Rotary International President John Germ's Monthly Message - December 2016

Dear Fellow Rotarians:

I joined Rotary as an engineer. There are almost as many classifications in the profession of engineering as there are in Rotary, but I happen to be a mechanical engineer. A mechanical engineer calculates the heating and cooling loads for a new building, makes sure the right lights are in the right places, and plans the plumbing so your hot water pipe doesn't end in a drinking fountain.

Mechanical engineers don't stand out in a crowd, and they don't call attention to themselves with what they do. You probably haven't thought much about the engineers who designed the buildings you use, the car you drive, or the traffic patterns you follow. But every time you get in an elevator, turn the key in your ignition, or cross the street when the light says go, you are entrusting your life to an engineer somewhere whom you've

never met. You trust that your elevator will open at the floor you want it to. You trust that your car will start and stop as it should. You trust that the traffic light is going to turn red before the walk light goes on. Every day, you put your life in the hands of people whose names you do not know and whom you might never meet. You might not think about them at all - but they touch your lives every day.

I could draw the same parallel to any number of other vocations - ordinary occupations with the same kind of lifechanging impact. In so many ways - some of which we see and some we don't - our vocations allow us to help other people live better, safer, and healthier lives.

Just like the work we do in Rotary.

Through our vocations and in our clubs, in our communities, and across continents, we are touching the lives of people we don't know and might never meet. And in every part of the world, every single day, whether they know it or not, people are living better, safer, and healthier lives because of the work of Rotary.

The people we help might not have met a single Rotarian. They might not even know that Rotary exists. But they are drinking clean water from a bore well that Rotary dug. They're learning to read with books that Rotary gave them. They're living lives that are better, happier, and healthier - because of *Rotary Serving Humanity*.



Rotary Foundation Chair, Kaylan Banerjee's Monthly Message - December 2016 - Responsible investing for doing good

Dear fellow Rotarians,



Yes, the Foundation considers both financial and social returns when making an investment decision. Our Investment Committee encourages our investment consultant and its managers to invest in companies that comply with laws, regulations, ethical standards, and national or international norms and are aligned with Rotary values.

We also consider how each of our investment managers incorporates socially responsible investing as part of their process. Currently seven of these managers, responsible for about 36 percent of the Foundation's total assets, were signatories to the United Nations Principles

for Responsible Investment. These principles offer possible actions for incorporating environmental, social, and governance issues - such as climate change, public and workplace safety. and shareholder rights - into investment practice. Following these principles could reduce risk, improve returns, and better align our portfolio with our mission.

Does this mean the Foundation will categorically exclude specific companies or industries from investment? That's where the "no' part of my answer comes in. Given Rotary's diverse membership and its various cultural beliefs, agreeing on such restrictions would be extremely difficult.

The Trustees of The Rotary Foundation and the Rotarian financial experts on our Investment Committee take their job very seriously. Rotarians have entrusted us with millions of dollars that they have designated to do good in the world. Our capacity to provide clean water and education, improve health care and economic development, and promote peace depends heavily on our investment income. So it is especially important that we invest your gifts wisely.

Because The Rotary Foundation belongs to all of us, we believe strongly in transparency. To that end, we have posted a wealth of information on www.rotary.org. You can find audited statements for the Foundation for the past three years and tax returns for the past six years, along with extensive material on investment practices, philosophy, and historical returns. I hope this detailed information will reinforce your confidence in our Foundation and inspire your continued generosity.

Here are some Highlights:

District Governor Elect Neil Phillips welcomed all of the Rotary District 7070 Club Presidents and their Rotary Club

Rotary Foundation Directors/Chairs tot The Oshawa Golf and Curling Club and sent out a special welcome to Past Rotary International President Wilf Wilkinson and Past Chair of the Trustees of the Rotary Foundation, Dr. Bob Scott and to the many Past District Governors who continue to serve our District 7070 so well.

PDG Bill Patchett is still looking for the commitment from 100% of the clubs in our district to make a commitment to donate funds to End Polio and to The Rotary Foundation for this new 2016-17 Rotary year. 
District Governor Jim Louttit talked about his membership goal of net 50 members in the District this year. We are

Jim reminded everyone that our District 7070 goal for donations to the Rotary Foundation this year is \$1 million.


