Nicholas Gunz is a PhD Candidate in naval and intelligence history at the University of Cambridge. He has taught at Cambridge, Yale and the Canadian Forces College, as well as the University of Toronto. Currently writing his thesis, he is teaching in the University of Toronto's School of Continuing Studies.

An expert on intelligence and security issues, he has lectured in the United Kingdom, the United States and Canada. His research focuses on the history of political and military institutions and technology. While an undergraduate at the University of Toronto he was awarded the Gold Medal in History and attended Cambridge on a Commonwealth Trust Scholarship.

## Up to \$6,800 for Employers to Hire Youth

This new youth employment fund of the Government of Ontario is providing up to \$7,800 to cover a range of supports and services for each eligible young worker under the fund.

If you've been thinking of a new hire, or postponing a hiring decision, or want to give a young person a chance, this is an opportunity you can't miss. This new fund provides young new workers with an entry point to long-term employment through job placements.

The youth unemployment rate is far too high and stuck at close to 20%. It was an honour to have Olivia Chow, the Honourable Member of Parliament for Trinity-Spadina speak to us. She called upon the strength and ambition of our Club's first female member, Pauline Hill. It was amazing to hear the passion that Olivia expressed for improving the lives of all Canadians, especially children and immigrants. Olivia spoke of the creation of child centres within schools, which give children a place to go before and after school as opposed to going to programs offsite at



places like public libraries and community centres. Olivia also stressed the need for a long-term predictable source of funding for our transportation and infrastructure programs. She stressed that we cannot continue by funding transit projects on a piece-meal basis. Her final point was to focus on how \$5 billion of productivity is lost each year due to underemployment of immigrants in Canada. She made the point that major corporations are quite adept at training and mentoring skilled immigrant labour, but small and medium businesses need assistance. We need to find ways to connect these smaller businesses with these trained immigrants. Concluding her speech, Olivia stated that Rotary has a unique opportunity to help because we're so engaged and connected with both of these parties.
