What You Missed May 29, 2015

The Concert Hall of the Royal York buzzed with the energy of youth. This was to be a celebration of their achievements. It started, as one walked into the room, with two theatre size

screens flashing the winners of the Rotary 2015 Youth Civic Leadership Awards and scenes of the recent 3rd Annual Youth Leadership Expo. The atmosphere was enhanced with lyric and song by Caela Butt of Sketch. Toronto Rotaract Club members were seated at many tables.

Unlike most club meetings, this one did not have a formal head table and President Steve was in a largely ceremonial role. He conducted the opening ceremonies and introduced some special guests, as well as, some visiting Rotarians, one of whom came from Peterborough, England. Among the guests was Brian Thompson, Rotary District 7070 Governor, representatives of the TDSB, TDCSB and Toronto Community Housing along with Allison Gacad, winner of the Rotary Club of Toronto Youth Civic Leadership Award.

Steve then handed the meeting over to Paul Churchward, secretary of the Rotaract Club of Toronto. Paul introduced Oddane Taylor of Sketch who sang/rapped two numbers. Oddane provided lively entertainment not only by the lyrics of his songs but also by wandering among the tables and gently coercing two members of the audience to join him "on stage." Oddane received a standing ovation. Paul described the purpose of the Youth Expo as helping young people to understand what leadership means. He recognized a few select individuals from both Rotaract and Rotary. Steve then read a letter of congratulations from the Ontario Minister of Youth & Children Services - Tracy MacCharles, followed by speeches from the school board representatives - John McPhee and Gary Poole.

Then it was on to the main event, the presentation of the awards. Aneesh Choudry received the Toronto Community Housing Youth Civic Leadership Award. Nadar Chaya was presented with the Rotaract Silver Civic Leadership Award. Maria Kashif took the Rotaract Gold Youth Civic Leadership Award and made an emotional acceptance speech. The highest youth award, The Rotary Club of Toronto Youth Civic Leadership Award, was presented to Allison Gacad. Allison made a very polished and professional acceptance speech, especially considering she is only in Grade 11. These award recipients show us the power of youth and humble us all with what they have been able to accomplish in their few short years. Our future seems to be in good hands with young Canadians such as these.

Jeff Dobson made some closing remarks recognizing the award winners, thanking all the volunteers and the community participants who made the youth expo and youth leadership awards possible. John Fortney made an appeal for volunteers to assist on the Youth Services Committee and all the various programmes and events it undertakes. Paul then closed the ceremonies for the awards and passed the meeting back to President Steve who made the announcements.

Pat Neuman announced the annual Ribfest program and the role of Rotary at this event. Volunteers are needed in droves to man the entrances to collect "toonies" from guests. She also asked if there were members who would host an Exchange Student from Denmark from June 11 through 17.

Bill Morari and Geoffrey Johnson announced a cycling event to Camp Scugog to raise funds to be able to send children whose parents cannot afford to send them to camp to do so. The ride is "only" about 60 km so, although not for the faint of heart it is doable in half a day.

Steve announced some future Rotary meetings and then undertook the Ace of Clubs draw with a pot worth \$2160. The winner was Clara Lomas, a guest representing one of the partners of the Expo. Steve then closed the meeting and wished all a great weekend.
