THE FORTARIAN January 27, 2021

President Cynthia Judge welcomed everyone to the meeting. About 21 Rotarians were in attendance at this Zoom meeting.

Rotarians rose as Joan Krisko played *The Star Spangled Banner*, followed by *O Canada* on the piano. Dawn Sebesta gave the toast to the Office of the President of the United States. Stephen Margarit gave the toast to the Queen.

President Cynthia introduced our guest speaker, **Blaine Johnson**. Blaine is a past District Governor and joined Rotary in 2004 at the age of 27.

Blaine was the President of the Rotary Club of Janesville, Minnesota for seven years and served as their President twice. He then joined the Bismarck, North Dakota Rotary Club and served as their President in 2014-15. He currently leads the District 5580 Club Visioning Team.





Blaine noted that 2020 has certainly been a different year with a lot of disruption. He has had numerous opportunities over the past year to participate at Rotary meetings using Zoom rather than travelling. He noted that District 5580 is the first Rotary District in the world to utilize a virtual **Visioning** process; ours is scheduled for next **Wednesday, February 3** at **5:30** pm.

Blaine asked Rotarians to think about what their perceptions of the club are, what are the problem areas, what are the good things that we do, etc. This information will be used to develop a baseline for analysis and consideration of future actions.

Some of the potential problem areas for clubs tends to be the disruption of continuity that results from an annual change in leadership. Another common issue is for members to be resistant to change, rather than being open to exploring new ways to do things. A cognitive bias causes people to overestimate their positive qualities and underestimate their negative qualities. Other perceptions of challenges include an aging membership, lack of sufficient younger demographic, small core group of engaged members doing a large proportion of the work.

Blaine stressed that we need to look forward to future growth and activities, rather than being satisfied with the status quo and looking backwards in time. The objective of the Visioning exercise is to help us identify opportunities that will:

- be **RELEVANT** to the community we serve and the needs of our members;
- foster greater member **ENGAGEMENT**;
- make the club ATTRACTIVE to current members and potential members;
- provide CONTINUITY for successive years of leadership;
- build **CONSISTENCY** in objectives, projects, and priorities;
- build CONSENSUS among club members so that we are all working towards the same goal.

Next Wednesday's Visioning exercise for our club will build a multi-year plan of club goals for 2021-22, 2022-23 and 2023-24. A writing exercise will be distributed in advance to those who will be participating in the session. We will be looking at what we have accomplished and where we think we would like to be. Results will be shared with the membership through a Survey Monkey where members can advise of their priorities and comments on the options that were developed. This will feed into a Master Plan for each year, with the action steps needed to accomplish the objectives.

President Cynthia thanked Blaine for his presentation. She will send out the writing exercise and a Zoom link to those who will be attending. We expect to have more than 20 members in attendance at this important session.

President Cynthia noted that we had received correspondence from Dan Brown, Assistant District Governor. Dan is asking that each Thunder Bay club identify a Foundation Champion for their club. This person will encourage members to support the Foundation through contributions and assist with applying for grants. Correspondence was also received from Shelter Box Canada. They said that without Rotary they would not have been able to reach the 200,000+ people that they helped in 2020. The letter indicated that over 130 Rotary clubs across Canada provided support.

Robert Moore advised that the Allocations Committee had met and will be recommending to the Board that \$20,000 be approved for the Art Gallery and \$4,000 for St. Joseph's Foundation.

Dave Knutson said that the application for the House Lottery was sent in last Wednesday and is under review for approval.

Robert Moore is continuing to work with Shout! Media on the website for the House Lottery. The page should be finalized by the end of February.

President Cynthia advised of the following upcoming events that will be held using Zoom:
