Our goal is to strengthen the capacity of communities to support basic education and literacy, reduce gender disparity in education, and increase adult literacy.

Literacy will be featured in the 3R Hub at the District Conference and will include literacy puzzles and a vocabulary challenge. As well, there will be an interactive challenge to demonstrate Canada's literacy performance compared to OECD countries.



Rotary International President John Germ's Monthly Message – September 2016



Dear Fellow Rotarians:

In the summer of 1917, only a few months after the United States entered the first world war, Rotary held its eighth annual convention in Atlanta. Although many Rotarians at the time thought the convention should be canceled, the Board of Directors ultimately agreed with Paul Harris that it should continue as planned. In the midst of such uncertainty and fear, Harris penned, as part of his convention greeting, some of the mostquoted words in Rotary:

Individual effort when well directed can accomplish much, but the greatest good must necessarily come from the combined efforts of many men. Individual effort may be turned to individual needs but combined effort should be dedicated to the service of mankind. The power of combined effort knows no limitation.

Fittingly, it was at this convention that then President Arch C. Klumph proposed a Rotary endowment fund "for the

purpose of doing good in the world." The power of combined effort was joined by a new power: that of combined resources. It was a combination that has proved unstoppable and has been behind so much of Rotary's work for the last 100 years. Today, it is difficult to imagine Rotary without its Foundation. It was the Foundation that turned Rotary from an organization of local clubs into an international force for good with the power to change the world.

In this Rotary year, we are marking the centennial of our Rotary Foundation in the city where it all began: Atlanta. Our 108th Rotary International Convention promises to be one of the most exciting yet, with inspiring speakers, great entertainment, and a wide array of breakout sessions to help you move your Rotary service forward. Rotary Foundation Chair, Kaylan Banerjee's Monthly Message - September 2016 - Literacy offers the key to a better future

Dear fellow Rotarians,

A few months ago, I read a story in this magazine about a man named Carl Sanders, a member of the Rotary Club of Kenosha, Wis. Sanders had developed a successful painting business despite the fact that he could not read – a shameful secret that he struggled to keep to himself.

This story surprised me a little. I tend to think of illiteracy as a problem that mainly afflicts people in poor countries, not U.S. Rotarians. But Sanders' situation is not so uncommon. Even in a wealthy country like the United States, millions of people lack basic reading skills.

Sanders' story had a happy ending. He shared his secret with a fellow Rotarian, who steered him to a local literacy program and encouraged him as he tackled his reading lessons. Our Rotary Foundation wants to create more such happy endings, and there is no shortage of people who need them. Today, more than 750 million adults are functionally illiterate globally.

In 201516, our Foundation awarded 146 global grants totaling \$8.3 million to support basic education and literacy

projects worldwide. These projects vary considerably – from providing computers and school supplies in Ghana to sponsoring an afterschool homework program in the U.S. to developing a literacy and mentoring program for Roma girls in Bosnia, a project that addresses the gender imbalance that exists in many parts of the world.

In my country, Rotary has been on a literacy mission for the past few years. India has a population of 1.2 billion and is about 75 percent literate. Illiteracy occurs mainly in rural India, where most people live. So Rotary in India joined hands with the government to eliminate illiteracy, especially among women, because literate women raise literate families, ensuring a better future for all. Indeed, the numbers are staggering, and when it is done, the impact could be incredible.

As we observe Basic Education and Literacy Month in September, let's think about the millions of people whose chances for success remain blocked by illiteracy. Our Foundation is helping many of them, but with Rotarian support and involvement, we can do so much more.

SAM OWORI IS SELECTED TO BE 2018-19 ROTARY PRESIDENT



The 2016-17 Nominating Committee for President of Rotary International has unanimously nominated Samuel Frobisher Owori, of the Rotary Club of Kampala, Uganda, to be the president of Rotary International in 2018-19. He will be declared the president-nominee on 1 October if no challenging candidates have been suggested.

