From "Street Kid to Biz Wiz" Frank O'Dea's career is a reminder for people to never give up. A charmed childhood in Montreal was no salvo for what was to come, but Frank did overcome being a drunk and panhandler on the streets and became a successful serial entrepreneur.

As co-founder of one of Canada's first coffee chains, The Second Cup, he demonstrated his business ingenuity and went on to co-found Proshred Security, and to lead a variety of businesses as CEO and Chairman.

He soon learned that his real calling was in giving back to his community and cofounded several not-for-profit organizations including The Canadian Landmine Foundation. Frank O'Dea currently serves as the Chair of CUSO International, a not for profit organization operating in 20+ countries around the globe.

His avocational work was recognized when Frank became an Officer in the Order of Canada, one of the highest civilian honours in the country. Frank has also been awarded Rotary International's prestigious Paul Harris award four times.

I grew up in Winnipeg and graduated in 1970 from the University of Manitoba - in business. Today was the first time in memory that we had two speakers, the fatherson team of Gordon and Joe Cressy, both of whom have served as city councillors.

Gordon spoke about inequities experienced in Toronto in the past. After volunteering in Trinidad for two years he returned and invited a Trinidadian to lunch at Rosedale Golf Club. The guest was refused admission and Gordon resigned his membership. He discussed the Bathhouse Raids in the early 80s with over 300 arrests even though homosexuality had been deemed legal. It was never revealed who ordered the raids, ostensibly for money laundering. Carding and racial profiling are another unnecessary evil. One very successful businessman was stopped 50 times and a director of education 7 times. For being black. This was wrong and needs to stop.

Our poverty level is far too high. Are we caring enough for each other?

Joe gave an example of a youth arrested for gun possession who was sent to Scadding House to do community service, was hired by them and turned his life around. Joe helped argue for a suspended sentence. Prison is no alternative for new opportunities. Drugs are another issue that needs to be treated as a health problem. Closing clinics is wrong.

The city needs funds for health care. The best results are invisible. A strong vaccine program means we are not having to report a measles outbreak. Proper water testing I started giving more thought to my own retirement planning. I concluded that I had to have a game plan, other than just financial. Another conclusion was that I would have to be part of an organization where I could be involved, help others and meet great people. That led me to Rotary.

I picked Rotary, rather than other service clubs, primarily because the father of a good friend was a long-time Rotarian who used to tell me about Rotary, international conventions, etc.

In my 14 years being part of this Club I have had many personally rewarding experiences through both philanthropic and fellowship activities. For the last five years I have been on our Club's Scholarship Committee. This has been an unbelievable opportunity to impact the current and future lives of outstanding young adults.
