On Sunday October 6, 2013, there were over 300 walkers from 40 Rotary clubs participating in this year's Foundation Walk. This year "The Walk" was held in beautiful and historic downtown Newmarket, Our esteemed Past President and now Assistant District Governor Neil Phillips

(looking very dapper in his chapeau) and President Richard White led The Rotary Club of Toronto brigade. Maureen Bird was able to scoop us by finding a short cut and finished early but she still had to wait in line for her burger. We were pledged over \$2,000 as part of \$132,000 which was raised this year, for a grand total of \$2,500,000 since "The Walk" began in 1995. Congratulations and thank you to all who contributed. It all began 18 years ago when it was called "The President's Walk" to raise money for the Rotary Foundation. The organizers weren't sure that this event could be a successful fundraiser but lo and behold, they raised \$110,000 in that first year. The money raised goes to The Rotary Foundation's Annual Fund which helps Rotary clubs create positive change in communities at home and around the world. Through the SHARE system, contributions to The Rotary Foundation are transformed into grants that fund local and international humanitarian projects, scholarships, and activities. At the end of every Rotary year, contributions directed to the Annual Fund-SHARE are divided between the World Fund and the District Designated Fund (DDF). At the end of three years, our district can use the DDF to pay for club projects that our club and others in the district choose.



#### A NATURE EXPERIENCE AT RITCHIE PARKETTE

### **The Research and Appeals Committee**

The Research and Appeals Committee reviews unsolicited appeals for funding from charities that are directed to our Charitable Foundation. The Research and Appeals Committee does not solicit or advocate on behalf of any organization. Its role is restricted to carrying out due diligence reviews and making recommendations to the Board of the Rotary Club of Toronto Charitable Foundation. The Foundation Board

authorizes all grants. Research and Appeals role is strictly advisory.

The Research and Appeals Committee reviews appeals by applying its Project Evaluation Guidelines. The focus is the downtown area with an emphasis on seniors, youth, health, education, and welfare. Applications must have registered charitable status to be considered. Grants are not given to individuals.

Each appeal is allocated to a committee member who carries out a review. This may involve visiting the appeal premises, interviewing the appeal Executive Director and examining relevant financial information. The committee member makes a presentation to Research and Appeals Committee which then votes on each appeal.

All Research and Appeals recommendations to the Board are the result of a collective decision of the committee.

#### Mark Your Calendar, November 1, 2013 Domestic Human Trafficking; Alive And Well In Your Community by Sylvia Milne



Picture this: Toronto Police find a young girl, 17 years old, living on the street. They learn that she is totally in the control of a terrible pimp who has managed her for the last three years. She came to Toronto three years ago, after her alcoholic parents told her to get out. As she arrived at the Bus Station at Bay and Dundas a pimp recognized her vulnerability, promised her great clothes, a place to

live, etc. It wasn't long until she realized that she had no escape. As soon as she got to know Toronto, her pimp sent her to Vancouver; when she learned how to find her way around Vancouver they sent her to Halifax – and so on. She is terrified of him and the Toronto Police can only send her to a home for women and children who have escaped domestic abuse.

This presentation will identify a solution to this problem that the Women's Initiative Committee has been working on for two years. Plan to come on Nov. 1 to learn more about the problem – and the Rotary solution.

Room 40, where computer's were born as a result of massive amounts of data being attempted to be analyzed, was where Alfred Ewing, using the found German cryptograph, could read all of the encrypted German communication. They knew where the German fleet was headed. Unfortunately Captain Jackson ,who didn't put much faith in the then "geek squad", never consulted Ewing. As a result, the Germans escaped the waiting British fleet and returned to port. There would be no defeat at Jutland. Lessons should be learnt from this event, according to Gunz. The first, to learn from the experts, and second, make sure they are in the room when decisions are being made. Ironically, Oliver and Jackson got promoted respectively.
