He has produced a number of publications related to aboriginal issues including: forest certification, Native values collection, biofuel opportunities, First Nation community land use plans, criteria and indicators for sustainable forestry, and cedar product development.

D-DAY: 70 YEARS LATER

Today, Friday, June 6, is the 70th Anniversary of D-Day. Seventy years ago this day 150,000 Allied troops mounted the largest military invasion in history, turning the tide of the Second World War and starting the process of liberating Nazi occupied Europe from one of the greatest scourges of evil ever known in the history of mankind. One of our very own Club members, well-known photographer Gilbert Milne, took astonishing first-hand photos from the landing craft and the beaches which were the first to be shown to the public after the D-Day and are now preserved by the Canadian government as part of the official record of those stirring times.

Seventy later. years General Richard Rohmer addressed Club our on May 2, 2014 and discussed the significance of D-Day leading to the end of the War on VE-Day May 7, 1945. Today as we meet at Rotary, General Rohmer together with 180 Canadian veterans return to Juno Beach and Normandy to commemorate special anniversary. Sadly,

Arts For Children and Youth Centennial Project – by Brittany Turner

Arts for Children and Youth and its many students continue to reap the benefits of the new equipment for our Digital Arts Programs. The presence of high-quality digital media equipment provided through the Rotaract Clubs of Toronto and the University of Toronto's Centennial project has enabled us to diversify our artist roster, broaden the scope of our programming, and cater to more partner needs. It has also provided the youth participants with the tools to excel in digital art making and delve deeper into their learning. Thus far, programs including Music Production, Photography, and Digital Art Making have extensively used this equipment.

Prior to the Rotary Club of Toronto's \$50,000 grant, renting and borrowing equipment burdened AFCY, but now, with the resources at our fingertips, we can fully exercise this exciting and innovative side of our programming. The presence of stateof-the-art equipment has enhanced the quality of our digital art workshops and has received tremendous positive feedback from the participants involved. These programs give children and youth the opportunity to strengthen their technological skills and gain literacy in the digitally driven world we live in today. Skills including design, music, video, photography, camera work, computer skills, innovation, problem solving, divergent thinking, and critical thinking make up the broad knowledge that participants gain from digital-based education.

Notably, the Photo Booth has been a popular digital accessory that the Rotary Club of Toronto Centennial Project funding has provided us with. The photo booth has proven to be an extremely effective tool in engaging families at events and fostering an even greater sense of community, and has even acted as a revenue generation tool for AFCY. The equipment also gives us the opportunity to impact children, youth, and families outside of our immediate AFCY community as it is occasionally rented to other arts organizations where they use it to engage other youth populations and the public. Whether it be a full family photo, costumes and all, or a photo shoot of a group of friends, the photo booth brings people together and makes AFCY activities accessible to all ages.

Digital Art Programming is especially appealing to youth. Our Youth-Led Program Division has benefitted greatly from the popularity of these programs with the help of the equipment involved. These youth have the opportunity to engage more

creativity through the use of highly technical equipment. They are able to use the produced artwork towards their own successes by adding their achievements to personal portfolios and resumes. The professional quality artwork can improve their ability to obtain a job or achieve acceptance to educational art institutions. The feedback from program participants is unanimous in that they feel like professionals when using the digital equipment. It brings a higher standard to the programs and instils an even greater sense of pride among participants.

One of our most seasoned youth artists and AFCY digital equipment users, Fitzroy Facey said "First and foremost, thank you Rotary and Rotaract Clubs for contributing to the development of our youth and youth artists. Your generous donations have allowed the youth that I have worked with to realize their potential and most importantly to take a step to fulfilling these potentials." One of our other talented youth, Jordan Lewis, facilitated a Sound Recording Program for youth between the ages of 13 and 19 at the Humber Boulevard Boys and Girls Club. This program was made possible by the sound production and recording equipment we can now provide these youth with to fully succeed in their art making. Digital Art Making programs are certainly something that both youth and child participants can relate to and get excited about.

The project has had very successful outcomes. AFCY has engaged 629 children and youth to date using the Rotary/Rotaract equipment at our outreach programs. An additional 4,856 children, youth and adults have been involved with the equipment at special events where AFCY has brought the photo booth. This latter group has included the National Youth Arts Week Launch at AGO, Big Bam Boom, HarbourKIDS Family Skating Weekend at Harbourfront Centre, David Bowie Family Sunday at AGO, SKETCH open house at Artscape YoungPlace and the Rotary Club of Toronto Children's Christmas Party. The equipment will continue to be used well in to the future to benefit many.
