Don "Sparky" Leonard ~ District 6380 Governor in 2019-20

The Governor Nominating Committee has announced Assistant Governor, Don "Sparky" Leonard, as District Governor Nominee-Designate, which means that Mr. Leonard will serve as Governor Rotary District 6380 in 2019-20.

Mr. Leonard is a 20-year Rotarian and a member of the Chatham Club in Ontario. He served as club president in 2014-15. He has recently retired from a long stint as operations manager for an automobile dealership.

Governor Nominating Committee chair Jim Gilmore organized the governor selection process which this year included an advance review of the candidates' resumes, multiple discussions regarding the requirements of the district, the creation of a rubric or decision matrix, and the interviews.

"This year, we invested in more than 100 person-hours in the governor selection process," says District Governor Michael Caruso. "We were thrilled to have three DGND candidates this year, the highest number of applicants in a while. All of them will make great governors for us in the future."

The DGND will not serve as governor until 2019, so the committee had the difficult task of considering not only the current circumstances of the district, but our future scenario as well.

Nominating committee members were asked to evaluate the candidates in many areas, including Rotary experience, communication skills,

technology skills, and ideas for improving the district.

The Governor Nominating Committee consists of seven D6380 Rotarians serving in staggered two-year terms, plus, the Immediate Past District Governor. These members are, by design, a cross-section of our diverse membership.

Thanks to the following Rotarians for serving on the committee: Alternate and sitting president Susan Brown (Chelsea), chairperson and Past District Governor Jim Gilmore (Livingston - Sunrise), Past President Karen Kerry (Ann Arbor), Past District Governor Lynn Morgan (Farmington), Past President Len Stenger (Ann Arbor), and sitting President Mark Zuccaro (Mount Clemens).

Mr. Leonard will join a string of successful District 6380 leaders.

The current governor string consists of Past District Governor (PDG) Don Riddell (2014-15) from the Troy Club

— Don stood in for PDG George Hedgespeth, who passed away while serving as governor — and Immediate Past District Governor (IPDG), Henry Dotson (2015-16), from the Auburn Hills Club.

The leadership string also includes current District Governor (DG) Michael Caruso (2016-17) from the Troy Club; District Governor-Elect (DGE); Barry Fraser (2017-18) from the Chatham Club; and District Governor Nominee (DGN) Jane McManus (2018-19) from the Brighton Club.

There are 535 Rotary District Governors in the world. Please help us congratulate Don "Sparky" Leonard!



New Year Polio Eradication News

he New Year is upon us and there is so much excitement in the war on polio! January is almost complete and we are

still at zero cases for 2017. Rotary International has just released another \$35 million in Polio Eradication Funding. Advances in technology both in the field and in the CDC Lab are helping us to respond quicker and send vaccine where it is most needed.

We have armed our polio vaccinators with satellite phones allowing for reporting of vaccination numbers and suspicious symptoms of possible cases of polio with greater speed. This will greatly help us to prevent major outbreaks in areas where a case may be detected.



The CDC is currently using robots to examine the biology of polio cases providing quicker results to help get the right vaccine in the right places. The transfer to IPV (inactivated polio vaccine) is almost complete. Well ahead of schedule.

While all the above is fantastic news, the reality of polio eradication still remains, We need funding, advocacy and Most Importantly, We Need You! We need our Rotary clubs and our Rotary Polio Warriors to help us raise the 1.5 to 1.8 billion dollars that experts estimate it will take to complete the task of eradicating polio forever.

Please make sure that the Polio Fund is on your club's Foundation contribution list for the 2017 year. This is an exciting time to be a part of Rotary's accomplishment of Eradicating Polio Forever.

Other exciting news: On May 20, the Farmington Rotary Club in collaboration with Botsford Commons Senior Community will be hosting an open house of the former Sister Kenny Hospital. Sister Kenny brought her water therapy treatment to the Farmington Hills area and revolutionized polio treatment for paralytic limbs.

