In a political career that began in 1985, Olivia Chow has been one of Toronto's most effective leaders on the Board of Education, at Toronto City Hall, in Parliament, and on the national stage.

Olivia was born in Hong Kong in 1957 and grew up in Toronto. She studied philosophy and art. She worked as a college professor, an English as Second Language teacher, a counselor for new immigrants and a sculptor. She won her first election in 1985 and served on the Toronto Board of Education for six years.

First elected to Parliament as MP for the riding of Trinity-Spadina in 2006, Olivia has won re-election twice. Olivia is currently the Official Opposition Transport and Infrastructure Critic. Her bill on a National Transit Strategy is widely celebrated by mayors and municipalities from coast to coast to coast.

### The Two Row Wampum: Our First Treaty Aboriginal Service Committee

The Aboriginal Service Committee has as one of its mandates education. As we struggle toward Truth and Reconciliation, it is important that our Rotary members be informed on some of the historic underpinnings of the ongoing discussion between our First Peoples and the rest of Canada. This past June forty-three "Ordinary Canadians," including Rotarians Peter Love and John Andras, traveled north to the remote fly-in first nation of Kitchenuhmaykoosib Inninuwug (KI).

Lynn Porter and Alice Williams of the Kawartha Truth and Reconciliation Support Group brought a loom, rawhide and beads to produce a re-creation of the Two Row Wampum, the original treaty document between European immigrants to the North America, and its aboriginal inhabitants.

Over 90 travelers and KI residents, men, women, elders and children, learned the story of the first treaty which was enacted 400 years ago this October.

This treaty was established between the Dutch and the Haudenosannie People in what is now upstate New York. The Two Row Wampum consists of two rows of purple beads against a background of three rows of white beads. The purple beads represent a canoe and a Dutch ship travelling down the river of life together, equal but never touching. The 3 white stripes represent peace and friendship. The treaty is in effect as long as the sun shines, as long as the waters flow and as long as the grass grows green.

The wording of the first treaty was still used on treaties signed well into the last century. The words of the Two Row Wampum were reflected in

the Treaty the Federal Government made with the people of KI in 1929. It too was a treaty built on friendship and sharing. The KI flag has a row of yellow, blue and green representing the enduring promise of the Government to the First Peoples.

As guests we added a row on to our Two Row Wampum, though we were not able to finish it by the end of our visit. That was good and right, for our treaty making in Canada remains unfinished. I hope, someday, that I will travel to KI and tie the last knot. For then our wampum—our treaty making—will be complete and we can look upon each other as equals and share this beautiful land in peace and friendship.

### The Speaker's "Platform:" Perspective from an Esteemed Past President



At a past Robbie Burns' Day lunch I was intrigued by the reference to past discussions on the "rostrum versus podium" debate. To satisfy my own curiosity, I decided the matter required a little more investigation. Herewith are the results.

Rostrum: From the middle 16th Century. A platform or stand for speakers in the Forum of ancient Rome, decorated with beakheads of captured warships. Thus derived from Latin rostrum, or beak, of a bird. So not sure this one fits, unless it's an especially contentious lunch, in Rome.

Pulpit: A raised structure consisting of an enclosed platform, usually in a church or chapel, from which a preacher delivers a sermon. Or a place from which something of the nature of a sermon, as a moral lecture, is delivered. Well now – I'll reserve comment, but don't think this fits most lunches.

Podium: From the middle 18th Century. A raised platform surrounding the arena in an ancient amphitheatre. Amended slightly in later years: a raised platform or dais at the front of a hall or stage; specifically one occupied by the conductor of an orchestra. Now this one might be closer to the mark at times . . . but still not quite what we need.

Lectern: A stand or desk, usually with a sloping top or front that can hold open a book, notes, et cetera. Or, a speaker's gift, perchance? Bingo – this is it!

So all in all, I think lectern wins! Though perhaps that may depend on the speaker, hmm?

For those of you who missed it, last Friday's luncheon was the last of the summer.

Reflecting upon the events of this past season, and in particular his time spent as ad hoc President on

August 23rd, Steve Smith delighted the crowd with an inside joke and again faced the Canadian flag prior to speaking to the attendees – this time as an announcer.

All joking aside, Mr. Smith announced that a World Wine Tour will be held at the National Club on November 7th, when Neil Phillips will tell us everything we wanted to know about cabernet sauvignons. The cost will be \$95 per person, and you are encouraged to look for it in the upcoming clubrunner email.

Rafael Lopez Monsalvo presented the club with a Rotary banner he received while recently in Mexico.

We were honoured to hear Lt. General Yvan Blondin, Commanding Officer, Royal Canadian Air Force, speak.

He was introduced by Garrick Gnai. It was fascinating to hear about the many initiatives being undertaken by the RCAF. Employing over 17,000 people and conducting approximately 1,200 search-and-rescue operations a year, it is apparent that the RCAF is much more than a military operation, and that it plays a vital role in Canadian society. Moving forward, the RCAF strives to continuously improve and is presently seeking to add virtual training by way of simulators, which is expected to save millions of dollars and reduce RCAF's carbon footprint and the wear-and-tear on equipment. Developing strategies to assist Canada in its development of the Arctic are also being explored, and the aerospace industry has been invited to provide input on that initiative.

In conclusion, Lt. General Blondin was kind enough to answer a few questions, and in the fine tradition of the RCAF, he kept time with military precision and certainly did not "drone-on", although he did discuss drones.

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
