Way Test, in high regard. Many of Bernatsky's children were chosen to participate in Adventures in Citizenship and RYLA and all are very

thankful for their Rotary connection. Ivor indicated, "The Eastview Rotary Club will always have a warm place in our heart. Your club will be remembered by our family through memories of Rotary friends and events, and the many Eastview Rotary beer mugs we have inherited." Thank you Vic Bernatsky for walking with Regina Eastview – rest well!

PROGRAM

Acting President Pat introduced guest speaker Patty Humphreys, Marketing Manager of Souls Harbour Rescue Mission and invited Patty to share Souls Harbour "serving humanity" story.

In providing a brief overview of Souls Harbour Rescue Mission history atty touched on the fact the Mission has been offering help and hope to men, women and children in Saskatchewan and beyond for the past 25 years. Souls Harbour RESCUE Mission was originally two distinct charities.

The first charity was Gerri Carroll's founding of Souls Harbour Mission House in 1990, initially she reached out to others with a coffee pot. Within a year she was feeding 50-60 people a day. Not surprisingly word on the street spread that there was a safe place to go for a good meal and soon many more were served on a daily basis. Gerri Carroll passed away in March of 2006, but her legacy lives on.

The second charity was started in 1999 by Ken and Michelle Porter. The Regina RESCUE Mission was a dream they had of starting a long-term recovery program in Regina. In January of 2007, Souls Harbour Mission House and the Regina RESCUE Mission officially merged to form "Souls Harbour RESCUE Mission". The two organizations had been working together for a time and came to the realization that they shared many of the same goals. Rather than duplicating services, the two became one.

"Today Souls Harbour Rescue Mission provides a variety of programs and services including; Men's & Women's Emergency Shelters, a 'Free' Clothing store, a Meal Program (soup kitchen), the Dean Smith Youth

Centre, Little Souls Daycare, the Shayil Home Women's Addictions Program for women and their children, and affordable housing through 'Harbour House', a 30 suite low income apartment building, and 20 more suites through the proposed 'Samaritan Project'."
