Today's Speaker: Alice Otupiri -Classification Talk



President Michael introduced Alice and noted that she had been a member of the Nepean-Kanata Rotary Club and transferred to our Club back in November.

Alice began by saying she was born "many years ago" in Accra, Ghana (Northern Ghana). She went to high school there and was awarded a scholarship to come to Canada to study modern languages at Carlton University in Ottawa. She later went to the University of Western Ontario to get her education diploma. She was hired by the Ottawa-Carlton School Board to teach French Immersion courses. She went back to school and received a Masters Education Degree in Curriculum Planning which is her real passion. She has taught primary, junior and intermediate classes (grades 1 to 12) which had given he a "broader prospective". She retired in 2001 after 30 years of teaching.

During her career she used to come to Toronto in the summer to work. While there she met a University Engineering Student. After graduation he moved to Ottawa and Alice and he were married. They have a daughter who now lives in Etobicoke and is a Business team leader with Campbell's. Her

husband retired 4 years ago, but soon after had "open heart" surgery. They have now moved to Etobicoke so that they could be closer to their daughter and their grandchildren.

Alice said that she always wanted to do charity work. Her mother was a "7th Day Adventist" whose philosophy was that you were "put on this earth to serve". However, Alice didn't know how to go about it until she met a new Vice Principal at the school she was teaching at. She shared Alice's interest in Curriculum Planning and they became friends. She told her about wanting to do charity work. Her friend invited her to come to a Rotary Club meeting. Alice said she had never heard of Rotary at that time. However, when she "walked into the place" she knew that "this is where I belong". There were members in the club that were involved in all sorts of projects in South and Central America and in Africa. One member who was involved in shipping books to Africa became her "mentor". In her club's District (D7040) the District's "World" Committee met four times a year where the clubs shared information on the international projects they were involved in. Alice attended their meetings and found there were three clubs in their District with projects in Ghana. The Chair of her club's committee had been to Northern Ghana. Alice noted that Northern Ghana had two seasons; one hot and dry; the other wet. During the dry season many people come down to the south and do not "fare well". Her club was a "3H" club that supported projects that deal with "health, hunger and humanity". They thought it would be a "good idea" to try for a "matching grant" project in Northern Ghana (the matching grant projects requires a Rotary Club at the other end to administer). They put a project together and RI approved the grant. Some things that were involved were sending 50 medical kits that were tailored to a tropical area; setting up microcredit; etc. Alice said she also organized collecting clothes for orphans. They filled a 20 foot container to be sent to Ghana. They also packed all sorts of books into the container as well. She went to Tamale every July to monitor the project. She also worked on behalf of the other three clubs with projects in Ghana. Alice said that the Rotary Clubs in Northern Ghana are not in the rural areas; hence it is hard for

them to visit the projects as much as possible. That is the reason she went there to personally observe what was going on.

Alice now wanted to talk on the project she is currently involved in, "Comfort Stars Athletic Club". It began when her sister went back to Ghana to live. The rural area they had grown up in had now been "encroached" by the city and had become a ghetto. She wanted to try to take back her community. Her sister manages a Travel Agency there. She began working with 300 children there by giving them sporting equipment such as soccer balls, and basketball hoops. This led to the Comfort Stars Athletic Club, a boys' and girls' club for at-risk inner city children located at Labone, Accra, Ghana where they can participate in activities organized in conjunction with "Right to Play". The program helps with the "self esteem" (feel better about themselves) "I am. I will. I am a star." Alice came back and spoke to her club. Since this is not a "charitable" enterprise the money raised for the children went through the Rotary Club then sent to the children in Ghana. Alice wanted to do more. Some of the children went to school, some didn't. She wanted to start literacy classes and wanted to find sponsorship. She went outside of Rotary to find donors and formed partnerships. All cheques from the donors went through the Rotary Club. Since this is not a "matching grant" scenario, there was no need for a Rotary Club there. Alice would monitor the program personally. The only condition was that Alice provides regular financial reports and all receipts to the Club. She also sends reports and newsletters to all donors. Alice would stay four weeks teaching and eventually added another 2 She currently has 35 kids in her sponsorship program. The literacy sponsorships are \$100.00 for primary schools and \$200.00 for high school/university.

