Today's Speaker: Greg Dobson 2015 Camp Enterprise "Debriefing"



Our scheduled speaker was unable to be here today, so Greg Dobson graciously stepped in to provide an update on this year's Camp Enterprise which took place last weekend.

President Mark introduced Greg as our PEE (President Elect Elect) and the "General" of Camp Enterprise since he has been heading the program for the last 8 years. During that time he has developed a "set structure" that has "worked very well".

Greg said that it was another "very successful" Camp Enterprise that was held May 7th to 9th at the University of Toronto, Erindale (Mississauga) Campus. He had 45 students from high schools in

Etobicoke register. Greg brought copies of the "Champion Binder" that he prepares and distributes to the various high schools as part of the recruiting drive. The "champs" are designated people at each school (principal, guidance counsellor, teacher, etc.).

Greg wanted to mention this year's "notable presenters: Lynda Ryder, Vanessa Koch, Spencer Winson, and Eric Tonellato and his staff from the Ministry of Labour. James Simon also assisted with assigning rooms at the Erindale Dorm rooms. He also wanted to thank the U of T and Antonia Maughan of conference services.

Our Camp Enterprise Mission statement reads: "Rotary Club of Etobicoke's Camp Enterprise will endeavor to nurture and reward the entrepreneurial and charitable spirit of Etobicoke youth. Under the theme of "Change Your World", participants will learn leadership and teambuilding skills from community experts. The most valuable participants in the camp, those who enrich the Camp experience for all participants, will receive seed capital for their own community project. For those who are interested and committed to making their community a better environment to live and grow, Camp Enterprise can help you Change Your World".

The students were broken up into 9 teams and through his "structured program" work towards putting together a business plan to put together their own "favourite" charity presentation. The winning team will get \$2,000 in "seed money" to put their plan in motion. Greg noted that his year's winning team had an "unique" idea. Their charity was Sick Kids but they wanted to write a book that would be distributed at the hospital called "The Girl

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Who Could Not Twirl a Curl” about a girl who had lost her hair due to cancer treatment and her wish was to have enough hair to be able to “twirl a curl”. The next step will be to mentor this group for 3 to 4 months to help make this plan come to fruition.

Greg thinks that Camp Enterprise is a “great success” and that kids are “truly amazing” the way they buy into the program. He thinks these are kids that are genuinely going to help “change the world”.

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Camp Enterprise 2015 – Student Testimonial

A group of North Albion students went to the University of Toronto, Mississauga campus (UTM) for a session held by the Rotary Club on Thursday, May 7. The two and a half day stay was an opportunity for students to collaborate with one another and to learn how to fundraise money for a charity of their choice. When students got to the UTM, they met various Rotarians who explained the Rotary Club in more detail. There were many speakers with different abilities and viewpoints. They educated students on different organizations and what they represent. They learned about various charities. Students had a chance to win \$2,000 for the charity of their choice, to make an event and then donate money to them.

Students played some ice breakers to get to know the students from other schools in Etobicoke. Students learned many things at Camp Enterprise, related to business and marketing, presentation skills, leadership skills, information about volunteering, how to make a profit, how unions work, how to be successful, how to make oral presentations in front of a group of people, and more. They learned life lessons and how to make the world a better place.

One student says that it helped her “come out of her shell”, another said that it helped her overcome her shyness. Another said that she learned to bond with new people. She said it was a life changing experience. One student said that Camp Enterprise was one of the best experiences in his life. There were many activities and games, which made business fun to learn. Students were split up into multiple groups numerous times to play different

games that linked business, marketing, and sales. Tim Horton’s coffee vs. McDonald’s coffee was one topic. There was one activity, where students had to draw on t-shirts and come up with a plan how to sell them. Students loved living in residence during their stay, mingling, socializing, and making new friends.

Students found this camp to be an extraordinary opportunity, helpful in showing them what the world of work will be like in the future, it was fun, “the greatest time”, enjoyable, well-organized, and an “amazing” experience. The participants would recommend that their peers also take part in the Camp Enterprise programme, an eye opener to the business world. Some students are hoping to go again next year.

Harvesting for hunger

Rotary First Harvest, a program of Rotary District 5030, Seattle, Washington, USA

You won't find fancy cocktails or colorful streamers at these parties. But Rotary members in the Seattle area still have a good time at Rotary First Harvest work parties, where they repackage surplus produce for distribution to the hungry. "The work is rewarding and great fun," says David Schooler, Rotary member and president of Rotary First Harvest. The organization collaborates with farmers, truckers, volunteers, and food banks to move food that might otherwise go to waste to food banks and meal programs for those in need.

Schooler and around 100 Rotary members and friends gather at a warehouse twice a month to break down 1,000-pound bins of food into smaller boxes or serving bags. They also volunteer on farms to gather fresh fruits and vegetables that aren't economically viable for farmers to harvest. In one season, Rotary First Harvest coordinated 1,500 volunteers and provided 3 million family meals.
