Angie's desire to help others is deeply rooted in her faith, and her compassion for people society's margins comes from her own lived experience growing up on social assistance.

Often described as inspiring and resilient, Angie began her career in sales and marketing and had 16 successful years as a senior executive in the telecommunications industry, where she closed multi-million dollar deals and produced unprecedented sales. Soon after her youngest child was born, Angie experienced an increasing desire to align her career with her passion to advocate for vulnerable people, which ultimately led her to found and lead ZOE Alliance Inc, a for profit social enterprise. The encouragement and support of friends and family helped Angie take the steps to fully devote her life's work to social causes.

Prior to joining The Yonge Street Mission as the president & CEO in 2013, she held other positions in the social profit sector, which included serving as the Executive Director at Muskoka Woods Foundation and Director, Campaign & Major Gifts at Rouge Valley Health System Foundation. She currently serves on the Advisory Panel to the City of Toronto for the Poverty Reduction Strategy and recently co-chaired the Executive Directors Network in Regent Park.

A passionate and engaging speaker, when Angie is not influencing systemic change or advocating for the vulnerable and broken, she is working on her masters in leadership, taking art classes with her daughter and enjoying the outdoors with both of her adult children and Holly, their rescue dog.

- New Committee Procedures approved by the Club Board

The Strategic Planning Committee has put together a sub-committee called the Committee Review Task Force. Its mandate is to identify strategies that will support our philanthropic committees and their respective Chairs in conducting more efficient and effective meetings.


The Committee Review Task Force recommended that the Club Board approve the following procedures:

- 1. After 3 consecutive missed meetings by a committee member, the Chair will connect with the member to determine their voting status for future meetings
- 2. Philanthropic committees shall have a minimum of 5 voting members, including the Chair
- 3. Quorum is defined as a majority of voting members
- 4. Proxy voting should be allowed when submitted to the Chair or other designate in writing, prior to the vote

The Club Board unanimously approved these new procedures for implementation by the philanthropic committees.
