Today's Speaker: BIF With Club Social and Citizenship Reaffirmation Ceremony



Past President Mark's "Passing the Torch"

Past President Mark Winson wanted to say a few words before handing things over to President Jack. He added that our Club has never really had a "formal ceremony" to mark the change over from one President to another and hoped that tonight's get-together might become an annual tradition. He also wanted to touch on some of the things that he thinks "highlighted" his year as President.

The Clubhouse: He thinks we are "very fortunate" to have been able to gain access to the space we are using for our Clubhouse and for only \$1/yr. We have been able to hold

meetings and other events here, as well as serving as a great storage place for all sorts of things. Thanks to our "hands on" members we were able to paint, clean the carpets and furnish the clubhouse. Mark says his "legacy" will be that he was able to procure a full sized board table for our meetings there.

Our Club continued its support of the York University Rotaract Club and we have now helped charter a new Rotaract Club at Humber College thanks to the work of Maati Lahroussi.

We delivered a "large cheque" from Ribfest to the Toronto Rotary Club who took on the job of collecting the entrance "donations" at the Ribfest gates. The cheque amounted to around \$70K, or half of the gate proceeds, and represented the "largest fundraiser" for the Toronto Club. Mark thinks it is great that a portion of our Ribfest proceeds became the Toronto Club's biggest fundraiser.

Mark wanted to recognize Gill and Andre Dugas and Theresa Sherwood for their "many hours" of hard work they have done in the "Hands on Etobicoke" committee. They have organized events such as ; preparing dinner for Youth Without Shelter; lunches for the "Out of the Cold" programs; being "marshals" for the Dorothy Ley Hospice walk; bringing gifts to hospitals and seniors; etc.

The "Family Day" potluck dinner at the Clubhouse was a great success and everyone had a good time. Mark is hoping that this event, which was originally suggested by Michael Bell, will become an annual function of the Club.

Prior to the official ceremony Judge McMillan made the following comments;



"Rotary Colleagues, Ladies and Gentlemen, Mesdames et Messiers, it is my honour to preside over this ceremony, where you will formally re-affirm your Canadian Citizenship. Whether you were born here or made your choice to become a Canadian Citizen, publically reciting the same Oath of Citizenship as those who more recently recognized the privilege and met the requirements of Canadian Citizenship is a reminder of how fortunate we are to call Canada our "home and native land". From sea to sea, Canada is a country of natural spectacle and cultural diversity with a rich, brave and honourable history. As a Canadian you have the freedom to associate, express yourself, believe and worship, and, you have the right to do it anywhere in the country, in either official language, avec no puple fondature et ou avec les puple venant die yere (with our founding people and/or with people of other cultures). Be proud of your identity and recognize with interest and respect, the pride that others hold in their identity. Honour the fact that you have Canadian Citizenship and with that privilege you have the responsibility to live a life that promotes Canadian values. Because we are "strong and free", there is no country in the world with diversity on the scale of what we have. Everyone has an honoured place, whatever their ethnicity, religion, social background, country of birth or cultural heritage. Our Government is not only looking into the world to find, but Canada attracts, the world's most talented and innovative immigrants who can contribute to the

Canadian economy and help our country flourish. I ask you to take pride in your identity, meet and learn from others, and together always defend Canada's way of life. As you have proven by becoming a member of this Rotary club, you understand that helping that helping others in the community is the cornerstone of responsible citizenship. You have taken responsibility and you make life richer for yourself, your neighbours and those less fortunate. For Canada to remain the "True North Strong and Free", citizens must protect and nurture her from within. As a Canadian Rotarian you are exemplifying those responsibilities. Continue to direct and encourage those who stand beside you in your family, your business, your life as a volunteer so that they look up to you. They may learn and follow your example. Use your Canadian "Rights and Freedoms" well and respectfully and take nothing for granted. Continue to make your mark and make Canada an even better place to live. As you repeat the Canadian Citizenship Oath after me, trust that the memory of this re-affirmation will remind you that you stand <mark>shoulder to sho</mark>ulder with <mark>ev</mark>ery Cana<mark>di</mark>an citizen an<mark>d, as</mark> a Rotarian; yo<mark>u</mark> are proving your commitment to be a truly "great" Canadian!"



Judge McMillan now asked everyone to "stand, raise their right hand and repeat after her" as she gave the Re-affirmation Oath. After the oath was completed, she personally greeted all the participants and presented them with a certificate along with a "Canadian Maple Leaf" pin.
