Today's Speakers – Greg Dobson <mark>– Ca</mark>mp Enterprise Update



Greg has been doing Camp Enterprise for our Club for the past 7 years and is presenting a quick overview of the 2014 C.E. Greg said that since he took over the program he has developed a "set structure" that he worked very well. The program changed 7 years ago thanks to an idea presented by Michael Bell. It became a new process called "Change the World". A "Breakfast of Champions" was held with representatives of the schools, the Board, and the Club to say that we needed "help and input" to make a more effective Camp Enterprise program. With a new process in place, it has now evolved.

Greg says the first step is to email the "champs" from each school. The champs are designated people from each school (principal, guidance counsellor, teacher, etc). He then on the first Monday after Spring Break he sends them their "champ binder" and a poster to be displayed in the school. This is how they recruit the students for C.E.

In May, the students chosen (and their parents) get a confirmation letter (as does the student's school). Camp Enterprise is held in June. Students are recruited from all Etobicoke High Schools (but several have not participated recently) and from SEYA (through LAMP). Greg says the program involves inspiring the students on how they can "change your world" and their world is their high school. Greg says he has each day structured beginning with "ice breakers" on the Thursday (the "marshmallow game"). Lynda Ryder does and introduction of Rotary and background on "how to get into fundraising". She leads the student in a game that helps show "how to raise money for charities" (selling t-shirts). She also gives the students some "facts and figures" on charity. That evening there is the "improv" with the help of Vanessa Koch (a Camp Enterprise alumni) Vanessa has been helping out at Camp Enterprise for the last 10 years. This helps the students get to know each other better. On Friday, a representative of the Ministry of Labour (who have been part of Camp Enterprise for 20 years) is there. He engaged the students in a game "to sell chocolate bars". This is used to illustrate selling techniques, negotiations, and resources available. The teams then start work on putting their plans together for their own charity presentation. The winning team will get \$2000 "seed money" to put their plan into action. Greg also wanted to thank the Rotaractors from York University for their mentorship during C.E. The groups presented their ideas to them and they could critique. Spencer Winson (Mark's son and a Camp Enterprise grad) has also been a regular contributor to Camp Enterprise for many years. Saturday is presentation day for the teams to show how their charity fundraising proposal has evolved and why they should be chosen to win the \$2000. The presentations are voted on by the students. The winning team this year was Richmond Collegiate (Make a Wish). They receive the \$2000 seed money and have a deadline of December to get their fundraiser off the ground.

Greg says his Camp Enterprise program has a structured recruiting program and a structured program for each day of the camp, but asked "what is missing"? Greg says he needs help with

mentorship of the students from the winning team after Camp Enterprise to help get their fundraising campaign going.

Greg thinks Camp Enterprise is a great success and thinks the kids are "amazing". These are the kids that are truly going to help "change the world".

Chris Glover from TDSB says it is "great what you are doing" and was glad to see the students from SHEA here today to see Greg's presentation. He says he will offer his support in helping to make all of the schools be more aware of the program.

Ron Miller added that his daughter Kathleen attended this year's Camp Enterprise and that her team finished 2nd (by 2 votes) with their presentation. However, Kathleen took what she had learned at Camp Enterprise and used it to help her YPI (Youth Philanthropy Initiative) team at Father Redmond win their charity fundraiser presentation for all of the Grade 10's. They won \$5000 for their selected charity Women's' Habitat. Kathleen says she learned a lot at Camp Enterprise and was very happy that she was able to attend.

President Michael says Greg is an excellent example of a "passionate Rotarian" and is helping to "make the community a better place"

Jack Fleming noted the Vocational Services Committee and 7 of our Rotarian (Brock Buchanan, Jay Carey, Peter Dusek, Martina Ernst, Michael Lu, Theresa Sherwood, and Jack) have been involved in a mentorship program with students at SHEA. They had a session in November/December and just finished a six week session in April/May/June. The process involved building a "business plan" then to execute that plan. Jack said he is very appreciative of the work our members did in this program. He would like to congratulate the students who were the top performers and asked Irma Sefs and Kevin DeSouza to introduce the award winners and present them with their certificates. Jack also presented a cheque for \$500 to Principal Rizwana Jafri for a donation to the SHEA Scholarship Fund.



Jack wanted to mention a new initiative the Vocational Services Committee is contemplating for the fall of 2014. Essentially, the idea is for Rotary Etobicoke to provide a 'support service' to new entrepreneurs. Normally, people starting up a new business do it on their own with little outside counsel and support. The idea is to gather a team of Rotarians and offer a 3-4 hour strategy / planning activity. The business would provide their Business Plan and an indication of their current activities and the challenges they face. Jack and his group would be a sounding board for the business owner; and would explore different thoughts and ideas to help them gain a broader perspective.

The work that they have been doing with Elizabeth Correia relates to this initiative. So...knowing Elizabeth is trying to expand her business to serve girls and women, she was asked if she would like to be 'their pilot project'. In essence, they used this opportunity to explore her opportunities and her challenges. It turned out to be a very constructive session.

He has not yet debriefed with the Rotary Team about how the process worked and what we might do when we offer this service in the fall. He will do that in July after Ribfest. Jack, Martina Ernst, Lynda Ryder participated in this session with Elizabeth, as did Rhena Fleming. Rhena has her own experience in running a small business, but her primary job in the session was to take notes on a laptop. Those notes were shared with Elizabeth and with the Team.

One of the outcomes was a decision to contact TDSB and to make them aware of Elizabeth and her work. Jack contacted Chris Glover. Then, Chris suggested getting Jim Spyropoulos involved. Jim was on his way to today's luncheon meeting, but ended up stopped on the DVP due to an accident. In spite of that, they were able to do a conference call with him on Chris's cellphone prior to the luncheon. Jack says "it was a very good call and Jim suggested a number of next steps".