He thanked everyone for attending the District Conference and has had 90% positive feedback from those who attended and filled out the survey.

PDG Dr. Bob Scott, gave an update on the Global Polio Eradication Initiative and its partners: Rotary, The WHO, the

PDG Lars Heriksson, our District 7070 Grants Chair gave us a brief description of how the money raised from the





PDG Ron Denham, Chair Emeritus of WASRAG (Water and Sanitation Rotary Action Group) presented a new way to give to the Rotary Foundation specifically called "Hope For Millions – Water and Sanitation Major Gifts Initiative". Ron said that today 663 million people still lack access to safe water and 2.4 billion people still have no sanitation. 8,000 children stll die every day. Women and children, usually girls spend 6 hours a day hauling water. They miss school and drop out. . 40 billion hours are spent hauling water. BUT Rotarians are liberating women and children from hauling water: digging wells and bore holes, rainwater harvesting, household filters purifying water, SODIS (solar water disinfection), sand, earth and concrete dams, and pipeline distribution. And Rotary has helped these same women start small businesses. Ron said that Rotary has provided water but so much more, by helping improve life and livelihood: People create economic value, Micro-bank gives them

confidence and hope, Crops and livestock flourish, Food supply is assured, poverty reduced, Children are healthier, and Youth, especially girls, are being educated. He wants us to so much more. He encouraged us to think bigger: to embrace the entire WASH environment. Empower the community, Build capacity, change behaviour, Collaborate: clubs, governments, NGOs, to

Develop robust linkages with local authorities and to Think "development" not "charity".

He encourage us to donate to the WAS MGI (water and sanitation major gifts initiative) - A Rotary Foundation program for major donorswith Endowed and Term Gifts., The Goal of \$25 million over 3 years with Spendable earnings for Global Grants in Annual Programs Fund,. Current initiatives include WinS, US AID, Mali. And working with Wasrag. He told us aboout Elizabeth, who used to haul water, now grow cabbages in her own business and earns \$1,500 per year for one reason – to send her daughter to school.

Ron encouraged everyone to join WASRAG at www.wasrag.org and those who are going to the Rotary International Convention in Atlanta to join him on May 27, 2017 for the Convention for WWS 9 World Water Summit 9 and see WASRAG in action.

SPECIAL AWARDS PRESENTATION:

PDG Rob Leek had the pleasure of announcing and presenting the Rotary District 7070 Dr. Bob Scott Disease



Prevention Award for 2015-16. This award is made to a Rotarian, Rotary Club or a friend of Rotary who, in the judgment of the District Governor, made a significant contribution to disease prevention and treatment in Rotary District 7070 and beyond. Since this award has been created two years ago, there have been two recipients: Bill Gates, Jr. (for 2013-14), and William Patchett (for 2014-15). This award is not necessarily given annually.

District 7070 named the award to honor Dr. Bob Scott, past PolioPlus Chair and past RI vice president, for his work as Rotary's global ambassador in support of Rotary's fight to end polio. During his eight years as RI PolioPlus

Chair, Bob and his wife Ann traveled thousands of miles around the globe. He is credited with having raised millions of dollars from world leaders in the fight to end polio. The award will be presented in Dr. Scott's name to individuals or organizations who have made a difference in the health and wellbeing of others on a local, national or international level.

And the 2015-16 awardee is PDG Ron Denham. As Chair Emeritus of WASRAG the Water and Sanitation Rotary Action Group, Ron Denham has addressed the United Nations on the need for water programs. He first joined Rotary in Welland in 1958 moving to the Rotary Club of Toronto Eglinton in 1964. He was club president in 1973-74 and District Governor in 1993-94. Ron is an Arch Klumph Society member and was presented with the "Service Above

Self" Award by RI in 2005. In 2014, Ron spoke to the United Nations, New York, about the importance of clean and potable water in changing the lives of millions around the world. For a number of years Ron has been the General Coordinator of the RI Water Resources Task Force assisting clubs around the world to be involved in water and sanitation projects in Kenya, Ethiopia, Uganda, Ghana and other countries. Since 2007, WASRAG has grown to 1,800 members and WASRAG has helped over 2 million people with Rotary's effort to clean safe water and sanitation programs throughout the world.