Owori says he sees in Rotary "an incredible passion to make a difference." As president, he plans to "harness that enthusiasm and pride so that every project becomes the engine of peace and prosperity."

Owori's chief concerns as a Rotary leader are membership and extension. Since he served as district governor, the number of clubs in Uganda has swelled from nine to 89. He urges past, present, and future leaders to work together to engage more women, youth program participants, alumni, and community members to increase Rotary's membership in the coming years.

"There are many places which need Rotary and numerous potential members who have never been invited," he says. "The problem is Rotarians who got in and closed the doors."

Owori is chief executive officer of the Institute of Corporate Governance of Uganda. Before that, he was executive director of the African Development Bank, managing director of Uganda Commercial Bank Ltd., and director of Uganda Development Bank. He has studied law, employment relations, business management, corporate resources management, microfinance, and marketing at institutions in England, Japan, Switzerland, Tanzania, and the United States, including Harvard Business School.

Since becoming a member in 1978, Owori has served Rotary as regional Rotary Foundation coordinator, regional RI membership coordinator, RI Representative to the United Nations Environment Program and UN-Habitat, and RI director. He has been a member or chair of several committees, including the International PolioPlus Committee, the Drug Abuse Prevention Task Force, and the Audit Committee. Most recently, Owori served as trustee of The Rotary

Foundation, chair of The Rotary Foundation's Finance Committee, and a member of the Investment Committee. Owori is a Benefactor of The Rotary Foundation, and he and his wife, Norah, are Major Donors and Paul Harris Fellows.

ROTARY RECOMMITS TO ENDING POLIO IN NIGERIA

The World Health Organization has confirmed two cases of wild poliovirus type 1 (WPV1) in Nigeria, the first cases in the country since July 2014. After passing a year without a case of the wild poliovirus, Nigeria was removed from the list of polio-endemic countries in September 2015. These cases – from two local government areas of Borno state – occurred in July 2016.

The Government of Nigeria – in partnership with the Global Polio Eradication Initiative – will take immediate steps to respond quickly to the outbreak to prevent further spread of the disease. This response will include emergency vaccination campaigns to boost immunity in impacted and at-risk areas, and reinforced surveillance activities to ensure we detect all strains of polio. Because polio knows no borders, steps will also be taken to protect surrounding countries, to ensure all children are vaccinated and to reduce the risk of the spread of the disease.

This news is disappointing for all Rotary members - and particularly those in Nigeria - who worked so hard to help the country stop polio. However, Rotary remains steadfast and fully committed to fighting polio anywhere children remain at risk, including Nigeria and Africa.

Rotary members remain resilient in the face of challenges. Today, we roll up our sleeves and redouble our effort to rid the world of this devastating disease. Rotary members in Nigeria are already hard at work to support the outbreak response, and our network will also be tapped to quickly protect children in surrounding countries.

The World Health Organization is confident Nigeria can end polio. The program has overcome outbreaks before, and we have the tools to do so again in Nigeria. Rotary will not stop its efforts to ensure that every child is born into a polio-free world where they are safe from this paralyzing disease.

District 7070 Climb to End Polio Now: Raffy's Story

My fellow Rotarians,

In 1982, Rotary International eradicated polio from the Philippines. Since then, Rotary has contributed more than US\$1.5 billion to help immunize more than 2.5 billion children against polio, and helped secure over US\$7.2 billion from donor governments. This year, we are on the verge of eradicating polio from the face of the earth. There have only been 19 children paralyzed with the wild polio virus this year. The last paralysis occurred on June 18. Two months have passed without a single case of polio induced paralysis. We must continue vaccinating children for three more years before the world will be declared polio-free in 2019.

This year, Jennifer, Ryan, Viji and I climbed Mt Kilimanjaro to raise funds to help eradicate polio. We have raised over \$500,000 to date. Please donate today. You may go to our website to donate www.conquerpolio.org. You will receive a tax receipt for your donation. As the sun came up on June 25, Jennifer Boyd, Ryan Fogarty and I reached the summit of Mount Kilimanjaro in Tanzania. It was the culmination of a year of planning, training and fundraising. We conquered Kilimanjaro and raised \$500,000 to help Rotary International eradicate polio.

