He even helped charter a Rotary Club in Kiev, Ukraine. As well he was instrumental in assisting Australian Rotary Clubs in supplying antimalaria bednets to Timor Leste and earned a Paul Harris Fellow for doing so.

I met Bill after I had been in Rotary for a few years. He used to say to me "you're a smart girl - one day you'll be President of this Rotary Club". Pshaw I'd say. Then one day Bill Bahen asked me to help him with the selling of his home. Well that did it. He

Bill was married to Ann Bahen who was the love of his life. Ann was very involved with the Rotary Inner Wheel and handled Bill with such graciousness it was a joy to watch.

Old age affected Bill's health and he had to withdraw from our Club about 8 years ago. Ann's eyesight deteriorated but she took care of Bill as much as she could.

Ann just passed away on July 4, 2018 and Bill followed her on August 31, 2018. These

wonderful people enriched our lives. You are not forgotten and you are loved by many.

What You Missed November 23, 2018 - by Glenn Davis



The Club enjoyed a delicious lunch again at Bill's Place, and after the socializing and nutritional frolicking was done, we got down to business. The Head table

usually marches in to 'Road to the Isles' but it sounded rather more like 'Let It Snow, Let it Snow'.

Five visiting Rotarians from as far away as Slovakia, and a handful of guests, listened as Esteemed Past-President Bert Steenburgh spoke on behalf of the Program Committee, and exhorted the audience to pass along interesting topic ideas and names of possible speakers for evaluation by the Committee. Good, experienced speakers with interesting ideas and something worthwhile to say are apparently the most prized, according to EPP Bert. Harold Hetherington then introduced our guest speaker, fellow Rotarian Cyndie Jacobs, who Harold met at the International Convention. Cyndie herself an excellent example of the quality of speaker we seek to grace our Club luncheons, and is the current President of the Uxbridge Rotary Club. She outlined the fascinating story of how an orphaned bear cub from Ontario wound up as the inspiration for "Winnie the Pooh", beloved by children all over the world.

Her Great Uncle, Major Harry Colebourne, qualified as a veterinary surgeon in 1911, and enlisted at the outbreak of the Great War at the ripe old age of 27. While on a troop train enroute from Winnipeg to Valcartier, Quebec, to join and train with the 2nd Canadian International Brigade, Harry encountered a hunter with a small cub at

a station stop in White River, Ontario. Harry's diary records his purchase of the cub for \$20.00, a princely sum in those days. He trained the cub to the point that it slept under his cot like a dog, and we were treated to many assorted pictures of Harry hand-feeding treats to 'Winnipeg the Bear' who stood on his hind feet to receive them. 'Winnipeg' simply loved sweet, condensed milk, which gave him a rather rotund profile. He became the beloved camp mascot to the soldiers, even travelling with them to England, where they underwent further training on Salisbury plain. But when the order came to ship out to France, Winnipeg was not included. Harry donated the tame, friendly bear to the London Zoo, where he entertained thousands of visitors over the yearssomewhat later including Christopher Robin, the son of A. A. Milne, who published four books of stories and poetry now featuring "Winnie-The-Pooh" between 1924 and 1928. Winnipeg died in 1934, but lives on through children's books, and of course Disney. But Ryerson has established an archive holding historical documentation, and a descendant of Colebourne has published the story, called 'Finding Winnie', to help memorialize the little-known Canadian connection.

Peripatetic President Jeff gave thanks for his and Casey's recent 10th wedding anniversary trip to New York, -via Panama- so Casey could participate in the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade. Pianist Glenn Davis won the bottle of wine, which he sadly claims he can't share with his very-pregnant Diva Brigitte.
