Update on Fife House

The Rotary Club of Toronto Charitable Foundation has received an update on their \$100,000 grant to Fife House.

This grant was in support of the men living in Seaton House with HIV/AIDS. Seaton House was closing and there was no place for these chronically homeless people in the shelter system. Our grant assisted with the renovation of a house on Huntley Street. It is a 20-bed facility providing crucial housing support, clinical care and intensive case management to some of the most marginalized and medically complex individuals.

After four years of planning and renovation Clients were able to move in the week of August 20th. It includes a special kitchen so the Clients can make snacks and have cooking lessons. There is a separate bedroom for each client with their own TV and a shared bathroom.

What You Missed August 23, 2019

Another lovely lunch at Bill's Place set the stage for our regular Friday meeting, held the day after our Golf Tournament at Cherry Downs in North Pickering. Despite the unfamiliar terrain, Team Morari again finessed the trophy, and Past President Pat Neuman won Most Honest

Golfer with an undisclosed but undoubtedly impressive score. Karl Kremer thanked Deb Snider for standing in for long-term Golf Committee supporter extraordinaire, Lorraine Lloyd.

Other Announcements included PP Pat outlining upcoming events hosted by the F and E Committee, including paddle boarding - (a first!) and the upcoming District 7070 Rotary Foundation Walk September 8 and PP Neil's Saki Tasting September 16th. PP Michele pitched the District Conference being held this October in Muskoka. Mary Lach noted the need for firm hotel reservations for the 2020 Hawaii Conference ASAP by month's end, as her final reservation numbers must be submitted. Prince Kumar alerted us to the important changes to Committee structure being considered, and that an email review of four proposed options was about to be sent to all members and their comments requested.

Our 'Let's Be Personal' speaker was Shannon Lundquist, who gave us a glimpse into a day in busy life of a senior executive at Deloitte, where she is Chief of Staff. Remarkable!

Tony Houghton introduced our speaker Tim Speed. Tim provided us with a fascinating insight into Canadian involvement in the history of the AVRO Lancaster Bomber, just one of the almost 50 military aircraft in the collection of the Canadian Warplane Heritage Museum in Hamilton, founded in 1972. Of the 7377 Lancasters ever produced, 430 were manufactured in Canada between 1942 and 1945, many in what used to be called Malton (Airport and Derry Road) and now part of the Toronto International Airport. Women pilots were among those who flew the new planes to staging points on the east coast before the males of Ferry Command flew them over to England. Of the roughly 55,000 Lancaster air crew lost in WW2, about 10,000 were Canadians. About half of all planes were lost, and the plane's average operational life expectancy was only about 50 hours, a glimpse into the horrific attrition that the air war extracted on both men and machines. There are only two in the world still flying - one Canadian and one British. Enthusiasts can still buy a flight on a Lancaster - for a few thousand dollars - and help support the Museum.
