PROGRAM

Greg McNamara was called on to introduce our guest speaker Denis Simard, Manager of the Eastview Community Centre, at 615 6th Avenue in Regina. Because the Rotary Club of Regina Eastview, which had its origin in Regina's Eastview area, Greg and Denis thought it worthy to explore how the Club and the Eastview Community Centre might develop a relationship. The place to start was to have Denis come and speak to our Club.

While the Community Centre has been around for some time, the Queen City Eastview Community Association is a relatively new and revitalized entity. The Association took over the Centre on September 15, 2013 and have spent the past 2 years renovating and enhancing the site and making it a Centre that is the pride of this small Community. Denis indicated the

Association inherited a building that had deteriorated and by example it took them six months to clean out the

mice infestation.

When they took over the Centre approximately 2000 people annually took advantage of the three programs being offered. By the end of October 2015, since the Association took over, the 100,000 person will be walking through the door and will have opportunity to be involved in one of the 25 programs now being offered. A program offering which will expand to 30 programs by the end of fall 2015.

The Eastview neighbourhood is made up of post-war single detached housing and what is referred refer to as "infill' housing built in the 1970's and to present. Habitat for Humanity has purchased the former Haultain School and

will be building a 62 unit housing complex on this site. There are just over 500 families living in the Eastview

area, with 34% of these being lone parent families. 10% of the 1,875 people who live in the Eastview area are of aboriginal identity. Immigrant families comprises a slightly higher percentage of the Eastview Community population.

Denis was clear that he would like for the Eastview Community Association to develop an ongoing relationship with our Rotary Club.
