s you read this newsletter, we will be less than 30 days away from the Peace Conference that we all are collectively sponsoring.

The programming is in place with confirmation from all the speakers/panelists in place. The Peace Conference committee is hard at work putting the finishing touches for a conference that all of us will be proud of.

We are still little bit short on fundraising area. We are 80% there, but need approximately \$20,000 more to reach our budgeted goal of \$220,000. We are looking for another \$10,000 in funds, specifically to be dedicated toward bringing in more young people to attend the conference.

We already have over 100 of them registered so far with many more on the waiting list wanting to attend the conference. So all the Rotary club presidents out there, especially the large clubs with their own foundations, who have not provided any support so far, please try to help with raising collectively \$10,000 so more youth can attend the conference. Hope you all will seriously consider this appeal.

As of middle of February, we had 240 confirmed registrations. The total available capacity is 400. We have attendees coming from 21 different countries around the world and from all over the United States. The registration from the clubs from seven sponsoring Rotary districts is around 100 so far. All of you reading this newsletter, thinking about attending, should consider registering as soon as possible. Otherwise you might be left out and be disappointed.

Our confirmed youth attendance stands at 110. We have provided scholarships to most of them for their attendance. However, we have many more young people who want to attend. Since we don't have the funds to subsidize their cost of attendance, we had to put student registration on temporary hold until we raise more funds for this purpose. So your help in this area is vital for this to succeed.

I hope you are as excited about this event as the Peace Conference Committee members are. If you decide to attend, you will not be disappointed. Please ask your family, friends, community leaders, clergies, members of other service organizations in your area to attend.

Registration closes on March 31, so do not hesitate to get your students logged on to the system and get them registered.



A Trip to the Dominican Republic

Area Rotarians visited Puerto Plata Rotary in Dominican Republic

Point Schissler and Anne Nauts from the Chelsea Rotary Club were on vacation this January in the Dominican Republic and decided to drop in on the Rotary Club of Puerto Plata. Visiting other Rotary clubs is one thing the couple enjoys doing when they are traveling. Club Rotario Puerto Plata welcomed the visitors and told them about some of their projects, including water and sanitation (aqueducts, BioSand filters, latrines), school reading programs, women and girl's empowerment, Haitian education, community center construction, camps for kids.

In addition to this visit, Paul and Anne participated in projects on the "Impact Service Cruise" that they took along with Dexter Rotarian, Karen Walworth, and several other friends from the area. While docked at port in Puerto Plata, the Fathom Impact Travel cruise offered various service projects that people on the ship could devote their days to, including pouring cement floors in homes that had dirt floors, working in an arts and crafts paper recycling company that a group of women had formed, manufacturing water filters to provide clean water to some of the three million people in the DR who have no access to piped water, teaching English to local students and adults, reforestation and nursery efforts.

"This was one of the best experiences of our lives," said Anne after getting back to Michigan.