Day 1. We are all excited to get going. Along with training, each member of our team had purchased almost \$5,000 in gear for this climb. We felt ready to conquer the mountain. About halfway up, a 12-year-old girl passed us wearing a dress and flip flops...



Day 2. It's only our second day, and I am already feeling tired. I was so focused on where I placed every step that I didn't really see my surroundings. I asked Jennifer (facetiously), "Why are we doing this?" With no hesitation, she replied, "Do you recall that two-week-old girl I held and vaccinated in India last year?" After that, I focused on the image of Jennifer holding that baby girl, and of our 1,000 donors who supported us back home. I am determined not to let anyone down.

Climbing Kilimanjaro is not just a physical challenge, it is also very much a mental challenge. The challenge is to not quit, and to push your body and pursue your goal. It is a true test of willpower. Our inspiration, Conquer Kilimanjaro, Conquer Polio, was so strong, there was no quitting for anyone on our team.



Day 3. We woke up to the sight of majestic Mount Kilimanjaro. We had camped above the clouds, at 3600 metres, and were seeing the peak for the first time. We were energized. Our goal was within reach.

We awoke on Day 3 to this sight – our first view of the peak of Kilimanjaro.

After that initial excitement, everything becomes a blur.

Not feeling quite so energetic; every step is an effort. Nonetheless, we push on.

Day 4. After hiking for five exhausting hours, we reached the base camp. The altitude started to affect me today and I couldn't eat. We "slept" for a couple of hours before starting our final ascent at 11:30 p.m. (Our Day 5.)

Day 5: Unable to keep any solid foods down, we started our longest day – in the dark, each of us wearing a headlamp. Once again, I focus on the pair of boots in front of me. It's cold. Windy. I am panting like a dog with every step. We are all sleep-deprived and I am experiencing nausea, headaches and tingling fingers from the



high altitude. Our pace is glacial: one half-step at a time. We finally reach the first peak at dawn. Our guides take our picture, high-five us and ask if we want to continue or return down the mountain. We continue, and in another two hours we reach the true summit. This climb was the steepest we had encountered. It's probably best that we climbed in the dark. Less intimidating.

Mission accomplished: An exhausted but happy Ryan Fogarty, Jennifer Boyd and Raffy Chouljian on the summit of Mount Kilimanjaro.

We were happy to have reached the summit, but were so exhausted, it was anti-climactic. Our bodies were oxygen-deprived, and we were desperate to get back down as soon as possible.



Ryan, however, had one thing to do before we began our descent. To everyone's surprise, he pulled out his flashlight and removed a ring he had kept hidden there all week. He dropped down on one knee and proposed to Jennifer. After she said yes, Ryan quipped, "Sweetheart, it's all downhill from here."

Believe it or not, descending is not easier than ascending. The entire way up, you are focused on the pair of boots in front of you, carefully watching every step you take, too afraid to look around. (Apparently, at one point, we had hiked along a sharp drop. Fortunately, I was too oblivious to notice my surroundings most of the time, except when we stopped.) But coming down is more painful. Our muscles screamed from the lack of oxygen. The soles of our feet hurt with every step. Unfortunately, there was no alternative but to continue hiking. We had to climb halfway back down the mountain today – 16 hours of hiking. By the end of Day 5, we'd walked approximately 30 kilometres, half of them in bitter-cold, sub-zero temperatures.

Day 6: I was able to eat again, which was good, since we still had seven hours of hiking ahead, to get back to our bus. Wincing with every step. Our guides asked me several times, if I wanted them to carry my pack. They offered to get me a jeep to drive me the rest of the way back down the mountain. I declined both. I was determined to complete this challenge on my own. And I did.

Our Guides

We travelled with the excellent Zara Tours. They organized our climb, picked us up at the airport, guided us up Kilimanjaro and back, and took us on a five-day safari, before driving us back to the airport.