Frederik Martin – Frederik was happy to say that last year at our Robbie Burns Day celebration that our member Kirsty Duncan mentioned to him that she knew some "Scottish Highland Dancers" who she might be able to get to perform at the celebration. Frederik said that it had "completely slipped his mind". He said he will now put it on his calendar so that he can look into it for next year's Robbie Burns Day.

Gill Dugas – Gill was happy to say that Hands on Etobicoke had some upcoming projects scheduled and is "looking for club members who wish to join in the following projects";

St. Margaret's – Monday February 10th: Cooking and serving dinner at St. Margaret's New Toronto Church in Lakeshore to provide dinner for 30+homeless men in the Out of the Cold Program on Monday, February 10 and the community (100+). Gil hopes to divide up the task of cooking 4 trays of chicken, 2 trays of potatoes and 2 trays of vegetables, plus dessert from our own home kitchens and take the trays to the Church on Monday afternoon around 3 p.m. The church provides soup and bread. They also have a great kitchen, a cook and many helpers. Gill adds that "some of us will stay to help serve the meal from 5:30 to 7 p.m. to over 120 folks in the church basement".

St. Mathew's Church – Sunday, March 2nd and Sunday, April 6th: Out of the Cold Program lunches for St. Matthew's Church on Bloor, Sunday, March 2nd and Sunday, April 6th providing sandwiches, fruit, cookies and water in take away bags for 20 homeless men.

Youth without Shelter": Tentative Date: Week of March 24th (Day in the week to be confirmed - maybe Thursday 27) at Youth without Shelter from 10:00 am until finished (i.e. 3:30 pm). Lunch will be with the youth in the kitchen. Gill is looking for volunteers from Rotary Etobicoke and the Rotaractors in teams to paint 4 bedrooms (3 to 4 Volunteers in each room). The painting material will be provided by YWS (4 paint colours only – green, blue, white & brown). There will also be a "fun" challenge to see which team comes up with the best design for the room they are painting (the judge will be Judy Leroux from YWS). The design can be "anything – just not scary" and suitable for guys and girls (Amir will help with designs).

Ha<mark>ven on</mark> the Queensway — "Coldest Night of the Year" Fundraising Walk - Saturday, February 22nd: Gill says "it would be great and a lot of fun if Rotary Etobicoke puts in a team to raise funds for Haven on the Queensway's first - walk a few kilometers to raise funds in the "Coldest Night of the Year" event". The walk has a 2, 5 and 10 kilometer walk departing from Haven on the Queensway on Saturday, February 22 at 4 p.m. and will include hot chocolate stops along the way at the Queensway Audit and RONA, both sponsoring the event along with Canadian Tire. Haven on the Queensway hopes to raise \$50,000 for its in house food bank, clothes closet, pregnancy care and Alcoholics Anonymous and 12 Stop programming as well as outreach initiatives such as its monthly Lakeshore Dinner and its Hope with Wheels program which sends a team out to Etobicoke and the downtown core each Tuesday evening in a mobile humanitarian van to reach out to approximately 90 of the city's homeless each week. Website: www.coldestnightoftheyear.org. It is on Saturday, February 22 at 4 p.m. for an hour or so. Hot chocolate en route and ends up at Haven for a

celebratory chili (the same chili they serve on their humanitarian bus every Tuesday). Everyone participating gets an iconic gray toque with a multi-coloured pom-pom to wear during the walk. The location: Haven on the Queensway, 1533 The Queensway (Opposite the Queensway Cathedral – just down from IKEA). Next Monday, Rotary Etobicoke will deliver 6 boxes of our rice/soy food from our packing project and 10 thick hoodies, socks and other items for Haven's Hope With Wheels which visits homeless youth in Etobicoke and the downtown core every Tuesday.
