In 1985, Rotary launched its PolioPlus program, the first initiative to tackle global polio eradication through the mass vaccination of children. Rotary has contributed more than \$1.7 billion and countless volunteer hours to immunize more than 2.5 billion children in 122 countries. In addition, Rotary's advocacy efforts have played a role in decisions by donor governments to contribute more than \$7.2 billion to the effort.

OUR CLUB HAS BEEN THERE SINCE 1963. TO CELEBRATE OUR 100TH ANNIVERSARY OUR CLUB DONATED 3,000 DOSES OF THE VACCINE TO THE ROTARY CLUB OF MITHAPUR, INDIA.

Today, there are only three countries that have never stopped transmission of the wild poliovirus: Afghanistan, Nigeria and Pakistan. Just 37 polio cases were confirmed worldwide in 2016, which is a reduction of more than 99.9 percent since the 1980s, when the world saw about 1,000 cases per day.

Kristyne Benyak then introduced our featured speaker, Tim Hudak. Tim is an accomplished speaker, having appeared previously at our Club during his five years as 1 eader of the provincial Conservative party. Tim generously acknowledged a long and very positive association with Rotary in the several communities in which he has lived, including being honored with a Paul Harris Fellow award by the Rotary Club of Lincoln. He also noted that his job application for his current CEO role was originally shortlisted for consideration through our own executive placement expert, Jayson Phelps. Tim served in the provincial Legislature for 21 years and his formal education as an economist and his former role as Minister of Consumer and Commercial Relations provided an informed background to his comments. He shared his organization's views on perceived shortcomings in our Province's approach in many areas affecting real estate development, ranging from inadequate land supply, slow and expensive

approval processes, inadequate intensification and obstructive Land Transfer Tax. In their view, these and other factors are negatively affecting first-time and successor homebuyers and partly driving the challenging rise in urban home prices.

To close off the meeting with an appropriate flourish, Realtor Fortney won the Ace of Clubs draw and took home a bottle of wine.
