Today's Speaker: Neil Phillips -Rotary Club of Toronto @ 100



President Hugh introduced Neil. Neil is the current President of the Toronto Rotary Club and Hugh met him during their PETS (President Elect) training. They got to know each other better during the PETS trip to RI HQ in Evanston.

Neil began by saying he wanted to comment about Alison's Youth Exchange trip. Neil's wife is a former Rotary Youth Exchange student. Neil was happy to be here today and wanted to talk about the exciting things that are happening with the Toronto Club this year.

The Rotary Club of Toronto is celebrating its centennial (100 years) this year. It is the oldest Rotary Club in Ontario and the 2nd Club organized in Canada. Neil said the Club is reaching out to other Clubs (in and out District 7070) to "join the party".

Neil has been in Rotary for 15 years. His boss was a member and got him interested in Rotary. As a company they used to use Rotary as a "client event", but found he enjoyed the fellowship and the fun. He added that While the Toronto Club is "downtown" club, he is "an anomaly" since he doesn't live or work downtown. However it is where his clients are.

Neil wanted to congratulate our Club on our Ribfest. He says it is probably the largest fundraiser in District 7070. He says the Toronto Club does things a little different.

They don't do much in the way of fundraising since they have a "big foundation". They do a lot of good work but rely on "those who came before".

In celebration of 100 years of service, the Toronto Club plans to give away in excess of \$1 million to charitable projects. The Club felt that no one project would fully represent their philanthropic activities, so it was decided that each Club committee would provided with \$100,000 to fund their own project, as well as funding other charitable opportunities. The President and the Clubs 2 Rotaract Clubs were

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also challenged with \$100,000 to find their own projects. Every month they will launch an event and invite the people involved for a cheque presentation. They will also donate \$100,000 to Foundation through District 7070.

They will have their Centennial Gala Dinner at the Fairmont Royal York on May 23rd.

Neil said that Hugh and he had discussed ideas regarding launching a Toronto-wide (of GTA) signature project. He said he has heard several "cool" ideas. This would be something that would get other clubs involved. This could be something that might be in line with the upcoming Rotary International Convention here in Toronto in 2018.

There are 23 other Clubs around the world that are turning 100 this year. He has contacted all of these clubs with the hopes of possibly partnering with some of them on projects. He mentioned a possible water project in Thailand.

Neil closed by mentioning an interesting idea he heard from Bill Patchett while on his Presidents' Training. Bill thinks that funding for **PolioPlus** is dropping since the Gates Challenge has ended, but the fight on eradicating Polio continues. Bill suggested that Clubs should look at getting members to donate \$20/year just for PolioPlus. Neil said that when he was in Evanston he saw the Arch Klumph wall in RI HQ where the pictures of RI members who donate US\$250,000 or more are displayed. Arch Klumph was the founder of the Rotary Foundation and made the 1st donation to it. On the wall is a plaque showing his initial donation of \$26.50. Neil is suggesting that his Club members donate \$26.50 which will strictly go to PolioPlus and is hoping that other Clubs might do the same.

Bernadette Hunkeler Brown thanked Neil and congratulated him on the programs they are

doing this year. She also wanted to thank him for his Club's cooperation over the years.

Foundation Walk Presentation -Bowmanville Rotary Club

Don Gleed, Past President of the Bowmanville Rotary Club and Mike Desrochers asked to make a short presentation on the upcoming Foundation walk in Bowmanville on Sunday, September 23rd. Don first mentioned that the Bowmanville Rotary Club met every Tuesday at 7:15 AM at the Trinity Church Hall and that they have a member that has 60 years of perfect attendance.

Don noted that the Foundation Walk will actually consist of 2 walks. There will be a 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ through Historic Downtown km walk Bowmanville which will be a self guided tour (guide book provide) that will take you past architectural treasures, hidden historic turreted home and unique notable features. There are optional stops along the way including the Bowmanville Museum. As incentive, Don says the tour will also take you past Mike Desrochers' home where he will be serving "Bloody Marys". There will also be a 6 "wilderness" $\frac{1}{2}$ km walk through the Bowmanville Valley. This walk will incorporate some of the Historic Town walk but will quickly take you into the Bowmanville creek Valley and Soper Creek Valley, where you can check out Rotary Park, the Rotary Butterfly Garden and Rotary Centennial Garden. Don noted that the Salmon are running in Bowmanville Creek and that the Club is helping to fund a "fish ladder". Currently some of the Bowmanville Rotarians are actually "lifting" salmon in the creek.

The walk begins at 10 am. Lunch will be at 11:30 am and they will be serving "roast beef on a bun". The will have a 50 foot tractor trailer BBQ on site. There will lots of other food as well.

Don noted that 12 of our members attended last year's walk and hopes we can get at least that number or more this year.

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Allison Williams - Youth Exchange Student Trip to Taiwan

President Hugh's daughter Alison was the Club's Outbound Youth Exchange student last year and returned home in June after spending the year in Taiwan. Alison wanted to give a brief presentation on her trip to Taiwan.

Allison lived in Taipei (the capital) during her stay in Taiwan. Taipei is the home of the 2nd highest building in the world, Taipei 101.

Taiwan is a "little island of the coast of China". Mountain run through the centre of the island and it is "very green" which she found "nice in the winter". The island is surrounded by oceans and there are lots of fish. Since there are many mountains, there are lots of waterfalls. The island is small and you can travel north to south in about 5 hours.

Taipei is a very modern city with a great subway system that she found "amazing". She said she was spoiled and that it wasn't like Toronto's. Taipei however, is very crowded. Since there is little place to expand, they build up. You don't see building less than 4 stories. The sidewalks are covered since they get monsoons there that bring a lot of rain. Her favorite spot was the big shopping district there. They had a great mall there where they had shops, movies, restaurants, etc. She said she bought a few things there (President Hugh interjected saying that "Alison left with 1 suitcase and returned with 5"). On New Year's Eve they set of fireworks from Taipei 101 which she thinks was amazing and suggests that the CN Tower should try this. Unfortunately she lost all of her pictures of it as her computer crashed. While the city is very modern, they are still very much in tune with their culture. It is a blend of the Eastern Asian and Western Cultures which Alison says "are blending in an interesting way".

The Rotary District hosting Alison in Taiwan was hosting a total of 33 Youth Exchange students. They would go on outings together a lot. They would go to such places as the zoo, etc. Her classmates in the school she attended were "very nice" and "funny". She misses them. She added that when they first met her they were "a little bit disappointed that she wasn't too tall". However, they got over that quickly and became good friends.

President Hugh added that while she was in Taiwan, Alison learned Mandarin Chinese and could now interact with Chinese here.
