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Today's Speaker – Banesh<mark>a Sh</mark>ah – Families For Children



Jack Fleming introduced Banesha. Jack said it was a "real pleasure" to introduce her as she has been a "friend and colleague" for almost 25 vears. Jack said that first met her when they worked together at Confederation Life where she was responsible for all aspects of product development. She is an Actuary who specializes in "all sorts of insurance". Through their friendship between their families, convinced her she should start "her own practice". For the past 15 years she has been an "independent consultant helping clients on both product development and strategic initiatives" (Banasha Shah Consulting Services, Inc.). She has collaborated with Jack on many

projects. Jack said she is a "fabulous advisor" to deal with.

In her spare time, she has a husband, a son and two daughters. She is here today to talk about the "support work she is doing in India" with Families for Children

Banasha wanted to begin by saying she first visited the "Families for Children" orphanage in India 1 year ago. "Families for Children" is a non-profit, non-sectarian agency private, operating homes that care for hundreds of destitute children and women in India and Bangladesh. FFC was founded in 1971 by Sandra Simpson from Montreal. FFC India is located in the city of Coimbatore, Tamil Nadu State in southern India. They have 450 children residing at their Homes in Coimbatore. Over 1/3 of the children are "special needs" who are physically or mentally handicapped. All of the children are educated, served nutritious meals and have healthcare provided. The children are raised by a "caring staff of care givers" in a "loving family environment" Excellent locally hired Special Education teachers are also employed to care for these children.

Banesha said that she found out about FFC about 20 years ago and "knew immediately that she would become involved". She and her husband sponsored a child there. Her daughter Sophie began to make jewellery that she could sell with the money going to FFC. In December 2014, she and Sophie went to India to visit FFC India and both were "truly amazed by the experience". The facility is comprised of 6

houses including the Special Care centre, a toddler's house, and Harry's House which is a home for young boys. They also have the FFC Primary School. Every child gets an education. The curriculum has been set by volunteer teachers from Canada.

There are also some adults living at FFC. Many of these adults came here as children and grew up here. In most cases these people are giving back by working at FFC in various capacities or participating in FFC's various projects or handcraft production. This helps to make FFC "self sustaining" and helps promote "independence by providing meaningful work for the residents. It also provides a source of income.

Some examples are FFC's mushroom farm. They hang bags made of hay in a "dark, damp" spot, water it daily and grow "oyster" mushrooms. These are very popular in India and are easily sold. They have an Organic garden that covers about every square metre of useable land to grow food for the children. They also compost all scraps from the kitchen which is added to the soil to make it rich. There is a ladies sewing co-op. A volunteer taught the sewing technique to the ladies. They use donated scraps from local tailors to make various things that they can sell. They also had a pile of old pants and jeans that were destined for the garbage, so they made a "challenge" to see if there was a more environmentally favourable alternative. They came up with the idea of sewing the jean fabric into back packs for school children. This not only saved the old material from being wasted, but also cut down on the number of backpacks that would have to be purchased. As it turned out, the kids loved the custom-made backpacks, as each child had his own unique material and design. There were many other creative designs such as yoga bags and duffle bags. They also do "silk weaving"

which uses discarded silk ends from the mills. It is processed and spun into yarn which the weavers at FFC use to produce small area rugs and mats. They also use "recycled paper to make greeting cards which are hand painted by some of the residents. Another project is bee keeping which produces honey that they can sell.

Another of the projects is the "House of Hope" where they are teaching "skills" to young adults such as cooking and bakery skills.

Banesha now wanted to talk about volunteering in India. Her daughter Sophie was 14 when they visited FFC. They didn't know what they were going to do there for a week. They were told to just "spend the time being part of what is going on". They spent time with the children, some of which a "severe disabilities". The care givers "do everything that is necessary for the children (feed, change, etc). The volunteers allow the care givers the time to do other things. While there they helped make different things with beads (bracelets, necklaces, etc) that could also be sold.

The monthly cost of running FFC is approximately \$30,000 (\$CAN) and \$30,000 for their other facility in Bangladesh. FFC does not pay for office rental as FFC volunteers work out of their homes. FFC raises its money through private donations, special projects, handcraft sales, fashion show, private garage sales, dances and other individual or group-sponsored events.

Banesha says FFC "changes lives". The child that she and her husband sponsored 20 years ago was a "bright student" who eventually went to college.