Past District Governor Michael Bell handed out Rotary Foundation Awards to District 7070 Rotary Clubs who achieved some major milestones in their donations to The Rotary Foundation in 2015-16:

TOP THREE PER CAPIITA CLUBS IN ANNUAL PROGRAMS FUND GIIVIING

Banners are given to the top three per capita giving clubs in each district. To be eligible, clubs must achieve a minimum \$50 per capita. This annual banner recognition is awarded at the conclusion of the Rotary year. This year the third highest amount per capita donated to The Rotary Foundation, in District 7070 went to the Rotary Club of Cobourg; the second highest club was the Rotary Club of Woodbridge; and the highest amount per capita donated to The Rotary Foundation, in District 7070 went to The Rotary Club of Toronto Don Mills (at \$655.86 US per member). Congratulations to all three outstanding clubs.

100 PERCENT ROTARY FOUNDATION SUSTAINING MEMBER CLUB BANNER

Rotary clubs must achieve a US\$100 per capita **and** every active member of the club must personally contribute US\$100 or more to the Annual Programs Fund during the Rotary year. This annual (Every Rotarian Every Year) banner recognition is awarded at the conclusion of the Rotary year, and is based on active membership as of June 30, 2016. For 2016, there were two Rotary Clubs to achieve this goal. Congratulations to **The Rotary Clubs of Aurora and North Scarborough.**

100 PERCENT ROTARY FOUNDATION GIVING CLUB

This annual banner recognition is awarded at the conclusion of the Rotary year, and is based on active membership as of June 30, 2016. Rotary clubs, in which every member contributes to The Rotary Foundation and the average contribution is at least US\$100 per capita or more to any Rotary Foundation gift designation. For 2016, there were 14 Rotary Clubs to achieve this goal. Congratulations to The Rotary Clubs of Toronto Don Mills, Woodbridge, Cobourg, Aurora, North Scarborough, Parkdale High Park, Port Hope, Scarborough Bluffs, Toronto Humber, Toronto Skyline, Toronto West, Toronto Sunrise, Wellington and York..

At the November 16 District 7070 Rotary Foundation Awards Dinner in Oshawa, Past District Governor Lars Henrikkson, our Chair of the District 7070 Rotary Foundation Grants Committee announced the awardees of four additional district grant projects.

Richmond Hill

Toilets for Mbahe Primary School, Tanzania (\$4,500)

The Richmond Hill Club in cooperation with the Rotary Clubs of Newmarket, Toronto West, Woodbridge and York are building new toilets for the students at the Mbahe Primary School in the Kilimanjaro Region of Tanzania. The current toilets are completely worn out, leaving the students with no privacy when going to the toilets.

North Scarborough

Adopt A School – Integrated Thinking Camp (\$750)

This project is taking 4 classes of Grade 6 & 7 students on a tour to University of Toronto to expose the students to higher studies. The aim is to encourage the students to stay in school and see themselves continue to university studies.

Whitby

Hurricane Relief for Les Cayes and are in Haiti (\$4,500)

The Rotary Club of Whitby together with a number of Clubs in the District will work on building basic shelters and make quick repairs to schools in areas in Haiti hard hit by the recent hurricane. The work will be done in cooperation with local Rotarians in Haiti. The Whitby Club has been working in Haiti for a number of years; hence, their coordinating role for this project.

Woodbridge

Care for Seniors, Vaughan (\$1,000)

This project by the Rotary Club of Woodbridge will provide safe and caring environment for elderly diagnosed with early stage of Alzheimer's or Dementia. Through person-centered interventions, participants will gain and develop essential skill and abilities to maintain self-care and self-assistance

Start planning District Grant projects for the 2017-18 Rotary year

Clubs should start planning for District Grant projects for next Rotary year. The application form is available on the District's website. The matching formula remains the same as the last couple of years, encouraging Clubs to cooperate. Funding will increase with the number of Clubs in the project.,

Past winners of this award have included:



The Nakuru WASH in Schools Project- Global Grant #1416989 - \$135,524 US

The Rotary Club of Toronto Eglinton is pleased to report that along with our host partner the Rotary Club of Ntinda, we have completed construction and training of the WASH project in 6 schools around Nakuru Kenya.

