President Dawn chaired the hybrid meeting. Visiting Rotarians included Assistant District Governor Dan Brown and our Speaker Rotarian Gail Brescia. Guests included Raymond Nelson and Mark Breton Joan Krisko played the National anthem.

Robert Moore proposed a toast to the Queen of Canada Mary Ann Breton acknowledged that the meeting was being conducted on the traditional lands of the Indigenous people of this region.

Rotarian Cindy Levanto-Kawahara introduced the evening's speaker, Gail Brescia, executive Director of the St Joseph's Foundation, who was providing a presentation about the Foundation and their ongoing relationship with the Fort William Rotary Club.



The Fort William Rotary Club has been engaged with the St Joseph's Foundation since 1992, having donated \$129,000 to date, the majority of which has been provided over the past 3 years (\$75K of the total).

The history of the organization has been chronicled in a number of books, three of which were circulated during the presentation.
The Sisters of St. Joseph have been working in Thunder Bay since 1884, responding to the needs of the community. Initially, they provided schooling

and educational services. When an unmet need for Hospital services was identified the Sisters raised the funds to build the original St. Joseph's Hospital and the current buildings are located on the original site.

While there are no longer any Sisters left in Thunder Bay, their service has been memorialized by a fountain recognizing the 140 years of service provided by the Sisters of St. Joseph of Sault Ste. Marie.

The most recent donations from Fort William were in support of a campaign to add a new Ultrasound capability and the funds provided were used in support of supporting equipment, consistent with the use of Lottery funds. 2023 will mark the 40th anniversary of the St. Joseph's Foundation, started originally to support the St. Joseph's Heritage and related facilities. Current areas of need in our Community include Mental Health and Addiction facilities, including a better detox centre. To guide the Foundation forward, the organization is undertaking development of a new strategic plan.

President Dawn thanked Gail for the very informative presentation. Fines: Bob Hookham acted as Fine master and was successful in extracting funds based on "Good news" and the origin of the phrase "raining cats and dogs" (apparently, they slept in thatched roofs and heavy rains drove them to seek shelter elsewhere).



Flag Presentation: Bob Hookham presented the Club with a flag from the Punta Gorda Rotary Club that he attends while on vacation.

Correspondence: President Dawn read a note of thanks from the Salvation Army, who indicated that \$2,798 had been raised during our shifts attending the collection kettles.

Reports:

Allocations Report: Sante Sottile reported that the final major donation from last year's Lottery had been made in support of Camp Quality. There is a small residual amount of \$3348 that remains to be distributed.

The finalization of the 2022 proceeds allocation will be the next order of business.

House Lottery Report: Co-Chair Robert Moore reported that approximately 14,700 tickets had been sold to date. This would equate to a net amount available for distribution in the order of \$260K, assuming that the expenses continue to be on budget. Volunteers are required to assist with the Open Houses each weekend.