The support team on our climb, which included nine porters, three guides, a cook and a waiter, were wonderful. All we had to do was carry our snacks and clothes for the day. Everything else was taken care of. When we reached camp each day, our tents were already set up and lunch was ready. Every morning, one of the staff members woke us up with hot tea, served in our tent, and a basin of hot water to wash.

Polio -- The Reason Behind Our Climb

Rotary International started vaccinating children against polio in 1979. Rotary vaccinated six million children in the Philippines and eradicated the disease there. With the success of this program, in 1982, Rotary International committed to immunize all of the world's children against polio.

Polio is a highly infectious disease that primarily affects children under the age of five; it can cause paralysis within hours. About one in 200 becomes irreversibly paralyzed, usually in the legs.

In 1985, just under 1,000 children were paralyzed with polio every day in 125 countries. Today, we have less than 50 a year in two polio-endemic countries – Afghanistan and Pakistan. It is hoped that the world will be certified polio-free by 2019, and that we will have eradicated this disease once and for all.

As of June 29, 2016, only 17 children have been paralyzed this year due to the wild polio virus. We are so close to eradicating the disease; please continue to support Rotary International's 30-year effort to conquer polio. Your donation will be matched two-for-one by both our Canadian Government and the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation. To donate, visit www.conquerpolio.org.

What's next for Team SND?

(We named our Rotary team SND, after my dental office, Scarborough North Dental Group.) On summit day we all swore "Never again." However, just as I've heard happens with childbirth, one soon forgets the pain and only the positive memories of accomplishment and pride remain. We did it! Together, we saved more than 500,000 children from ever contracting this paralyzing and debilitating disease.

I would like to thank Anthony Melia for coaching, training and mentoring us during the last year. A special thank you to my teammates Ryan Fogarty and especially Jennifer Boyd, who inspired us to reach outside our comfort zones and conquer Kilimanjaro. Last, thank you to our more than 1,000 donors who collectively enabled us to raise \$500,000.

EARTHQUAKE IN ITALY:

From District Giovernor Jim Louttit

I am sending this note on behalf of DG Jim to all Club Presdients in District 7070 and to the Advisory Board. I am calling on all Rotarians in District 7070 for your assistance as we all respond to the earthquake that struck on Wednesday, August 24 at 1:36 am GMT near the north-eastern Italian city of Perugia, killing at least 240 people.

We will be providing as much information to you as we can. As you can well imagine, updates are coming through as we speak and District 7070 will be providing you with more information on possible fundraisers shortly. For example, I have already been in contact with President Renata Pancini from the Woodbridge Rotary Club and we have been speaking with District Governor Claudio De Felice of D2080 (near Rome) as to their needs.

One possible project is the construction of a school in one of the cities that was destroyed by the earthquake. Rotarians will be doing the work and will be looking for funds to cover the cost of materials. Just one in discussion.

Also President Renata is going to Italy on the 28th until September 8 and will be meeting with DG Claudio and visiting several clubs while there.

Dear Rotarians.

Rotary members worldwide stand together with the people of Italy, showing an outpouring of support in light of this week's deadly 6.2 magnitude earthquake, which struck on Tuesday evening in central Italy, killing over 240 people in the historic towns of Amatrice, Accumoli and Pescara. Many residents have fled their homes and are camping on open ground at night, as numerous powerful aftershocks followed.

As we mourn this terrible loss of life, Italian Rotarians are already actively engaged, providing engineering, medical and psychological assistance. The two districts directly affected are D2080 and D2090. DG Paolo Raschiatore (D2090) and DG Alessandro Vignani (D2071, nearby) emphasized that the emergency response is well in hand and that there are no immediate needs for outside assistance at this time.

Rotary's project partner ShelterBox is working with their affiliate ShelterBox Italy, operated by local Rotarians, to assess the regions impacted by the Italy earthquake. A ShelterBox Response Team has been deployed to the impacted communities and updates can be monitored on www.twitter.com/shelterboxpress. For updates about the impacted communities one can write to rotaryrequest@shelterbox.org or visitwww.shelterbox.org to assist with the relief effort.