The focus of this project was to create a Model WASH in Schools program in 3 elementary schools and 3 secondary schools in the impoverished area around Nakuru where we had been building household tanks.

These schools had no access to municipal water supply and limited water storage facilities to capture run off during

the rainy season. The latrines were in poor condition and insufficient for the number of children in attendance. Handwashing facilities were nonexistent. Open defecation was prevalent. The ground water in this area is high in fluoride making well water harmful to drink.

It has been demonstrated that quality WASH in school programs can effectively reduce transmission of diseases, increase school attendance and increase the retention rate of female students to graduation. And so we set to work!

Each School received a 30,000 litre rainwater harvesting tank with required gutters to collect the rainfall during the rainy season. In addition, a new block of latrines for boys and girls with privacy walls and attached hand washing stations were constructed. To encourage the retention of female students, a Menstrual Hygiene Management component was supported in each school with latrines equipped with a wash station and young women receiving health education and a supply of sanitary linens.

We are very pleased with the outcomes of the project and are eager to share our learning with the Rotary world.

This project could not have been possible without the phenomenal support of the following Rotary Clubs in D7070: Alliston, East York, Oshawa-Parkwood, Port Perry, Picton, Toronto, Etobicoke, Markham Sunrise, Scarborough Twilight, Uxbridge, Whitby Wellington and Rotary Clubs all across Canada from British Columbia to Newfoundland. Rotary News

After involvement in several drives in the past year, it became apparent that there is a desire, from people living in Southern Ontario, to reach out to northern First Nations communities by collecting in-kind items needed by communities. The difficulty and cost of transportation were the main hurdles. HIP Director, John Andras, took the bull by the horns.

After consultations with INAC and engagement by Trucks for Change and Wasaya Airlines, HIP has negotiated a nocharge in-kind goods delivery program through Pickle Lake to all communities served by Wasaya. Communities are asked of their specific needs which guide collections and ensures only needed goods are received. It is done with great respect and allows the First Nations leadership to guide and/or reject the donation process.

The KichenuhmaykoosibInninuwug (KI) community was the first test. Nine skids of targeted donations were collected along with 8 skids of warm outerwear (over 1,100 coats, mitts, toques, scarves, sweaters, snow pants, boots, etc.) to be used in 9 communities. Donations from Toronto, Peterborough and Fenlon Falls were shipped to Gardewine Transport, trucked to Pickle Lake and flown by Wasaya to KI and 8 other communities.

There are additional drives for Kasabonika FN (over 500 mostly new coats), Neskantaga and Bearskin Lake FN that will be using this transportation link over the next month.

On Oct. 29th, the Rotary Club of Winnipeg hosted Dr. Cindy Blackstock at a special club meeting. There were 110 in attendance (33 were Rotarians). There was a traditional blessing followed by Dr. Blackstock's presentation on her campaign for equity for aboriginal children and advocacy. You can read about her entire presentation on our website under Resources/Powerpoint Presentations. Great work by David Newman and the committee on organizing this event.

On Nov. 18th, the new Dean of the Faculty of Law, University of Manitoba, Dr. Jonathan Black-Branch and HIP Director, David Newman spent a day at Turtle Lodge on Sagkeeng First Nation with about 100 other dominant society leaders known to have an interest in learning from Indigenous Elders about the history, values, laws and spirituality of Indigenous Peoples, but especially about how to lead a good life in balance and harmony in alignment with the Great Spirit and Mother Nature. On the drive back and forth, inspired by the teachings, the Dean, an International Law and non-proliferation and disarmament of nuclear weapons expert and practitioner, and David discussed how Rotarians and Indigenous Peoples locally, regionally and globally working with the international experts like the Dean might raise awareness and build capacity about this increasing threat to humankind. Canada can and must be the world leader. No one else has the credibility or capacity to advance the initiative. What more fitting year to do this than in our 150th anniversary as a country. Stay tuned for a request to HIP and other Rotary groups to support a roundtable discussion in Winnipeg to get the ball rolling led by the Dean of Robson Hall Law School and his international counterparts. A wonderful chance to collaborate to advance the Indigenous world view and service above self Rotary motto when both are urgently needed to be put into action process of nuclear disarmament until fully achieved for the sake of the survival of the whole human family and the health of Mother Earth.

