Today's Speaker: Brad HUTCHINSON – The Gateway



Brad is the Executive Director of The Gatehouse, which provides support, resources and advocacy on behalf of those impacted by childhood sexual abuse. Brad is an author, black sash martial artist, and business partner of Beyond Kung Fu Inc. Brad especially enjoys inspiring children and presents exhilarating, self-esteem building programs for schools across Ontario. He has authored 3 books and published 4. His chapter book "The Eye of the Storm" is being used in schools within the Ontario school system. Brad is active in his community: He Chairs the Mississauga Library Board of Directors; volunteers for Peel Children's Aid, Elizabeth Fry, and Dog Guides Canada. He also advises on various education, community, and business initiatives.

Brad began by saying that when a child is "offended" by sexual abuse "they lose their voice". They can be

coerced and threatened. The "lose their path in life". He noted that we all have "this path in us". This is the "longing" to help others. Some of those who come to Gatehouse have lost this path. Many that "climb the steps and open the door for the first time" at Gatehouse have found this "too heavy"

Many children find it hard to talk about what is happening to them. They feel scared, confused, worried about what will happen if they do tell someone. This also applies to teens and young adults. If this "energy is not expressed in some way, it will still move on its own". This can lead to anger issues, alcohol and drug abuse, etc. in later life. At Gatehouse they create an atmosphere which can allow the "story to come out".

Being abused is one of the most painful and traumatic experiences anyone can go through. Boys are abused just as much as girls and adolescents just as much as younger children (1 in 4 girls are sexually assaulted before the age of 18, and 1 in 7 boys). Abuse is often kept as a 'secret' leaving them feeling alone, frightened, scared, isolated and confused. Most cases of abuse are carried out by someone they know, love and trust which makes it even harder to disclose what is happening. They must never forget that "this is not your fault". Abusers make their victims keep the 'secret' because they, as adults or older youths, know this is wrong.

Brad added "It is hard to convey what the Gatehouse is and what happens there. It's a place where everyone's voice can be heard. It sounds so simple, and maybe that's the beauty of the programs and people at the Gatehouse; when your voice gets heard, you can begin to heal". They allow the story

to come forward with "empathy and no judgement". It is a "safe place" for the "voice to come up" which allows the "healing transition to begin". There is also "peer to peer" support". It provides a child-friendly environment, resources and support enabling Police and Child Welfare Workers to interview families when child abuse is suspected. It is the site of many programs that help them to "heal and move on". Besides their Children's programs they have support group programs for youth 18-24 and Adults over 24 who are survivors of childhood sexual abuse through social reconnection, education and information on the effects that sexual abuse can have.

The Gatehouse receives no government funding. Organizations such as our Club have helped over the years. It thrives on volunteers. They have 4 staff and 80 volunteers. Brad estimates that 10 to 15 thousand people have been served by the Gatehouse. One of the programs at the Gatehouse that our Club was able to help with is their Student Employment Opportunities. Our Club made a donation to buy some computers for the program.

President Mark thanked Brad for his presentation saying that he "touched on a subject that many people don't want to talk about but is a very serious matter and needs to be addressed". He thinks facilities like the Gatehouse are doing "very important work".

I am pleased to be sending you Josna's most recent letter which is full of information about her life today. She is attending her Amarok's Women School regularly and has done very well. She finds English challenging and benefits from her teacher's creative methods. Josna also teaches five children in her own MOI school and is happy with how well they are coming along under her guidance. It is wonderful that the Amarok system enables women to be both students and teachers and supports and encourages them no matter where they are! Josna tells you that when she was married she was illiterate but now that she has changed that state she receives respect from her husband and enjoys a much more satisfying relationship. Sadly women in Bangladesh do not even expect that they will be able to achieve even one of those although it is becoming the norm for the students of the Amarok Schools to do so. We cannot fully express our appreciation to your Club for its continued support of Josna. It means so much to Josna and to Amarok to have your support. Having had the benefit of going to Bangladesh with the trip organized by Nick Lawley of the East York Rotary Club I can assure you that the Amarok Schools are the most exciting development in Bangladesh today - we just need more so as to reach far more people.

Dear Members of Rotary club of Etobicoke, Our school is running well and all mothers are well. How are you? I hope you all are also fine. I am happy for my school life and I feel confident for my education as education has given me some honor. I know my education is still very small but with that I am teaching 5 little children and helping our slum mothers in their needs.

For my learning I go to our Amarok Mother School every day. Here we spend our best time of the day. In our mother school we can share our ideas with other mothers and with our teacher.

Now I can read fluently Bengali and some English. Still I am not very good in English but for my little MOI children I think I am a good mother-teacher. You will be happy to know that to improvement our reading skill our teacher has developed a new method. The method is to make study circle with 4 mothers in each group with a group leader who is advanced. For this month I am selected as a group leader of a group. I try to help other mothers in reading. When we go earlier before time then we practice by ourselves. Every two months our teacher rearrange the groups. You know that when I was married I was completely illiterate. But now I can read and write, for this my husband value me more than before and I feel proud for my education. You will be also happy to know about my teaching to children. I have developed many materials for counting numbers, adding and shapes which I've learnt from our mother school and also from Amarok office as they give us some sample materials and ideas. Now our slum mothers and community people recognize me for my works. When I get time then I try to teach younger children out of my five children. Among the five four can read their books and can do math well. You know we learn English through songs and storytelling. From these songs we learn different new words, its meaning and can make sentences with those words.
