Where Your Money Went

On Dec 22 our Club Christmas party ran a 50-50 draw, and, with additional funds from the Foundation, \$5000 was donated to the Good Shepherd Ministries. What did they do with this money? It went toward the cost of the meals they serve during the holiday season. On Christmas day they serve what they call "festive food," rather than a regular turkey dinner, simply because there are so many other charitable groups serving turkey that day. So, on Boxing Day, they serve up a roast beef dinner with all the trimmings for 1400 people! Our money helped cover the cost of this meal. This organization, "Toronto's largest free meal provider," serves an average of 1300 meals per day, and provides other essential services including overnight accommodation for 91 men, showers, clothing, counselling, a medical clinic and a drug and alcohol recovery program. The budget for food last year was \$120,000, but that only represents 5% of their total food costs; the rest is donated. They have two trucks on the road each day picking up the donated items, while fresh items such as milk and eggs are purchased.

One of their interesting programs is a "casserole service," where different organizations from around the GTA participate in cooking casseroles to be served at the site. Good Shepherd provides the aluminum trays and the recipes and arranges to pick up product finished which is then frozen for future use. The groups who take on this job include companies, churches, community groups and professional organizations such as law firms and accountants.

Good Shepherd has on average 7000 volunteers a year, including high school groups who arrive daily to help make beds and do laundry. I asked how they managed their funding, since they operate a sizeable establishment with 70 paid employees. The answer was they

generate 60% of their money from fundraising, while 40% comes from donations, foundations and local government per diem grants. Our \$5000 was put to good use!