The buildings built in 1921 and 1926 were designed by Albert Kahn and have been converted to a Senior Living Community while preserving the architectural features. We hope you will join us for this awesome opportunity to see the history of polio treatment in our area come alive once again. Please mark your calendars and plan to attend and support the Farmington Rotary Club with their advocacy to bring Rotary and our Polio Eradication Campaign to the forefront on May 20.



hen it comes to recruiting club members, there are almost as many ideas as there are Rotarians, which is not surprising considering Rotary's diversity. Below are three of my favorite ways to grow membership.



1. MAKE SURE YOUR CLUB HAS A MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE!

Your club's membership committee will create and follow an action plan to attract and engage members.

2. MAINTAIN CONTACT WITH YOUR ROTARY ALUMNI, AND HELP THEM JOIN A ROTARY CLUB!

3. ADVERTISE ROTARY!

Advertise your club's special programs or projects. You can do this through your local newspaper, your club website, or on social networking sites such as Facebook, LinkedIn, or Twitter (Learn about RI's official social networking pages.) Invite visitors to your club meetings and events. Talk about Rotary's humanitarian work. Mention the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation's involvement in the Polio eradication effort.



Membership Growth: Whose Responsibility is it anyway?

This is a story about four brothers named Everybody, Somebody, Anybody and Nobody. There was an important job to be done and Everybody was sure Somebody would do it. Anybody could have done it but Nobody did it. Somebody got angry with that because it was Everybody's job. Everybody thought Anybody could do it but Nobody realized that Everybody wouldn't do it. It ended up that Everybody blamed Somebody when Nobody did what Anybody could have done.



You have probably seen, or heard this before, however you may not have thought of it as sound advice about taking personal responsibility for the important job of growing your club's membership, and moving your club from strength to strength.

If you stop to think about it, you may realize that at some point in your journey as a Rotarian you may have met one, or two, or quite a few persons who probably share the view that the Membership Chair/Director, and sometimes the President, is the one solely responsible for the Club's growth. If you haven't met anyone like that then GREAT!

But let's get to the meat of the matter and zoom in on the topic of this blog post.

Who is responsible for attracting new members, retaining present members, and by extension growing the club's membership?

YOU ARE! Yes You! So you're just a member? That doesn't matter. Realize that **MEMBERSHIP IS YOUR BUSINESS**, just as much as it is that of the Membership Director/Chair or President, and take responsibility for the growth of your club.

Take personal responsibility for sharing Rotary with someone.

Take personal responsibility for inviting a co-worker, a neighbor, a friend, to your club's meeting, project, or fellowship activity. Take personal responsibility for making your club's visitors feel welcomed when they attend your meetings.

Take personal responsibility for building your club.



The most essential truth concerning the growth of any Rotary club is that the club belongs to the members; therefore it requires the work of each member to build it.

The growth of your club depends on several factors:

- 1. Effective club meetings that will make attending worthwhile for visitors and members alike
- 2. Promoting the club's events and projects; let people see what your club is about, let them see that Serving Humanity is FUN
- 3. Retention of current members
- 4. Recognition of Rotarians who truly exemplify Service Above Self

What other factors do you think contribute to the growth of your club? Reading an article recently, I was introduced to a fifth "brother." This brother was called MINE.

Basically, this individual can be any Rotary member who views the growth and progress of the club as his responsibility. The 'Mine' person is willing to devote the time, energy and creativity necessary to ensure that the club grows from strength to strength, and is not willing to be derailed in his clearly envisioned goal because the other members of his club will or won't contribute.

The bottom line is this: EVERY MEMBER IS RESPONSIBLE FOR THE GROWTH OF HIS CLUB'S MEMBERSHIP.

If you want to grow your club's membership, you simply cannot be like Everybody, Somebody, Anybody, and Nobody.

You just can't.

Be more like the fifth "brother" and realize that the growth of the club is your responsibility.

Let us not allow Everybody's Responsibility to become Nobody's Responsibility.


