The \$25,000 Past Presidents' Award Goes to SKETCH –by Jim Hilborn

Designed with help from our past president Geoffrey Johnson, the SKETCH Community Kitchen will be the heart of its Culinary Arts Training Initiative. This new facility will guarantee a range of opportunities for growth and increase SKETCH and the surrounding community's capacity to engage homeless youth in meaningful and transformational activities.

The \$25,000 Special Centennial Award will support the renovation of the kitchen at SKETCH's new home at Artscape's Youngplace, 180 Shaw Street, in cooperation with George Brown College. Due to spring back to life this Fall after a multi-million dollar overhaul of the old Shaw Street public school building, Youngplace will be the largest cultural institution in the West Queen West neighbourhood, and will contain studios for artists, craftspeople and designers, learning labs, showcase/gallery spaces, social spaces for the community, and creation labs

The SKETCH Community Kitchen will support more than 850 youth every year by creating a skill-building space for youth to work along with professional chefs, food specialists, nutritionists and elders who can introduce them to various aspects of food preparation and culturally specific diets — all with the important added dimension of Greening Priorities. It will offer creative space for employment training and community building and will be a vibrant and nurturing meeting place for marginalized youth from a variety of cultures and

ethnic backgrounds from across the Greater Toronto Area.

Jim Hunter: Our Newest Club Builder

Born in Scotland, Jim spent most of his childhood in Forres, an ancient Royal Burgh, 24 miles from Inverness in the North of Scotland. After high school at Marr College, Troon, he graduated with an M.A. degree from Edinburgh University in English Language and Literature in 1973 and articled with an accounting firm in London and shortly after becoming a chartered accountant in 1976, emigrated to Canada. Although he intended to stay for only a year or two before returning home, he joined Peat Marwick Mitchell (now KPMG) and 31 years later is still there. What kept him in Canada? Her name is Jane. They were married in 1979 and have one daughter, Emma, a 24-year-old actor.

Elected to KPMG partnership in 1987, Jim is a trustee in bankruptcy and spent some years in KPMG's forensic group, being appointed president of KPMG Forensic in 2003. An active volunteer over the years, and now a retired partner at KPMG, Jim is a fellow of the Institute of Chartered Accountants in England & Wales, a fellow of the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Ontario, and a member of the Institute of Corporate Directors and the Canadian Centre for Ethics & Corporate Policy. He is a Director of The Rotary Club of Toronto Charitable Foundation, and Director and Chair, Fundraising, Edinburgh University Club of Toronto. Until recently chair of the Research & Appeals Committee, Jim Hunter is also the Vice Chair of the Board of Directors of Youth Employment Services, founded by our Club in 1968.

Jim's interest in The Rotary Club of Toronto was sparked over a lunchtime discussion with Rick Goldsmith, although he has other links: his father was treasurer of the Rotary Club of Forres and his mother was president of the Inner Wheel of Forres.



The Past Presidents Just Want to Serve

There is an old expression that there are no second acts in politics. In Rotary, however, there are not only second acts but also multiple opportunities to serve and to continue serving. There are 20 Past Presidents of our Club and for the past thirteen years the PPs have met for dinner each year to reflect on how they can use their experiences and backgrounds to be of effective service to the Club. One of the

early ideas originating from those presidential gatherings has been a common theme: "Give us a job and the tools, and we will help".

In preparation for our Centennial, the Past Presidents undertook, along with our philanthropic committees to search far and wide to investigate and then recommend a Centennial project. Our recommendation was to award the Centennial Grant of \$100,000 to the Sherbourne Health Centre for the opening of The Rotary Club of Toronto Newcomer Clinic. The cheque presentation was made at our meeting on November 2, 2012, and yesterday June 20, 2013, an official celebration at the site launched this new project.

We PPs were further delighted when the Board gave us a \$25,000 budget, similar to our other committees who receive an annual budget, to fund a single project during this fiscal year. We dubbed it the "Presidents' Award" and eagerly took up the challenge. The original Centennial Committee, consisting of Jack Robertson, John Carr, Michael Morgan, Bert Steenburgh, Susan Howson, John Andras, Michele Guy, Brian Westlake, Gerry Nudds and Robert O'Brien, was broadened to include Geoffrey Johnson, Peter Love, Sylvia Milne, Sandy Boucher and John Austin. All were involved in the selection process.

The Past Presidents had a shorter time frame, but still managed to check out three worthwhile contenders. Each of the projects had originally been considered and approved by Research & Appeals. After five meetings, much reflection, and considerable deliberation, we held a secret ballot vote and selected Sketch as a project our Club could be proud of, and the Board and the Charitable Foundation approved our choice.

The old myth that there is nothing more past than a Past President has been effectively dispelled in this Centennial year thanks to the enthusiastic work of this Committee, the high level of activity of Past Presidents in events such as Founders Day, the Tanaka Visit and the Gala, and continuing leadership roles on the Centennial Committee, the Charitable Foundation, the Membership and New Members Committees. The Past Presidents were grateful to be of service and hope that we can continue to help the Club to thrive and prosper as we enter our second century.

Many thanks again to Bill for his hospitality at The National Club. It was another jam-packed meeting, and among our many guests were several representing First Nations. We began with a special presentation of \$25,000 to Club Amick, to buy books for Aboriginal children in northern fly-in communities. Daryl Novak of the Ontario Library Service, which runs the program, accepted the award. Next we welcomed new member, Heather Findlay, who we introduce elsewhere in this

newsletter. Then Rick Goldsmith welcomed our newest Club Builder, James Hunter. Jim is retiring from his role as Chair of Research and Appeals, which also involved a full commitment on the Foundation Board as well as the Audit Committee. This role is truly a full-time involvement and we thank Jim for his work over several years.

Speaker, Professor Douglas Sanderson, a member of the Cree nation and Beaver clan, gave us a very different history of the Five Nations Confederacy than I remember from school. He spoke of the enormous confederate empire that stretched from Pennsylvania to Ottawa and from Nova Scotia to the Manitoba border. These groups had Treaties of Peace that were backed by Wampum - beautiful beaded belts which he had for us to see. These belts were also used by the Vatican and in the 1783 Treaty of Paris ending the American Revolutionary War between Great Britain and the United States and its allies.

Presented with a full deck of cards for our 50-50 draw, Steve Dulmage went home with the wine.
