

Ernie Seaquist is Professor Emeritus in the Department of Astronomy and Astrophysics, University of Toronto.

His career of research and teaching spans a period of 50 years, working in the specialty area of the birth of new stars and the resulting impact upon their environment. He has published approximately 200 research papers and graduated 14 PhD and 12 MSc students.

Ernie is a long-standing supporter of Canada's engagement in astronomical research, and has served in many senior capacities in this role. He served for 11 years as the Chair of the Department of Astronomy and Astrophysics, and Director of its David Dunlap Observatory.

He served as President of the Canadian Astronomical Society (CASCA) and on numerous national and international committees planning major facilities for research. These include two terms on CASCA's Long Range Planning Panel outlining priorities for Canadian astronomy, and one term as Chair of its review panel.

He also served on and chaired many panels and boards associated with multiple agencies, including the National

Research Council of Canada, the international James Clerk Maxwell Telescope, the Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council of Canada, the Canadian Space Agency and the U.S. Associated Universities Inc.

His interest in Canada's engagement in large radio astronomy projects led to membership on the site selection panel for the international Square Kilometre Array, which will be the largest radio telescope ever built when completed in the next decade.

His most recent activity includes a term of four years as Director General of the Association of Canadian Universities for Research in Astronomy (ACURA), which supports the acquisition of major research facilities for its 20 member universities.

ACURA was successful in obtaining federal funding (\$243M) for Canadian participation in the Thirty Meter Telescope, an international giant optical telescope project with many international partners. If completed today it would be the largest of its kind in the world.

Google for Nonprofits (G4NP) will help us fundraise more easily, collaborate more efficiently, and share our story with a wider audience.

G Suite is one of the components of G4NP. G Suite is a set of tools that allows us to schedule meetings with automatic email invites, video conference from any camera-enabled computer and share work as a team. We will stay connected with video conference calls that host up to 25 participants.

G Suite allows a committee to communicate more efficiently, to stay in touch with volunteers, supporters, and others with unlimited email addresses at our custom domain via Gmail.

G Suite allows us to collaborate from anywhere, to keep everyone on the same page with Google Docs simplifying our ability to create and edit documents and meeting agendas in real time, from anywhere.

With 30GB of storage space per user across Gmail and Google Drive, our Google Docs, Sheets, Forms, and Slides will be accessible from any device, anytime.

Google Calendar will give us the capacity to update and view the Rotary Club of Toronto Calendar of Events, at a glance. This will keep us organized and eliminate the potential to schedule conflicting meetings and events.

On Thursday January 18th Shorcan Brokers Limited held its 20th Annual Charity Day. Each year they donate the revenue from one day's commissions to 30 charities. This year the amount was over \$700,000.

President Pat Neuman, Maureen Bird and Cijay Shah were in attendance to accept an award of over \$7,000. The funds will be going towards the ISC's current project of providing Toilets for Girls in schools located in Rural Villages, 100km north of Mumbai, India. This is being done as a Global Grant with Bombay Airport Rotary Club with funding also coming from The Rotary Foundation. A donation to a global grant from an outside party gets a 50% match from TRF.

The Mumbai clubs and District 3141 in India developed a Hygiene and Sanitation project to build 500 toilets through Global Grants, partnering with other clubs around the world. Some are completed and Cijay Shah visited them in March 2017.

We are delighted to be working on this in partnership with others. Last year Cijay Shah received an award of \$13,280 from Shorcan towards his Ebenezer Home for Orphans in Kenya, specifically to assist the vulnerable mentally and physically challenged children.

Our newest Board Member Alanna Scott was also there to receive an award on behalf of Eva's Initiatives for Homeless Youth of which she is Development & Campaign Director. This is Eva's third award from Shorcan

What You Missed January 19, 2018

Today we met at the historical King Edward Hotel. Past President Sandy Boucher introduced two visiting Rotarians, one from Finland, and 2 guests. President Pat reminded us of R2R on February 7th and Rotaract's fundraiser for Anishnawbe Health on February 22.

Our major fundraiser at the Steam Whistle Brewery is on March 29th. She also mentioned a donation from Shorcan Brokers Limited –more info elsewhere.

Robert O'Brien in his introduction of our guest speaker reminded us of the "golden age of politics" where good men and women who had developed a breadth of experience and success in private and business life would step forward and contribute to the well-being of the nation and the care of people in the nation in need. In that context there was a nobility of service with Canada playing a respected role on the international stage.

Patrick Boyer talked about how happy he was to be with Rotarians. His female cousin joined the Etobicoke club in the 80s and he helped make women in Rotary legal. Seven members resigned but another said that they had joined Rotary for the wrong reasons.

His topic was Foreign Voices in Parliament, a compendium of speeches he researched and gathered into his newest book. The first foreign leaders to speak to our House of Commons were French Prime Minister and Minister of Justice René Viviani and Foreign Secretary and Prime Minister Arthur Balfour both acknowledging Canada's role in World War I in 1917. At the time we had 26 members of Parliament serving in the war effort with one a POW. The first live broadcast from the House of Commons was December 30, 1941 when Winston Churchill travelled up from Washington to address us. This was the famous "Some Chicken! Some Neck!" speech. At every step he was greeted by enthusiastic crowds. Patrick's most memorable speaker was Nelson Mandela who spoke to us just five weeks after his release from his 27-year imprisonment in Robben Island. He referred to the speeches as a book of revelations. He marveled at Canada as a model of governance formed without bloodshed on common law. He has optimistic realism about our future with goals of justice for all.