The Italian governors have already agreed that they are going to put together a project involving all 13 Italian districts. As per Rotary best practices, they are carrying out a community assessment to determine the precise needs that this project should address. In conversations with Rotary staff, they mentioned the work of Italian Rotarians in the aftermath of the l'Aquila earthquake in 2009, which gives them confidence that in the coming weeks they can devise a worthwhile and valuable project.

We appreciate all your support in working with Rotarians to help the people of Italy rebuild their lives and communities. The Italian governors will keep us apprised of their plans and needs as they evolve. At Rotary headquarters, we will be sharing that information on rotary.org.

September Is Basic Education and Literacy Month

What is your Rotary Club doing to support this important Rotary Foundation Area of Focus?

Basic education and literacy is one of The Rotary Foundation's six areas of focus. We know that basic education and literacy are essential for reducing poverty, improving health, encouraging community and economic development, and promoting peace.

Consider these facts:

- If all women completed primary education, there would be 66% fewer maternal deaths.
- A child born to a mother who can read is 50% more likely to survive past the age of five.
- If all students in low-income countries left school with basic reading skills, 171 million people could be lifted out of poverty, which would be equivalent to a 12% cut in world poverty.

The world is making good progress in this area. According to a 2014 United Nations Millennium Development Goals progress report, literacy rates among adults and youths are on the rise and the gender gap in literacy is narrowing. But pressing global needs remain:

- 58 million children worldwide are out of school.
- Even after four years of primary schooling, as many as 250 million children cannot read and write.
- 781 million adults are illiterate.

Rotary supports activities and training to improve education for all children and literacy for children and adults. Area of Focus Statement of Purpose and Goals:

The Rotary Foundation enables Rotarians to ensure that all people have sustainable access to basic education and literacy by:

- Involving the community to support programs that strengthen the capacity of communities to provide basic education and literacy to all;
- Increasing adult literacy in communities;
- Working to reduce gender disparity in education;
- Supporting studies for career-minded professionals related to basic education and literacy.

Parameters for Eligibility:

The Rotary Foundation considers activities targeting the following to be within the scope of the basic education and literacy area of focus:

- Access to quality basic primary and secondary education;
- Educating adults in literacy;
- Providing training in teaching literacy, curriculum development and school administration;
- Strengthening educational experience through improved materials and facilities;
- Community management of education systems;
- Vocational training teams supporting the above activities:
- School desk purchases, when accompanied by a detailed and verifiable plan to improve basic education and literacy;
- Scholarships for graduate-level study in programs related to basic education and literacy.

The Rotary Foundation considers activities targeting the following to be outside the scope of the basic education and literacy area of focus and as such are not eligible for global grant funding:

- Projects that consist exclusively of equipment purchases;
- Projects that provide tuition or school supplies without the means for the community to provide these in the future.

- Support an education project on Rotary Ideas

SHELTERBOX News For September 2016

A ShelterBox Team has been deployed to Italy following a 6.2 magnitude earthquake near Perugia.

The earthquake struck on Wednesday at 1:36 am GMT near the north-eastern Italian city of Perugia, killing at least 240 people. This was a shallow quake in a mountainous area, with tremors felt as far away as Rome. Since the initial quake shook central Italy early Wednesday morning, hundreds of aftershocks have been reported. One woman, from a town hit by the earthquake spoke to the CBC and said that "everything is destroyed, there is no town anymore." The damage and death toll is expected to rise as rescue workers continue to dig through the rubble.

A ShelterBox team has been assembled, trained in humanitarian response to make an initial assessment. They have arrived in Italy and are making their way to the remote mountainous area, southeast of the town of Perugia.

