Patrick Boyer has led a most interesting and multi-faceted life as a university professor, journalist, authority, policy activist, publisher and former Member of Parliament (1984 -1993). Patrick was born in Bracebridge and his father was a Member of the Legislative Assembly at Queen's Park in the late 1950s. Mr. Boyer earned a

Master's Degree in Canadian history, a Doctor of Laws from the University of Toronto and an honours degree in economics and political science from Carleton University. He studied French-Canadian literature at the University of Montreal and studied law at the International Court of Justice in the Netherlands. Before entering politics our speaker was a partner in the Fraser and Beatty law firm in Toronto where he specialized in communications law and electoral law. He practised in the Western Arctic as a member of the Northwest Territories Bar. Mr. Boyer was elected Member of Parliament in 1984, representing Toronto's Etobicoke-Lakeshore Riding. As a Member of Parliament for the next nine years he chaired three committees; on election law reform, equality rights and the status of disabled persons. He served as Parliamentary Secretary to the Ministry of External Affairs, National Defence, Industry, Science and Technology and Consumer and Corporate Affairs. Following his career in politics he taught law, political science and history at the University of Toronto, Wilfred Laurier University and the University of Guelph. He has continued to be an advocate for public policy issues including proportional representation, democratic development in Asia, Central and South American and founded the Corinne Boyer Fund for Ovarian Cancer Research and Treatment. He has authored twenty-three books on Canadian history, law, politics and governance including 'Foreign Voices in the House of Commons' which celebrate famous world leaders who have visited Canada and spoken in the House of Commons. Mr. Boyer resides in both Bracebridge and Toronto.

Angle gave us an overview of the poverty situation in downtown Toronto, pointing out that Toronto is one of the richest cities but has huge income inequality. There are 150,000 children living in poverty. Shifts in income are hurting people who are taking part time jobs with no benefits. There is an 11-year waiting list for social housing.

However, Angie feels that we have the resources to fix the problems, that people can change and with enough will we can deal with these urgent problems. She challenged us to be the generation to turn this situation around.