The Rotary Club of Palgrave (and several other groups and individuals) have joined in a partnership project with DAREarts First Roots. DAREarts and the Stratford Festival have formed a team to travel to four northern communities where 30 youth from each community will engage in an intensive week of multi-arts workshops. Each community will share traditional stories involving a bear which will then be showcased.

In August 2017, a new play about a polar bear encountering change on the Canadian northern land will premiere at Stratford. The youths' creative works will be the frame of reference for the production called "The Breathing Hole". We will let you know once we know more about dates. Our December 2016 Message from HIP Chair, Chris Snyder

All Canadians are saddened whenever they hear of a young person taking their own life. This holds true of the rash of suicides that take place in many of the fly-in communities in the north. The reasons behind these are complex and the solutions are elusive. Loss of hope is one constant. Another is lack of activities for the young people. There is a new online initiative being conducted by a number of Indigenous people including HIP Director, Andre

Morriseau. It is directed at young people and the organization is called *We Matter* (<u>WE MATTER | We Matter</u>). This online website contains a number of true stories composed by Indigenous people who have gone through tough times, sometimes attempting taking their own life but have persevered and pulled through. It invites people to tell their own stories online.


One is told by famed author Joseph Boyden who himself tried to take his own life as a young person. I would encourage you to look at it. I found it insightful and inspiring. I am sure it will help many Indigenous young people. On behalf of the Board, I wish you a happy holiday season and may 2017 bring further reconciliation between our

The Rotary Rose Parade Float Committee announced its 38th consecutive entry in the Pasadena Tournament of Roses, Rose Parade on January 2, 2017. This colorful traveling dragon carries the six areas of focus throughout the world as shown in the luggage decals and wears a 100 year medallion. This design blends the Tournament of Roses theme "Echoes of Success" honoring those individuals who and entities which have contributed to the success of others with the Rotary Foundation Centennial Celebration theme "Doing Good in the World" which is also the theme of the Float. The 2017 Float promotes and celebrates the 100 years of

The Rotary Foundation. The Foundation empowers Rotarians to travel throughout the world and create and complete projects which serve people in need in six areas of focus which are: promoting peace, fighting disease, providing clean water, saving mothers and children, supporting education, and growing local economies. The spectacular and colorful dragon is clearly a world traveler carrying luggage decorated with the six symbols of the areas of focus. The Dragon also is proudly wearing a necklace with a medallion marked 100 for the 100 years of service.

Rotarians, Clubs and Districts in the United States and Canada donate all of the money to pay for the float. Approximately ninety-three percent of the money raised goes to costs directly into building, decorating and entering the float in the parade. The balance of the funds raised pay for business, banking, insurance and other miscellaneous costs related to the float and hosting the RI President while attending the parade and other related activities. None of the money raised for float construction is spent on professional staff or committee perks.

Why do we enter a float in the Rose Parade?

Paul Harris said, "In the promotion of Rotary, it is important to reach large numbers and you cannot reach them privately." Statistics have proven that when Rotary International and/or the Rotary Foundation creates public relations events and promotes Rotary membership increases as well as general knowledge of Rotary. By supporting the Float, you can assist in a public relations effort to do BOTH!

When Rotary International's directors approved the first entry in the parade over 38 years ago, they saw in it an unrivaled opportunity to bring Rotary's name into public view. They reasoned that an eye-catching float would capture the interest of network commentators and remind the world, of Rotary's good works. And so it has! And, this year this effort is doubly important as we are publicizing the 100 years of achievement by The Rotary Foundation!!!

