What You Missed December 7th, 2018

President Jeff opened the meeting at the National Club. Past President Pat Neuman introduced two visiting Rotarians and two guests to the meeting.

President Elect Kevin Power introduced our guest speaker, Michiel Roodenburg, who gave us an account, including a slide show, of his 30,000 km cycling trip from Alaska to Antarctica in support of an organization "Cycle for Water". This was founded by Michiel and his friend and travelling companion Joost to raise awareness for the Global Water Crisis in a world where 1 billion people still lack access to clean water and sanitation. Challenges included mosquitoes in Alaska, bears and mud. The trip was a test of personal relationships as well as optimism and a celebration of human kindness along the way. The bicycles they used were made of bamboo, which have a lower carbon footprint and were unique and "cool".

Following our speaker's presentation, President Jeff called the Annual general Meeting to order. The club's financial statements (available at the Rotary Office) were reviewed by Kurt Kroesen. Club members voted to approve the statements and to engage Deloittes for another year as our auditors. Jeff then announced the results of the club slate for members of the board for the next 3 years, the treasurer for next year and Vice president for 2019-2020. The membership approved the results (see above).
