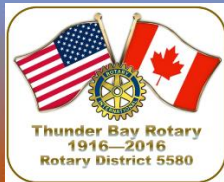

The second team included Shirley DeWilde and Susan Pilatzke and their team was filled out with Lawrence Timko and the Hon. Michael Gravelle. Our Lakehead players were wearing this year's Terry Fox Run shirt and we were listed as "Terry's Team #1" and "Terry's Team #2". The 18-hole course was quite challenging and fun and not at all like some of us remember from the olden days. A fine repast followed the round in the Vanderwees main building close by their Tulips Restaurant. Daytona's was the caterer and everyone enjoyed themselves. Lots of door prizes and Lucky 7 prizes were handed out and Audrey did quite nicely. The event raised \$17,000 for the George Jeffrey Children's Foundation, a fine ending for Mary Anne Comuzzi as she is retiring from the GJCC. This was her final fundraising event for the GJCC and she received much praise and tributes for her work. Joe Vanderwees also received many tributes from those attending including Rotarians, City Council and City Administration representatives.

YOUTH SERVICE:

RYLA:

Claudio Monteleone is our Club's new Youth Service Director and will be heading up the RYLA program in our Club, taking over from Chris Davidson. Chris will help out at the start of the process in conjunction with the other area Clubs to promote the RYLA program in schools and to interview students who apply. Our Board has included funding in this year's Budget to sponsor two students for Camp RYLA.

INTERNATIONAL SERVICE:

LIFESONG PROJECT – KITWE, ZAMBIA:

Paul Carr is attempting to renew relations with the Kitwe Rotary Club and its new President while also working with the Lifesong School people in Kitwe and at their headquarters in the U.S. The issue we have to resolve is whether the Kitwe Rotary Club will apply for a Rotary Foundation grant for the project with Lakehead Rotary as the funding partner Club.

BOLIVIA SCHOOL PROJECT:

Jill Zachary of the FW Rotary Satellite Club has confirmed funding from 6 Rotary Clubs in our District including the 4 Canadian Clubs. Lakehead approved the 50% share of the 2016 Spirit event for this school building project in Bolivia. The amount is \$3,629 CDN. Our District has approved a matching grant for the project and this project must be funded in U.S. dollars. Our donation has been converted to a U.S. draft and forwarded to the FW Rotary Club Treasurer to be deposited in a special single-purpose account for this project. Jill will keep us apprised of progress and she expects construction of the school to take place next summer.

This is always close to the official anniversary date of Rotary International [February 23rd] and the 4 area Clubs get together to plan and host it with one Club taking the lead role each year. Proceeds from this event are shared with the 4 Clubs and each Club sends its share to Polio Plus. The Centennial version of this event will be on February 17th in the Ballroom of the Valhalla Inn and the Clubs are looking for a gala dinner/evening to celebrate Rotary in our community for 100 years. More on this grand evening soon.

DISTRICT CONFERENCE – 2018:

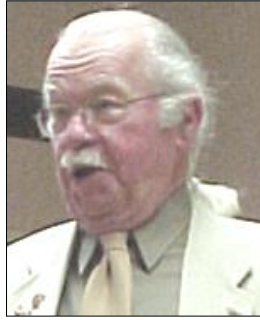

Django Reinhardt



Django Reinhardt (born Jean Reinhardt January 23, 1910 in Liberchies, Pont-a-Celles, Belgium—died May 16, 1953 in Fontainebleau, France) was a Belgian guitarist and composer, also known as Jean Baptiste Reinhardt, who popularized “Gypsy” Jazz from the early 1930s to the early 1950s. His nick-name “Django” means “I Awake” in the Romani language (an Indo-European language). He is recognized as one of the greatest guitar players of all time. He was born into a family of Manouche gypsies in Belgium but spent most of his youth in Gypsy enclaves outside of Paris France, where he learned to play several instruments such as guitar, violin and banjo. His family included some amateur musicians who inspired Django who was given a guitar and stopped playing violin. From the age of 15 on, he was able to make a living playing in Parisian music dance halls. Because he received little formal education as a youth, he was essentially illiterate at the time. It was several years later that he developed some degree of literacy when he was in London, England.

