This week's speaker was David Bakker, a member of the Chatham-Kent Police Department who is loaned to the Crime Stoppers program on a full-time basis to act as coordinator.

Dave was introduced by Rotarian Tania Sharpe.

Crime Stoppers is based in the CK Police headquarters and is a community based program that brings citizens, the media and the police together to solve crimes. This is accomplished by offering cash rewards and guaranteeing anonymity to persons who supply information leading to arrests or laying of charges. Crime Stoppers started in New Mexico in 1976 following the senseless murder of a young university student manning a gasoline kiosk.

The local crime stoppers was established on April 13, 1987 by former Chief of Police Dennis Poole. Today, there are over 1,000 programs in 21 countries. 100 of these programs are in Canada

When a caller calls, the coordinator takes the information about the illegal activities. There is no call display or other means to identify the caller.

The caller is given a code number instead. Crime stoppers accepts information on everything from traffic offences to murder. Callers are asked to call back later to see whether the information has led to a reward. Any rewards are determined by the board and range from \$100 to \$1,000. The money to support Crime Stoppers and pay rewards (about \$50,000 annually) comes from donations, fundraising and sponsors.

In 2017, there were 755 calls resulting in 100 arrests and 298 charges. Almost \$1 million in drugs and property were recovered.

Why do tipsters call Crime Stoppers? For revenge or because they are angry, or because they are concerned citizens. They also may call because of the cash rewards. Anonymity is another reason.

There is no government funding for this program

The motto of Crime Stoppers is "Together, we can make it happen".