Luca Della Volta, a Rotarian and president of ShelterBox Italia, the affiliate organization in Genoa, will accompany the response team. Della Volta is working with the Rotary Club of Rieti in District 2080, the club closest to the earthquake-affected sites, and will meet with officials of the Italian Civil Protection Department, fire department, and Red Cross to coordinate efforts. With aid held across several European sites, we'll be able to react speedily if families are left without shelter.

ShelterBox is an official Project Partner of Rotary International. It is the best Rotary-way to impact the lives of families affected by disasters in Italy and around the world. Our work would not be possible without the generosity of Rotarians and Rotary clubs across Canada and around the world. Thank you so much for your support.



What Is The Rotary Leadership Institute (RLI)

RLI is a grassroots coalition of Rotary districts implementing a leadership development program for "potential" leaders of Rotary CLUBS. RLI believes that excellent CLUB leadership (all types of club leaders) is essential to the future of Rotary in a complex and fast changing world. Most Rotarians have not been exposed to the great scope of Rotary around the world and have not considered what leadership skills are necessary to move Rotary forward. RLI strongly believes that a good Rotary Club leader must know the evolution of Rotary, its current status and activities in the world

and have a vision for what Rotary can be in the future.

RLI provides a three day non-consecutive basic course in both Rotary knowledge and leadership skills, especially for voluntary organizations. RLI follows an adult learning approach with facilitated discussion led by trained Rotary facilitators.

The cost is \$70 per Rotarian per course. This cost covers course materials, coffee breaks and lunch. Usually the Rotary club covers the cost for their members to attend since the club will be the beneficiary of a more knowledgeable membership.

REMINDER: Club Visioning - Where is your club going to be in 5 Years?

Rotary Clubs, like any other organizations, need to have a plan for where they are heading. In order to assist Clubs to develop a vision, the District has a team of experienced Rotarians who can facilitate visioning sessions. Since we started the program, five or six years ago, close to 40 Cubs have held sessions. A few Clubs have held two or three session, up-dating their vision on a regular basis.

Why do we need vision?

Visioning facilitation helps a Rotary Club to develop its own vision and then sets out the steps necessary to achieve that vision. It is worth noting that the result is not a vision set out by the District or Rotary International. Instead, the result is a vision designed and endorsed by the Club's own members. This vision will help to ensure consensus, continuity and consistency in the Club leadership and programming, to set the stage for future progress.

The Process

The facilitation concept we use was developed by Rotarians for Rotarians. Today, it is being used by over 100 Rotary districts around the world. It starts with the Club setting a date for holding a session. A session takes about three hours, so sessions are typically held either in an evening or on a Saturday morning.

A couple of weeks prior to the date, members of the Club are invited to answer a questionnaire how they currently feel about their Club. This questionnaire is on SurveyMonkey and takes about 10-15 minutes to fill out. It is also possible to leave comments to the questions.

At the actual visioning session, the participants are told to place themselves five years ahead. In a workbook, that the facilitation team provides, the members are asked to state what the Club has done by then. In short, members talk about what the Club has done, not what it should do. There are no right or wrong answers for the workbook, which covers all aspects of a Rotary Club. Instead, at this stage members are encouraged to think boldly.

All statements from the participants' workbooks are put on flip charts. A Club session usually generates 30 - 40 sheets. These are then placed on the walls. The participants will have a two-step voting activity. For the second round of voting, the least popular statements in round one are eliminated, giving the participants fewer alternatives to choose from.

As a result of the voting session, a handful of statements from each category will stand out. They will form the basis for developing the Club's Action Plan – the most important part of the visioning process.

It is the Club's responsibility to develop the Action Plan. However, the District, and the Club's Assistant Governor in particular, would be happy to assist. The resources and experience in this field vary from Club to Club. Some are very familiar with these steps; others benefit from assistance from the District's facilitation team. Our experience is that Clubs find it very useful to hold a visioning session. The format we use in the District seems to work very well. Probably because it was developed by Rotarians, to Rotarians. It is also fairly easy to administer and we have found that most participants really enjoy the session. Planning the future of the Club becomes a fun