Nearly 70 million households see the Rose Parade, this year held on Monday, January 2, 2017 as the Rose Parade is never held on a Sunday. The Rose Parade is seen by an estimated U.S. audience of almost 42 million households and

an estimated international audience of 28 million households in over 243 territories. The Pasadena Police Department estimates that approximately 700,000 spectators view the Rose Parade in person. Another 144,000 visit the Parade Float Decorating Sites and/or the Post Parade Float Viewing Area where the floats are on display for two days. For the 38th consecutive year the Committee again proudly presents its float to North America and the world. And each year, more clubs enthusiastically contribute financial support to this most important Rotary Foundation public relations project.

MEMBERSHIP CHALLENGE

From District 7070 membership Chair Virginia O'Reilly

At the District 7070 Conference this year, District Governor Jim Louttit issued this challenge to all Rotarians and their Rotary Clubs in District 7070. Where does your club stand on meeting this challenge?

The **CHALLENGE!**

A Club achieves 2 of the following goals:

- A net gain in membership. Small clubs (up to 50 members) must achieve a net gain of at least one member; Large clubs (51 or more members) must achieve a net gain of at least two members.
- Improve the member retention rate by at least 1 percent from last year, Or, maintain 100 percent retention.
- Induct new members under the age of 40. Clubs with up to 50 members must induct a minimum of 2 new members under age 40; Clubs with 51 or more members must induct four.
- The new members must create profiles on My Rotary.

And, a Club achieves 2 of the following goals:

- Hold a visioning session, and Develop a plan based on the session with at least 1st action timeline
- Do a club assessment, and hold an assembly with the entire club to share the findings
- Complete at least 2 changes to improve your club based on findings from a Visioning/Club assessment
- At least 2 members attend a District Membership Seminar.
- Every new member is assigned a mentor who, within 3 months of the new member joining the club, does at least 2 the following 3 things:
 - Meets with the new member to learn about what they are looking for in Rotary and how they can help get them connected and involved;
 - Accompanies them to at least one make-up meeting;
 - o Joins them in at least one club activity (e.g., committee meeting, hands on project, etc.).

The PRIZE! \$5000 – Funds to be used towards a Community project. all clubs who successfully meet the challenge will be entered into a draw for the prize monies (e.g. 3 prizes of \$2500, \$1500, \$1000)

What Is The Rotary Leadership Institute (RLI)

RLI is a grassroots coalition of Rotary districts implementing a leadership development program for "potential" leaders of Rotary CLUBS. RLI believes that excellent CLUB leadership (all types of club leaders) is essential to the future of Rotary in a complex and fast changing world. Most Rotarians have not been exposed to the great scope of Rotary around the world and have not considered what leadership skills are necessary to move Rotary forward. RLI strongly believes that a good Rotary Club leader must know the evolution of Rotary, its current status and activities in the world and have a vision for what Rotary can be in the future.

RLI provides a three day non-consecutive basic course in both Rotary knowledge and leadership skills, especially for voluntary organizations. RLI follows an adult learning approach with facilitated discussion led by trained Rotary facilitators.

The cost is \$70 per Rotarian per course. This cost covers course materials, coffee breaks and lunch. Usually the Rotary club covers the cost for their members to attend since the club will be the beneficiary of a more knowledgeable membership.

Part I and Part II and Part III will be held on April 22, 2017 at Seneca College (Finch Campus), Toronto. Ontario (8:30 am to 4:00 pm)

REMINDER: Club Visioning - Where is your club going to be in 5 Years?

Rotary Clubs, like any other organizations, need to have a plan for where they are heading. In order to assist Clubs to develop a vision, the District has a team of experienced Rotarians who can facilitate visioning sessions. Since we started the program, five or six years ago, close to 40 Cubs have held sessions. A few Clubs have held two or three session, up-dating their vision on a regular basis.

Why do we need vision?

Visioning facilitation helps a Rotary Club to develop its own vision and then sets out the steps necessary to achieve that vision. It is worth noting that the result is not a vision set out by the District or Rotary International. Instead, the result is a vision designed and endorsed by the Club's own members. This vision will help to ensure consensus, continuity and consistency in the Club leadership and programming, to set the stage for future progress.
