What You Missed June 21, 2019

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The Indigenous People's Day lunch opened with a traditional drumming ceremony by Elder Garry Sault which this week's Voice reporter missed, arriving late to a capacity lunch crowd mirroring past Raptors celebrations.

President Jeff began with an acknowledgement of the traditional lands of the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation, welcomed a large group of visitors and returning new member Kim Hunter. Jeff then waved a Rotary Pride t-shirt available if anyone wanted to join his group for Sunday's Pride Parade. "Let's Be Personal" 3 minute bio was presented by member Mary Bennett.

It was then announced that Rotary and the Robin Hood Army, has raised over \$2000 of in-kind welcome gifts, for the 175 indigenous students relocating to Thunder Bay this September, from 23 remote fly-in Northern Ontario communities to begin 4 years of high school away from home.

Our guest speaker Chief Stacey LaForme was introduced by John Andras as a man of great presence, a leader of wit, and wisdom, who had mesmerized a crowd of thousands at the past RI convention in Toronto.

Stacey began by saying he had nothing prepared, but was going to jump into a little of his dating history when was younger and fit, or maybe explain what's going on with his hair, or why the colourful shirt with flowers? He said he wears it as his obligation to the earth, to teach others that we all shouldn't have to fit into stereotypes. He said his teachings have come from surprising locations. "Many ask my opinions on the flag and anthem. I answer, that so many of my people fought and died for Canada; of course I honour this country".

He then recounted a Rotary experience, when an RI convention committee tried to shape and limit his welcome speech. He refused and told the executive to step back and understand his vision of why he needed more time to communicate. Though it may seem like conflict, after these-business minded Rotarians paused and thought of the circumstance, it became a fun learning experience for everyone.

Throughout his four years as chief, he has combined his leadership with his writing and poetry. He held up his latest book titled "Living in the Tall Grass" which tells of his people's experience, their troubles and hopes, their connection to the earth and their perspective. Chief Stacey recounts a time in his youth when a public school teacher praised his poem, but then wanted to change the last paragraph, which dissuaded him from writing. "Sometimes the best intentions can do more harm". Twenty-nine years later he picked up a pen and wrote a poem of forgiveness which a colleague again tried to edit, but he wouldn't allow it, as the poem caught a moment in time, of a beautiful woman he loved and connected with deeply, subsequently revealing it was his mother. Later Robert H. Thompson asked him to write a poem to commemorate the "World Remembers Memorial", an idea of displaying all the names of the war dead from both sides of the conflict. Stacey then read the commemoration poem, inspired by some old WW2 indigenous vets, who'd been fighting for eight years to get the same rights and benefits as others.