When he was 18 he was severely injured in a trailer fire which gave him second degree burns over half his body and badly burned the fourth and fifth fingers of his left hand. Doctors believed that he would never play guitar again. Over the next year, with rehabilitation and practice, he relearned his guitar playing in a completely new way with his fourth and fifth fingers permanently paralyzed. He resumed his career playing in Parisian cafes. In 1934, Django and Parisian violinist Stephen Grapelli were approached by a Parisian Club boss to form a new jazz group. After adding two more guitars and a bassist, The Quintette de Hot Club de France, became one of the few well known jazz ensembles comprised only of string instruments. Django played and recorded throughout his career with American jazz legends such as Dizzy Gillespie, Louis Armstrong and Coleman Hawkins. The Quintette was broken up by the outbreak of WW II.

Grapelli remained in London and Django returned to France where during the war years he led a big band in Paris. In 1946 he toured the U.S. as a soloist with the Dizzy Gillespie. He continued to play in Parisian jazz clubs in the early 1950s but became more reclusive. While walking home after playing at a Paris jazz club, he collapsed from a brain hemorrhage and died the following day. Blues guitar great Jeff Beck said: “he was by far the most astonishing guitar player ever” and The Grateful Dead’s Jerry Garcia said: “his technique is awesome. NEWS FROM NU VISION MINISTRY IN THUNDER BAY

A Speaking Engagement in Thunder Bay Sponsored by Nu-Vision Ministry Canada

You probably know the photo...

A nine-year old Vietnamese girl is running down a highway, fleeing the burning clouds that surge behind her. She is naked, her arms thrust away from her body. She has been struck by a napalm bomb that is now cooking her ponytailed hair and the skin of her neck, back, and left arm into a bubbling goo. Her mouth gapes in a scream.

This is an iconic photo of the Vietnam War. It shot across the media in 1972. It was instrumental in galvanizing American opposition to the Vietnam War. It won photographer Nick Ut a Pulitzer Prize. But for Kim Phuc, the girl in the photo, the photo is one of pain: a moment that is seared in time and memory, burns that took years to heal, scars that bind her in pain. For the girl in the picture, to look at the photo is to relive her pain.

And yet, Phuc has, and does, look at that image again and again. In fact, she will be in Thunder Bay Sept 23-24, to gaze at the picture once again, with a local audience. And as we look at that iconic image, and see the scars that she continues to carry, Phuc will tell us the story of her life. She will describe the long and continuing healing journey that is her life. Phuc says that her story is one that moves from Vietnam to Cuba to Canada, from pain, despair and disappointment towards hope, freedom and peace. Phuc narrates a story that moves from global war to inner peace. Phuc tells her story because it brings hope to others, and through others, to herself.

We continue to live in a world of war, of violence, of upheavals. And we need to be inspired by a belief in refuge and examples of it. This is why our Thunder Bay organization Nu-Vision Ministry Canada is partnering with Kim Phuc and her foundation. By attending this event, your donations will go to furthering their work in attaining global justice. You can find out more about Phuc’s Foundation and her work to bring healing to children of war at kimfoundation.com. And you can find out more Nu-Vision and its work in aiding vulnerable youth, both in our community and worldwide, at nu-vision.org.

Phuc will tell “A Story of Forgiveness and Peace” on Friday September 23 at 7:30 pm at the Selkirk Auditorium, 621 Selkirk St. S. She will also take part in a follow-up event, a breakfast at the Airlane Hotel Tiberio Room, on Saturday September 24 at 9am. At this breakfast, Nu-Vision members will also share news of their recent work in Haiti.
