PRESENTATION:

Our special guests today were Anna Grenier, Volunteer Services with Hogarth Riverview Manor and Lynda Lahteenmaa who is a volunteer with HRM and a Master Gardiner.

Hogarth Riverview Manor is a long-term care home located on Lillie Street North in Thunder Bay. The original home opened in 2004 with 96 beds and was recently expanded to accommodate 544 residents making it one of the largest long-term care homes in Ontario.

Lynda Lahteenmaa volunteers at Hogarth Riverview Manor, working with volunteer coordinator Anna Grenier. Lynda and other local master gardeners have created a Horticultural Therapy program for seniors in long-term care. The facility has an enclosed courtyard which contains accessible raised beds, vertical and container gardens. The courtyard is a safe, accessible environment where residents can get outside to walk and relax.

Senior residents have a range of cognitive illnesses that manifest as dementia. Horticultural Therapy can be used to stimulate their senses, such as sight, sound, smell, touch, hearing and taste. The therapy is tailored to an individual participant's physical and mental abilities, with the goal of enhancing their quality of life. Gardening occurs throughout the year. In the spring, the residents help with planting with the guidance of master gardener volunteers. The residents can then follow the growth of the plants through the summer. Lynda says herbs have the greatest therapeutic value, because the scent can bring back memories.



During the cold months, the gardening changes to indoor activities, such as planting bulbs for January blooms, creating colorful floral arrangements or doing crafts with dried flowers. The Hogarth Riverview Manor Therapeutic Horticulture program started in 2008. Lynda and Anna coordinate the master gardeners and staff who run the program and have taught gardening to Hogarth's staff. They also work with youth who have an opportunity to learn about gardening and helping the elderly.

Lynda closed her presentation with a picture of a mallard duck that best signifies the success of Hogarth's courtyard garden. Twice, including this spring, the duck has chosen to nest in one of the container gardens where residents can watch her.

WILDERNESS DISCOVERY:

Work has started out at Wilderness Discovery with Bob Hookham as project leader on site. Bob and his wife will be spending every weekend out at WD and he has asked for help from area Rotarians, Kinsmen, and any others who are able to help. The first few weekends involve demolition of bathrooms in the cabins and demolition and removal of the two trailer units at the top of the site that have been used as HQ for years. Lots of brush clearing has taken place so the focus now is on the cabins and the lower level of the main lodge building. Joan Krisko of the FW Club will be doing all of the scheduling for volunteers every weekend until early November. Watch for this schedule and be prepared to volunteer your time, energy and expertise.




50/50 FOR THE FOUNDATION:

MAT ANDERSON





Matthew "Matt" Anderson (born 1982 in Perth Andover, Victoria County, New Brunswick) is a Canadian blues guitarist and singersongwriter who has been active since 2002. Matt grew up in the small blue-collar town of Perth Andover in a potato farming district on the Western edge of New Brunswick, next to the Maine border. He started playing music at an early age and played tuba and trumpet while in high school. He went on to learn guitar and by age 14 was playing in taverns and pubs/around his home town.

While studying engineering at the University of New Brunswick, he also worked at McCain's frozen food factory in Florenceville, N.B., making Pizza Pockets. He did this until 2002 when he discovered blues and the rest is history. In 2002 he started his career playing guitar in a New Brunswick rock and roll band called Flat Top. He then started playing on the East Coast of Canada and began to build his reputation for his singing and guitar plating the old fashion way—touring world-wide and letting his audiences and fans spread his reputation by word of mouth. He toured throughout North America, Europe and Australia headlining blues festivals, theatres and clubs. To do this, he toured with Tedeschi Trucks Band, Greg Allman, Buddy Guy, Bo Diddley and many others. He appeared at our Thunder Bay Bluesfest a few years back.

Matt issued his solo debut "Second Time Around" in 2007 followed by "Something In Between" in 2008, and in 2009 by "Piggyback". In 2010 Matt became the first Canadian to win the top prize in the International Blues Challenge in Memphis Tennessee. He beat artists from 11 other countries and 5 continents. His winning gave him festival gigs in the U.S., France, Italy and a slot on the Legendary Rhythm and Blues Cruise.

In 2011 he went to Levon Helm's studio in Woodstock, New York where he recorded "Coal Mining Blues" with Helm's daughter Amy Helm and The Band's keyboardist Garth Hudson. Also in 2011 he received more honours by winning the Maple Blues Award for Entertainer of the Year and Acoustic Artist of the Year. Further in 2011, he won an East Coast Music Award followed by 3 Maple Blues Awards. In2014, he released the album "Weightless", for which he received a Juno Award nomination.
